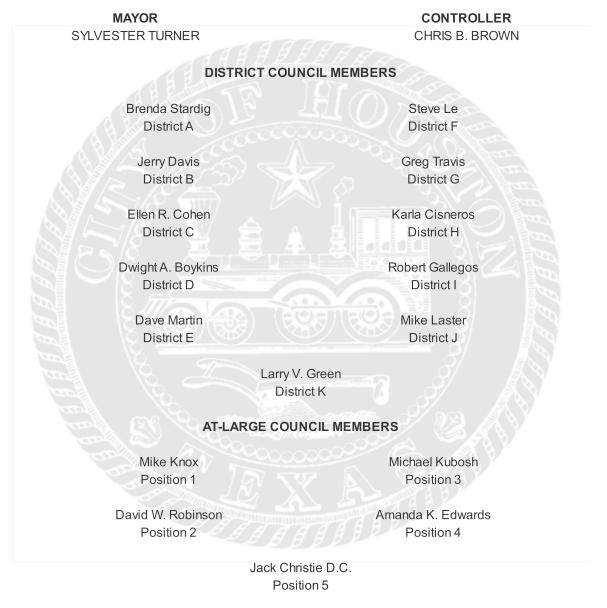

Background:

The Civility Ordinance prohibits certain conduct on sidewalks (lying, sitting or deposing personal possessions) during most daylight hours. It is currently applicable to the Central Business District, Midtown, Old Sixth Ward, Avondale, Hyde Park, East Downtown Management District and the Historic Near Northside. The ordinance contains provisions for a citizen petition procedure to extend the restrictions to other areas of the City.

Residents and business owners in the Greater South Post Oak/West Bellfort have submitted a petition to the City Secretary to extend the Civility Ordinance to their neighborhood. In compliance with the procedures set forth in Section 40-353 of the Code of Ordinances, the Legal and Planning and Development Departments have certified that the petition meets required criteria. Further, the Houston Police Department will prepare a report indicating the existence of the kind of conduct that is prohibited under the Civility Ordinance and incidents of criminal misconduct in the Greater South Post Oak/West Bellfort area.

The ordinance requires a public hearing on the extension to be held with a 14-day notice. The recommended date for the public hearing is Wednesday, January 25, 2017.

Background:

SUBJECT: Motion approving payment to the Greater Houston Partnership for corporate membership at the managing partner level

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Approve a motion authorizing payment to the Greater Houston Partnership for premium corporate membership at the managing partner level

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION: Historically the City of Houston had a contract with the Greater Houston Partnership ("GHP") to promote economic development and other specified services, which renewed annually at a cost of \$376,125.00. In November 2014, the GHP requested that the Mayor's Office not renew its contract moving forward. In 2016, the City of Houston negotiated an enhanced membership package with GHP, consisting of managing partner membership, research services and event attendance for a total amount of \$80,000.00. This selection stood in lieu of a contractual relationship.

For calendar year 2017, the City of Houston Chief Development Officer recommends that City Council approve an expenditure of \$80,000.00, which covers the expanded managing partner membership level at GHP (\$60,000.00) and key services prioritized by the City of Houston, but that are available to all of GHP's members (\$10,000.00 for research and \$10,000.00 for event support). Expanded membership encompasses the opportunity to make custom research requests for economic development purposes, in addition to other benefits detailed in the attached documents. Enhanced membership does not include membership on the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee of the GHP

GHP has worked since 1989 to promote Houston as the location of choice for conducting business, with a focus on increasing Houston's economic prosperity. The GHP will continue to make its research capabilities available on a systematic basis to the City of Houston, Houston First and the Greater Houston Convention and Visitors Bureau to facilitate the creation of professional,

sophisticated marketing reports that include economic and demographic data to sell the benefits and capabilities of the City to various convention, corporate meeting and sports related groups.

