





Background:

SUBJECT: A resolution to approve the assignment of the Cyberonics, Inc., located at 100 Cyperonics Blvd., Houston TX 77058, as an Enterprise Project status to LivaNova USA, Inc.

RECOMMENDATION: (Summary): A resolution to approve the assignment of the Cyberonics, Inc. enterprise project status to LivaNova USA, Inc.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The Texas Enterprise Zone Program is an economic development tool for local communities to partner with the State of Texas to promote job creation and capital investment. A State Enterprise Zone is any census tract block group that has a 20% or higher poverty rate, as determined by the U.S. Census Bureau during each decennial census.

State law requires a municipality or county to nominate a project of a qualified business for designation as an Enterprise Project to participate in the Enterprise Zone Program. Legislation limits allocations to the state and local communities per biennium; the City is limited to a maximum of 9 project designations. Chapter 2303 of the Texas Government Code grants municipalities the authority to nominate projects located within their extraterritorial jurisdiction (ETJ).

Enterprise Projects are eligible to apply for state sales and use tax refunds on qualified expenditures. The level and amount of a refund is based on the capital investment and jobs created or retained at the qualified business site. Depending on the investment amount, there is a refund to the company of \$2,500 and up to \$7,500 per job.

In 2013, the City of Houston passed Resolution No. 2013-21 which nominated Cyberonics, Inc. as an enterprise project based on its location within a Texas Enterprise Zone. The company is located at 100 Cyberonics Blvd., Houston, TX, 77058. An Enterprise Zone is any census tract block group that has a 20% or more poverty rate, as determined by the U.S. Census Bureau during each decennial census.

In 2015, Houston-based Cyberonics Inc. completed its merger with Italy-based Sorin SpA. The

merged medical technology companies created a new entity, called LivaNova PLC and LivaNova USA, Inc. is the legal name for the business unit that was formerly operating under the name Cyberonics Inc. There is approximately 1 year remaining of the 2013 approved Texas Enterprise Zone Program benefit for Cyberonics Inc. and the City of Houston must pass a resolution assigning the enterprise project status and benefits of Cyberonics, Inc. to LivaNova for it to receive the remainder of its sales and use tax refund.

The Enterprise Zone benefits will transfer under the current designation that was given to Cyberonics, Inc. and the designation period will remain the same (September 3, 2013 through September 3, 2018). The assignment will not require the City to use any of its nine allocated nominations.

LivaNova USA is a medical technology company with core expertise in neuromodulation. The company developed and markets the Vagus Nerve Stimulation Therapy System, which is FDA-approved for the treatment of refractory epilepsy and treatment-resistant depression.

Enterprise Projects are eligible to apply for state sales and use tax refunds on qualified expenditures. The level and amount of a refund is based on the capital investment and jobs created or retained at the qualified business site. Depending on the investment amount, there is a refund to the company of \$2,500 and up to \$7,500 per job.

City Council adopted an ordinance authorizing the City to nominate projects for this state-funded incentive. 

The Coalition for the Homeless will deliver the following program services: (1) conducting a Request for Proposals (RFP) process to select providers of Case Management and Housing Navigation services to a minimum of 400 Rapid Rehousing clients, (2) negotiating contracts with providers, (3) processing reimbursement requests, (4) monitoring performance and compliance with HUD regulations, and (5) providing technical and management assistance and training. The City provides 46% of the budget for this program and the remaining 54% is from other funding sources.

The Director of the Fleet Management Department and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve an ordinance awarding an agreement with **Motiva Enterprises**, LLC (MOTIVA) for the purchase of unleaded gasoline fuel, for a **seven-month term** under Texas Government Code Chapter 791.025(a) permitting an inter-local purchasing using the Metropolitan Transit Authority's (METRO) existing contract with MOTIVA, in an amount not to exceed **\$21,471,617.00** for the Fleet Management Department. The agreement has one 12-month option that would extend it to September 30, 2019.

The scope of work requires MOTIVA to provide all supervision, labor, part, tools, equipment, permits, insurance, including all applicable hazardous material and fuel certifications promulgated by state and federal regulations, and fueling terminal access necessary to supply, as ordered, unleaded gasoline fuel to support the City's daily fleet operations. The scope of services also guarantees the City fuel access during a Hurricane or similar force majeure event. The fuel ordered will be picked-up by the City's fuel transportation services contractor from MOTIVA fuel loading terminals in Pasadena and Houston and transported to various fuel storage facilities and satellite sites throughout the City of Houston. The Department's estimated usage for unleaded gasoline fuel is 9,993,926 gallons, which includes Hurricane and force majeure related contingencies.

METRO's contract pricing is analogous to the City's current unleaded gasoline fuel (UNLD) pricing (UNLD cost is based on the PLATTS Price Index plus a corresponding Fixed Differential).

This recommendation is made pursuant to Chapter 791 of the Texas Local Government Code for exempt procurement.



HCDD reviewed the applications to determine they meet the community development policy objectives of the City and meet certain Minimum Standards. Applications were required to meet a total of <u>6 points</u> of the criteria outlined below to receive a Resolution of Support.

- 1. Sites located within Houston city limits (this excludes sites located within the Houston ETJ). 2 points
- 2. Sites located within 4 miles of City Hall 1 point
- 3. Sites located within the boundaries of a Complete Community. 2 points
- 4. Sites located within 1 mile of a Complete Community 1 point
- 5. Sites located within a Concentrated Revitalization Area 2 points
- 6. Sites located within an underserved area described as the following:

 Within a census tract that has no other affordable housing development funded with LIHTC 1 point
 Within a census tract if the contiguous census tracts do not have any affordable housing developments funded with LIHTC 2 points
- 1. Sites that that promote access to mass transportation options described as the following:

i. Sites located within a 1/4 mile of any public transportation stop - 1 point

ii. Sites located within a ¼ mile to high frequency public transportation stop. High frequency transit service is defined as service arriving every 15 minutes on average from 6 am to 8 p.m. seven days a week – **2 points**

- 1. Sites with reduced poverty concentration described as the following i. Site census tract is less than 15% 2 points
 - ii Site census tract is less than 20% 1 point
- 1. Sites zoned to and A or B rated school based on Children at Risk rankings
 - i. Elementary School 2 points
 - ii. Middle School 2 points
 - iii.High School 2 points
- 1. Demonstration of community support that the applicant has sought, received and implemented views and recommendations from members of the community regarding the proposed development. 1 point

Based on these criteria, the projects listed below have achieved the minimum of 6 point threshold and qualify for a Resolution of Support.
