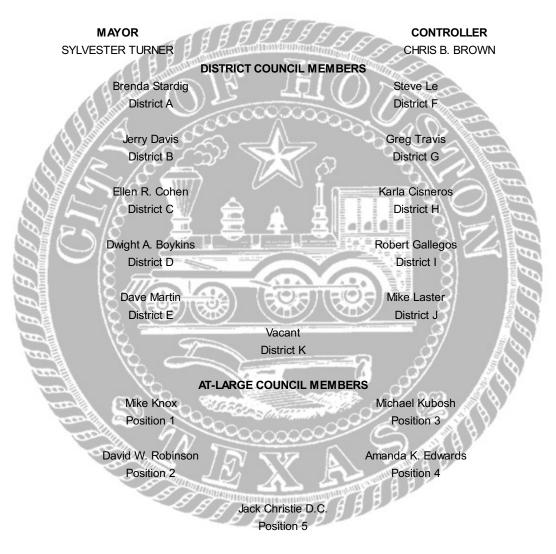

Background:

SUBJECT: Accept Work for Northside Sewer Relief Tunnel Rehabilitation Area No. 5.

RECOMMENDATION: (SUMMARY) Pass a motion to approve the final Contract Amount of \$9,106,698.06 or 7.78% under the original Contract Amount, accept the Work and authorize final payment.

PROJECT NOTICE/JUSTIFICATION: This project was part of the City's ongoing program for Northside Sewer Relief Tunnel Rehabilitation. It was required to rehabilitate Phase II of Area No. 5 of the tunnel, which had moderate to severe corrosion, and to protect it from future corrosion. The rehabilitation of Phase I, under a previously awarded contract, is complete.

DESCRIPTION/SCOPE: The project consisted of the rehabilitation, by slip lining, of 3,130 linear feet of 132-inch inside diameter monolithically cast-in-place reinforced concrete sanitary sewer with 120-inch fiberglass reinforced polymer mortar pipe. Included are diversion pumping, the rehabilitation of two manholes, and the rehabilitation of the Clinton Drive Lift Station's junction box. Binkley & Barfield, Inc. designed the project with 540 calendar days allowed for construction. The project was awarded to Oscar Renda Contracting, Inc. with an original Contract Amount of \$9,875,282.00.

LOCATION: The project area is generally bounded by IH-10 on the north, Buffalo Bayou on the south, Hirsh Street on the east and Bayou Road on the west. The project is located in Key Map Grids 494J, K and L.

CONTRACT COMPLETION AND COST: The Contractor, Oscar Renda Contracting, Inc., has completed the work under the subject Contract. The project was completed beyond the established completion date with an additional 154 days approved by Change Order No 1. The final cost of the project, including overrun and underrun of unit price quantities and previously approved Change Order No 1 is \$9,106,698.06, a decrease of \$768,583.94 or 7.78% under the original Contract Amount and under 5% contingency amount. The decreased cost is a result of the difference between planned and measured quantities.

M/WSBE PARTICIPATION: The advertised M/WBE contract goal for this project was 20%. The M/WBE plan established for this project was 20.10%. According to Office of Business Opportunity, the participation was 18.48%. Contractor's M/WBE performance evaluation was rated Unsatisfactory due to not meeting the goal. The contractor also failed to utilize two subs as originally listed for goal credit and did not follow the deviation process per contract.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION: The Houston Public Works wishes to apply for low interest rate loans from the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) under the new State Water Implementation Fund (SWIFT) program. These loans will be utilized for two projects: The Northeast water plant expansion and the associated water transmission lines. The interest rates available for this program are 20% below the current bond market rates.

In 2013, the 83rd Texas Legislature passed House Bill 4 and Senate Joint Resolution 1 providing for the creation of the SWIFT program. This program is designed to provide funding for projects that are in the TWDB State water plan.

For the first round of SWIFT funding, entities submitted projects to TWDB using an abridged application on February 2nd. The projects were prioritized and approved for moving to the next application phase by the TWDB Board on April 5, 2018. The City of Houston submitted two regional projects to TWDB in the initial abridged application phase and both projects were approved by the TWDB Board. These water projects are included in the FY2015-FY2019 Adopted Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).

City Council approved a resolution on May 27, 2015 for Houston's application to TWDB for a multi-year SWIFT loan commitment of an estimated \$296 million. The loans will cover Houston's prorated share of the design and construction of the Northeast water plant expansion and related transmission lines. Due to the revised cost of both projects, the City wishes to apply additional loans from the TWDB.

This resolution will authorize the City to make application with the TWDB to receive loan commitments from the SWIFT program, the first loan for the expansion of the Northeast water plant and the second loan for water transmission lines associated with such expansion, with the maximum amount of the two loans combined \$153,155,000. These loans will close in late 2018.

It is requested that City Council approve the resolution authorizing the City to make loan

applications with the TWDB for the SWIFT water infrastructure state funding program.

Background:

<u>SUBJECT</u>: Appropriation of funds for Brays Bayou Flood Damage Reduction Plan Interlocal Agreement between the City of Houston and Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD), Greenbriar Drive Bridge.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Adopt an ordinance appropriating funds for an Interlocal Agreement between the City of Houston and HCFCD.