In addition, GHP will continue to host major business and community events that help market the City of Houston and specific assets, such as the State of the City and State of the Airports events. As part of its membership, the City of Houston is given opportunities to participate in additional events with high promotional value.

The City of Houston has a number of strategies it uses to invest in arts and culture for the benefit of the City's residents and to attract visitors. This recommendation is related to the tourism aspect of the City's cultural development.

The Texas Tax Code allows municipalities to spend up to a maximum of 19.3 percent of Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT) revenues for the support of the arts with the specific purpose to promote tourism and advance the convention industry. The City has utilized this mechanism to invest in the arts for 39 years.

The Finance Department will disperse HOT funds received for this purpose as outlined by the contract agreement.

The breakdown and use of funds is as follows:

Houston Arts Alliance (39.5%)

Administers a grants program, based on a peer review process, to provide general operating support grants as well as several other grant categories including City's Initiatives grants to about 200 non-profit arts and cultural organizations, individual artists and special arts projects. HAA will also administer a variety of outreach and support services and <u>Artshound.com</u> which provides arts and culture calendar content to cultural district websites and VisitHouston.com. *HAA's management of City civic art projects is provided through separate contracts.*

The Houston Museum District Association (18%)

Marketing and tourism support for 19 museums within a 1.5 mile radius that provide rich experiences in art, history, culture, nature and science. The 11 members of HMDA who receive HOT funds from the Association include Children's Museum of Houston, Houston Museum of Natural Science, The Jung Center, The Menil Collection, Rice Gallery, Contemporary Arts Museum Houston, Holocaust Museum Houston, Houston Zoo, The Health Museum, Lawndale Art Center, and The Museum of Fine Arts, Houston. The Museum District Association is projecting 6.5 million visits in 2017. The 19 museums employ, commission or contract approximately 825 local artists. <u>SPECIFIC EXPLANATION</u>: The Department of Public Works & Engineering wishes to apply for a low interest rate loan from the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) under the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF), Non-Equivalency program, to assist the Harris County Flood Control District to expedite the Emergency Flood Damage Reduction Federal Project – Brays Bayou. The interest rate available on this program is 120 basis points below the current bond market rate. But if TWDB determines the projects qualify for Emergency Relief funding, the interest rate is reduced to 0%.

The TWDB administers loan programs to eligible municipalities and agencies through the purchase of bonds issued by the loan recipients. In 1998, the TWDB began using a priority rating process to determine the amount of funding participants could receive from the State Revolving Fund. Municipalities are annually requested to submit an Intended Use Plan providing information on projects to be considered for TWDB funding. After the projects are prioritized and the amount of available funds determined, applicants are invited to apply for SRF loans.

The City of Houston has benefited from the lower interest rates offered by the SRF program since 1988 and wishes to continue its participation in the program. This resolution will authorize the City to make application with the TWDB to receive a \$45.64 million loan commitment. The loan commitment from the TWDB is for a one year period. Within that period, City Council approval will be requested to authorize the issuance of bonds to the TWDB. The \$45.64 million SRF bond issuance is anticipated in June 2017.

It is requested that City Council approve the resolution authorizing the City to make loan application

with the Texas Water Development Board for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund.

TYPE OF APPROVAL REQUESTED: Protected Landmark Designation

HISTORY AND SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY

The Duplex at 1318 Robin Street and the Duplex at 1320 Robin Street are located in the Freedmen's Town section of the Fourth Ward, one of Houston's oldest and most historic African American neighborhoods. The fledgling rural neighborhood was established by freed slaves after Emancipation in 1865 and by the 1930s, Freedmen's Town was a thriving and self-contained community. A significant population of Italian immigrants also lived in Freedmen's Town and built their homes, businesses, and rental properties in the area during the early 1900s. The duplexes at 1318 and 1320 Robin Street were constructed ca. 1941 for Carl Lee Tortorici (1893-1956), who emigrated with his family from Italy to the United States in 1910.

Tortorici and his family moved to Houston in 1934 to the Freedmen's Town neighborhood where he opened a grocery store. In 1941, Tortorici hired Seamon Henry Clay (1880-1960), a black carpenter and contractor who resided in the Third Ward, to build the duplexes. Clay is one of the few black carpenters and contractors whose work still exists in Freedmen's Town. Several African Americans resided in the duplexes for short periods of time. Tillman Hicks, a black barber who resided at several addresses in the neighborhood, operated his business, the Shady Green Barbershop, in the 1318 Robin duplex for sixteen years.

The two-story duplexes at 1318 and 1320 Robin Street are Craftsman-style wood-frame structures with gable roofs, half-width inset porches, and pier and beam foundations. Each have rectangular floorplans and face south on Robin Street. The duplexes have retained their historical shape and features for the past seventy-five years.

In 1994, the Freedmen's Town Association (FTA) purchased the duplexes from Tortorici descendants. The FTA, a community-based nonprofit organization, was formed in 1981 to advocate for the Freedmen's Town community, including preserving the neighborhood's history. It is currently seeking funds to restore the duplexes to their historic integrity.

The Duplex at 1318 Robin Street and the Duplex at 1320 Robin Street are significant for their vernacular architectural style, African American craftsmanship, and their association with the Italian immigrant population in Freedmen's Town. Each duplex is listed as "Contributing" in the Freedmen's Town National Register District and meets Criteria 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 8 for Protected Landmark designation.

HISTORY AND SIGNIFICANCE

Early Settlement

African American Houstonians often refer to Freedmen's Town, or Fourth Ward, as the "motherward" because the origins of many African American churches, organizations, schools, and businesses are rooted there. Fourth Ward was one of four wards established by a City Charter in 1839. These wards, eventually numbering six, were originally established as political subdivisions. While this means of political delineation was abandoned in the early 1900s, the term "ward" today remains a geographic identifier for inner Houston neighborhoods. The earliest concentrations of African American settlements after the Civil War were on the fringes of the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Wards, settlements known collectively as "Freedmen's Town." Freedmen's Town's original boundaries, though never quite geographically distinct, expanded to include the Justin Castanie and W.R Baker additions beginning in 1866. These areas, while not attractive to many whites, provided a prime location for settlement because of their proximity to San Felipe Road (now W. Dallas) which provided a direct link between Houston and the Brazos River Plantations to the West.

Evidence of African American land ownership in Freedmen's Town is recorded as early as 1866. Carpenter Peter Stanton and drayman William Smith, for example, each owned property on the 1300 block of Robin Street. The Reverend Henry "Jack" Yates, founder of Antioch Baptist Church, purchased property on the 1300 block of Andrews Street in 1869. Reverend Yates was a powerful influence on the political, social, and cultural life of African Americans in Houston. The reverend was also instrumental in making Freedmen's Town a center of African American education, allowing the Freedmen's Bureau to establish a school at Antioch. He even played a prominent role in the founding of Houston Baptist Academy in Third Ward, as well as the founding of Bethel Baptist Church.

Twentieth-Century Growth and Decline

By the turn of the century, Freedmen's Town was a thriving African American community and the primary location for services offered by African American professionals. In the 1930s, Freedmen's Town had its own commercial district, library, schools, professional baseball field, and numerous churches. However, in the 1940s and 1950s, the neighborhood was crippled by its inability to expand geographically. The onset of the Great Depression drastically reduced the rate of construction within the ward itself, and the construction of San Felipe Courts, a "whites-only" public housing complex, eliminated land available to African Americans. The construction of Interstate 45 severed the ward's connection to downtown and Antioch Baptist Church. The new physical development coupled with the flight of African Americans to other neighborhoods in the city, resulted in the slow decline of the once bustling neighborhood.