PROJECT NOTICE/JUSTIFICATION: Project Brays is a joint effort by HCFCD and the Corp of Engineers to lower the water surface elevation within Brays Bayou up to 3 feet for the 100-year storm. The lowering of the 100-year flood water level will reduce damaging floods which occur along the bayou. The Federal Flood Damage Reduction Project will widen Brays Bayou thus requiring various bridges, which includes the Greenbriar Drive Bridge to be replaced.

DESCRIPTION: HCFCD is working on the design to replace the Greenbriar Drive Bridge. The City of Houston has requested enhancements to the design of the proposed bridge project. The enhancements consist of constructing the bridge from 58.5 feet wide to 66.5 feet wide and to substitute two (2) 10-foot bike lanes in lieu of a 6-foot sidewalk and four (4) 11-foot wide traffic lanes as proposed by HCFCD.

LOCATION: The project is located in Key Map Grid 532M.

SCOPE OF THE AGREEMENT AND FEE: Under the terms of the agreement approved by City Council under Ordinance No. 2003-1282 on December 17, 2003, HCFCD will design and construct the Greenbriar Drive Bridge as part of the designated bridge projects declared within the Interlocal Agreement. HCFCD will fund the cost of replacement of this bridge and all necessary facilities. The City will be 100% responsible for the additional engineering design and construction

costs associated with the enhancements to the proposed bridge design. The City's costs for the enhancements is estimated at \$362,300.28. In addition to the estimated cost \$54,345.04 will be needed for contingency funds and \$72,460.06 for CIP Cost Recovery for a total appropriation of \$489,105.38. The County shall provide construction drawings and specifications, and shall administer construction of the project.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt an ordinance appropriating funds for an Interlocal Agreement between the City of Houston and HCFCD.

PROJECT NOTICE/JUSTIFICATION: Project Brays is a joint effort by HCFCD and the Corp of Engineers to lower the water surface elevation within Brays Bayou up to 3 feet for the 100-year storm. The lowering of the 100-year flood water level will reduce damaging floods which occur along the bayou. The Federal Flood Damage Reduction Project will widen Brays Bayou thus requiring various bridges, which includes the Greenbriar Drive Bridge to be replaced.

DESCRIPTION: HCFCD is working on the design to replace the Greenbriar Drive Bridge. The City of Houston has requested enhancements to the design of the proposed bridge project. The enhancements consist of constructing the bridge from 58.5 feet wide to 66.5 feet wide and to substitute two (2) 10-foot bike lanes in lieu of a 6-foot sidewalk and four (4) 11-foot wide traffic lanes as proposed by HCFCD.

LOCATION: The project is located in Key Map Grid 532M.

SCOPE OF THE AGREEMENT AND FEE: Under the terms of the agreement approved by City Council under Ordinance No. 2003-1282 on December 17, 2003, HCFCD will design and construct the Greenbriar Drive Bridge as part of the designated bridge projects declared within the Interlocal Agreement. HCFCD will fund the cost of replacement of this bridge and all necessary facilities. The City will be 100% responsible for the additional engineering design and construction costs associated with the enhancements to the proposed bridge design. The City's costs for the enhancements is estimated at \$362,300.28. In addition to the estimated cost \$54,345.04 will be needed for contingency funds and \$72,460.06 for CIP Cost Recovery for a total appropriation of \$489,105.38. The County shall provide construction drawings and specifications, and shall administer construction of the project.

FISCAL NOTE: No significant Fiscal Operating Impact is anticipated because of this project.

ACTION RECOMMENDED: It is recommended that City Council adopt an ordinance appropriating \$489,105.38 for the Interlocal Agreement between the City of Houston and HCFCD.

Background:

<u>Subject:</u> Sixth Amendment to the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team, a joint venture between CH2M Hill Engineers, Inc. and CDM Contractors Inc. for the Northeast Water Purification Plant (NEWPP) Expansion Project, Early Work Package 2A Construction (EWP2A); WBS No. S-000065-0005-3 and S-000065-0005-4.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Adopt an ordinance approving the Sixth Amendment to Ordinance No. 2015-1260, dated December 9, 2015, for the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team, a joint venture between CH2M Hill Engineers, Inc. and CDM Contractors, Inc. for the Northeast Water Purification Plant (NEWPP) Expansion Project and appropriate funds.

<u>**Project Notice/Justification:**</u> This project is required to meet regulatory mandates of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality and the Harris-Galveston Subsidence District Groundwater Reduction Plan.

Under the second supplements, approved on February 18, 2015, under Ordinances No. 2015-137, 2015-138, 2015-139, and 2015-140, between the City and Authorities, the City will be responsible for approximately 16% of the total cost for the NEWPP expansion, and the Authorities will be responsible for the remainder. It is intended that the NEWPP expansion be completed in two phases. The first phase of 80 million gallons of water per day will be substantially complete no later than August 31, 2021 and the second phase of 240 million gallons of water per day to be substantially complete no later than June 30, 2024 for a total of 320 million gallons of water per day. This project was described and briefed to the Transportation, Technology, and Infrastructure (TTI) Committee on December 11, 2017.