Neighborhood Preservation

In 1985, because of the neighborhood's unique architecture, heritage, and culture, forty blocks were designated as a historic district and listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The historic district's street boundaries include West Dallas (north); Arthur (east); Victor (south); and Genesee (west). Within the last fifteen years, two additional architectural surveys were taken of Freedmen's Town's remaining historic properties. It has been determined that at least three-fourths of the community's historic residential structures have been demolished or destroyed by fire. Additional

losses of the community's historic fabric include the recent construction of high-density residential metal, wood, brick, and stucco structures; encroachment and replacement of Freedmen's Town street signs with "Mid-Town" signs; and a recent surge of diverse residents moving to the neighborhood.

Carl Lee Tortorici and Italian Immigrants in Freedmen's Town

Italian immigrants also had a substantial presence in Freedmen's Town, and built their homes, businesses, and rental properties in the area during the early 1900s. Over the years, several Italian families acquired property throughout Freedmen's Town. Although their descendants have long since moved out of the neighborhood, many Italian families still retain ownership of these properties. The two-story duplexes at 1318 and 1320 Robin Street were constructed ca. 1941 for Carl Lee Tortorici (1893-1956), who emigrated with his family from Italy to the United States in 1910. After residing in Dallas for twenty years, Tortorici and his family moved to Houston in 1934 to 1401 Andrews Street in the Freedmen's Town neighborhood where he opened a grocery store. The two-story residence had a grocery store at the street level with living quarters above. A number of intersections in Freedmen's Town had corner grocery stores attached or built next to homes which were owned and operated by Italian immigrants.

In 1937, Tortorici and his wife Katherine paid C.H. Walrath \$1,900 for Tract 6, Block 21, in the Castanie Subdivision. Mary Florence Tullos had previously owned the lot and built two one-story structures as rental units, which Tortorici later demolished. As evidenced by a mechanic's lien executed on May 12, 1941, the Tortoricis paid Seamon Henry Clay (1880-1960) \$3,440 to build two two-story duplexes with ten rooms. Clay was a black carpenter and contractor from Catahoula Parish, Louisiana who resided in the Third Ward. Clay is one of the few black carpenters and contractors whose work still exists in Freedmen's Town.

The Tortoricis operated the duplexes as rental property. According to Houston City Directories, several African Americans resided there for short periods of time. Tillman Hicks, a black barber who resided at several addresses in the neighborhood, operated his business, the Shady Green Barbershop, in the 1318 Robin duplex for sixteen years. The Tortorici family resided in the neighborhood until 1944.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND RESTORATION HISTORY

The two-story duplexes at 1318 and 1320 Robin Street are each approximately 1500 square feet. The duplexes are Craftsman-style wood-frame structures built on pier and beam foundations. Each have rectangular floorplans and face south on Robin Street. The buildings have gable roofs with composition shingles, aluminum-sash windows, clapboard siding, wood floors, two entry doors, and half-width inset porches with wood posts which flank the rear and front of the structures. The first and second levels have three bedrooms, one bath, kitchen and dining room. The form of the duplexes in the 1951 Sanborn map indicates that the duplexes have retained their historical shape and features for the past seventy-five years. They were listed as "Contributing" properties in the Freedmen's Town National Register District designated in 1985.

In 1994, the Freedmen's Town Association (FTA), in need of office space, purchased the two-story duplexes from MKTM Properties (a company owned by Tortorici descendants). The FTA, a community-based nonprofit organization was formed in 1981 to address concerns and issues of

community residents; actively advocate for the preservation of remaining historic buildings; educate the public about the community's unique history and culture; promote new and affordable housing; offer various programs for youth, adults and the elderly; and enhance economic viability by stimulating new businesses and expanding existing ones. Other offices housed in the FTA building are the CDC of Freedmen's Town, Alumni and Ex- Student Association of Schools of Freedmen's Town, and the African-American Preservation Alliance of Hou-Harris Co. Texas. The Freedmen's Town Association is currently seeking funds to restore the duplexes to their historic integrity.

The Houston Archaeological and Historical Commission recommends to City Council the Protected Landmark Designation of the Duplex at 1318 Robin Street and the Duplex at 1320 Robin Street.

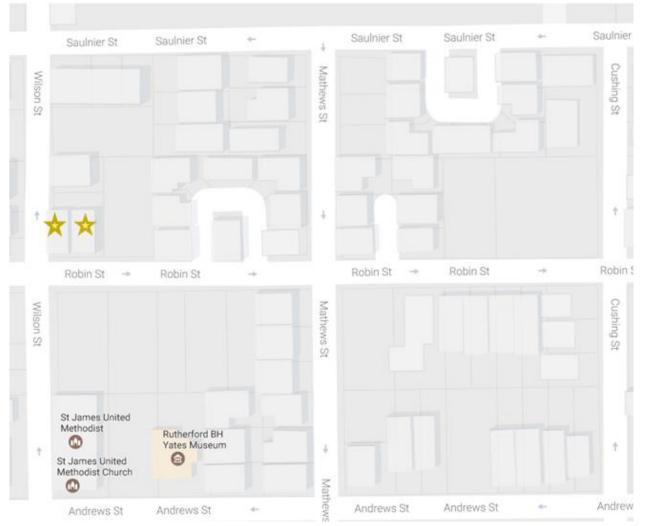


EXHIBIT A SITE LOCATION MAP

HHD-Mosquito Control and Monitoring with Harris County

Agenda Item#: 23.

Summary:

ORDINANCE approving and authorizing an agreement between the City and **HARRIS COUNTY** through Harris County Public Health for the purpose of improving mosquito control and monitoring capacity in Harris County/Houston area; providing a maximum contract amount; containing provisions relating to the subject; and declaring an emergency.

Background:

The Houston Health Department (HHD) requests City Council approval of an ordinance authorizing an agreement between the City of Houston and Harris County Public Health (HCPH) to improve mosquito control and monitoring capacity in Harris County/Houston area. The Effective Date of this Agreement is December 1, 2016 and will continue in effect through July 31, 2017 ("Initial Term"), with two (2) consecutive one-year renewal terms beginning August 1, 2017. The total contract amount is \$ 899,976.00.

Zika is spread mostly by the bite of an infected Aedes species mosquito (Ae. aegypti and Ae. albopictus). Zika can be passed from a pregnant woman to her fetus. Infection during pregnancy can cause certain birth defects. There is no vaccine or medicine for Zika. Therefore, the City and HCPH are collaborating in an effort to improve mosquito control and monitor the population levels of Aedes aegypti and Aedes albopictus mosquitoes in Harris County pursuant with the goals stated in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Interim Response Plan and the CDC's Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity for Infectious Diseases Cooperative Agreement. Under the proposed agreement, HCPH will:

1. It is recommended that City Council approve an ordinance to appropriate \$3,941,012 out of the Police Consolidated Construction Fund (Fund 4504 - WBS G-000037). This appropriation is budgeted in the FY2017-2021 Capital Improvement Plan approved by City Council.

As background, the City of Houston and Harris County entered into an Interlocal Agreement for the construction and operation of a Joint Processing Center with the purpose to combine their jail booking and processing centers into one location that would save money and provide better support and services. Specific Explanation:

The Director of the Fleet Management Department and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve the purchase of one tower truck, two aerial ladder trucks and four pumper trucks through the Interlocal Agreement for Cooperative Purchasing with the Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) in the total amount of **\$4,842,826.00** for the Houston Fire Department and that authorization be given to issue a purchase order to the H-GAC contractor **Metro Fire Apparatus Specialist, Inc.** These firefighting trucks will be used citywide by the Department twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week for technical rescue, elevated firefighting trucks is included in the **adopted FY17 Equipment Acquisition Plan**.

The aerial ladder and tower trucks will come with a full bumper-to-bumper warranty of three years and additional warranties of five years on the engine and transmission, five years on the aerial device swivel, ten years on the chassis and the apparatus body for structural integrity, ten years on the aerial waterway, ten years on the cab and apparatus body paint for surface perforation and corrosion and twenty years on the aerial device structural integrity. The life expectancy of the aerial ladder trucks is fifteen years.

The pumper trucks will come with a full bumper-to-bumper warranty of two years and additional warranties of four years on the apparatus's electrical system, five years on the engine and transmission, five years on parts and two years for labor on the pump, ten years on the cab and aluminum structural integrity, and lifetime on the frame crossmembers and water tank. The life

expectancy of the pumper trucks is twelve years.

These new firefighting trucks will meet the EPA's current emission standards for trucks with diesel engines. All seven trucks being purchased will replace existing units that have reached their useful life and will be sent to auction for disposition.

Background:

The Houston Parks and Recreation Department (HPARD) is applying for a \$40,000 grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) Community Outdoor Outreach Program to implement Houston PARKS Adventures – a program geared toward exposing minority and low income urban youth to nature through environmental education and outdoor recreation. Project partners include Public Works and Engineering Department WaterWorks Education Center, Artist Boat, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Buffalo Bayou Partnership, and Student Conservation Association. Partnership letters and agreements outlining each partner's in-kind commitment are attached.

Matching funds are not required, however, points are awarded based on documented applicant contributions to the project. HPARD and project partners are providing staff and volunteer time, facility use, supplies and equipment valued at \$40,000 toward the total project budget of \$80,000. TPWD requires a Resolution by the City's governing body to authorize the application submission, any applicant contribution, and to designate a project official.

Houston PARKS Adventure enhances the quality and diversity of programming and recreation opportunities offered to HPARD's After-School and Summer Enrichment Program participants. The program will provide hands-on exposure and outdoor learning experiences to connect children with nature and the outdoors. Activities will include field trips to State Parks, bird watching, fishing, camping, outdoor safety, outdoor cooking, hiking and trail exploration, kayaking, and interaction with a variety of wildlife. The program also provides environmental education on topics such as preserving habitat for wildlife, non-point source pollution, water quality, native plants and wildscapes. If awarded, the program will be implemented in the HPARD community centers listed below.

Background:

The Housing and Community Development Department (HCDD) recommends Council approve an amendment to the loan agreement executed December 23, 2014, between the City of Houston and HY FS LLC for the construction of Residences at Hardy Yards, a mixed-income affordable housing development located at North Main and Burnett Streets in the Near Northside neighborhood. The original loan agreement is a zero percent performance-based loan that is forgivable at the end of the ten-year affordability period if no default exists. The amendment will allow for a \$4,700,000 increase to the original \$14,500,000 commitment in order to fund additional costs related to the development.

The development has a total of 350 units, including 179 (51%) affordable and 171 market-rate one- and two-bedroom units, and is part of a comprehensive, mixed-use redevelopment of the Hardy Rail Yard site. The development is scheduled to be completed during spring of 2018 and is located near the University of Houston Downtown campus and another Disaster Recovery Round 2 affordable housing development, Avenue Station.

The additional monies will fund a gap that has been created primarily due to a rise in construction costs. Prior to construction, the developer conducted vast research and spent a considerable amount of time studying construction pricing in the market in order to create the development budget. Based on this data, construction costs were estimated to be approximately \$130/SF for the project. However, as of 3rd quarter 2016, construction costs have increased to approximately \$145 to \$150/SF. HCDD recommends Council approve the additional funds as this development will provide for needed quality affordable housing in the Near Northside community. The overage will be funded through unallocated CDBG - Disaster Recovery 2 funds.

AHG Properties LLC, an affiliated company of the Zieben Group (Lee Zieben), which has previously done business with the City, has formed a partnership with Houston Housing Finance Corporation to undertake this transit-oriented development.

In exchange for this additional financing, the affordability period will be extended from 10 years to 30 years. Also, the owner has agreed to less stringent underwriting criteria as it pertains to sources of income for up to 18 units.