Description/Scope: The planning and design phase determined that some of the construction work would be completed as Early Work Packages to meet project milestones. EWP2A consists of the construction of the West Filter Module 1 structure, the 84-inch combined filter effluent piping from the filter module structure to the Transfer Pump Station 1 (TPS1), and the TPS1 structure.

Location: This project is located at 12121 North Sam Houston Parkway East, in Humble, Key Map Grids 376 Z & 377 W.

Project History and Scope: City Council approved the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team (HWT) on December 9, 2015 under Ordinance No. 2015-1260 appropriating \$3,288,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 1 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on November 16, 2016 under Ordinance No. 2016-875 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$14,950,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 2 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on March 29, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-231 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$3,000,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 3 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on May 24, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-378 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$66,300,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 4 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on December 19, 2017 under the Ordinance No. 2017-1017 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$37,339,594.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 6 to the Design-Build Agreement was initiated in July 2017 when the HWT requested interested construction companies to complete a prequalification package for Early Work Package 2A (EWP2A). HWT reviewed those qualifications and sent a Request for Proposal to three major subcontractors including Alberici Constructors, Kiewit Water Facilities South, and McCarthy Building Companies. Competitive Sealed Proposal method was used to procure the contractor for EWP2A. HWT evaluated each proposal independently. Each contractor was then interviewed by HWT with the City and an Authority

representative as observers. Following the interviews, HWT and the City convened for a final evaluation and scoring of the proposals on a consensus basis. McCarthy Building Companies, Inc. (McCarthy) was chosen as the major subcontractor to perform the work for EWP2A.

Project Cost: The total Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) of \$45,515,774.00 includes the direct construction cost of \$34,137,536.00 for EWP2, the indirect construction cost of \$9,671,361.00, and a management reserve of \$1,706,877.00. The major items for indirect construction costs include the cost of \$887,156.00 for the performance and payment bonds, the cost of \$861,304.00 for the engineering services during construction, and the cost of \$3,948,000.00 for the construction allowances for items currently under design.

The City of Houston's total contribution is \$5,052,646.32. The Water Authorities will contribute \$40,463,127.68.

Pay or Play Program: The proposed contract requires compliance with the City's 'Pay or Play' ordinance regarding health benefits for employees of City contractors. In this case, the consultant provides health benefits to eligible employees in compliance with City policy.

M/WBE Information:

a. **M/WBE-Construction:** The Capacity Study performed for EWP2 showed an 8% capacity for M/WBE participation for direct construction costs. Currently, the proposed amount of participation from the Design-Builder (Houston Waterworks Team) is 11.55%.

b. Included in the indirect costs is the construction allowance of \$3,948,000.00 for items that are in the design phase such as the expansion of Waterworks Way Boulevard, the purchase of additional lime treated soils, additional flowable concrete, additional rebar, and the purchase of Permeability Reducing Admixture Hydrostatic (PRAH). When the design is complete, the Project Director will authorize the use of these funds for construction. However, although the final amount for construction is not yet determined, it is anticipated that the construction and purchase of the allowance items will increase the M/WBE participation for direct construction costs.

Under the second supplements, approved on February 18, 2015, under Ordinances No. 2015-137, 2015-138, 2015-139, and 2015-140, between the City and Authorities, the City will be responsible for approximately 16% of the total cost for the NEWPP expansion, and the Authorities will be responsible for the remainder. It is intended that the NEWPP expansion be completed in two phases. The first phase of 80 million gallons of water per day will be substantially complete no later than August 31, 2021 and the second phase of 240 million gallons of water per day to be substantially complete no later than June 30, 2024 for a total of 320 million gallons of water per day. This project was described and briefed to the Transportation, Technology, and Infrastructure (TTI) Committee on December 11, 2017.

Description/Scope: The planning and design phase determined that some of the construction work would be completed as Early Work Packages to meet project milestones. EWP2A consists of the construction of the West Filter Module 1 structure, the 84-inch combined filter effluent piping from the filter module structure to the Transfer Pump Station 1 (TPS1), and the TPS1 structure.

Location: This project is located at 12121 North Sam Houston Parkway East, in Humble, Key Map Grids 376 Z & 377 W.

Project History and Scope: City Council approved the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team (HWT) on December 9, 2015 under Ordinance No. 2015-1260 appropriating \$3,288,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 1 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on November 16, 2016 under Ordinance No. 2016-875 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$14,950,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 2 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on March 29, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-231 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$3,000,000,00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 3 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on May 24, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-378 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$66,300,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 4 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on December 19, 2017 under the Ordinance No. 2017-1017 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$37,339,594.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 6 to the Design-Build Agreement was initiated in July 2017 when the HWT requested interested construction companies to complete a prequalification package for Early Work Package 2A (EWP2A). HWT reviewed those qualifications and sent a Request for Proposal to three major subcontractors including Alberici Constructors, Kiewit Water Facilities South, and McCarthy Building Companies. Competitive Sealed Proposal method was used to procure the contractor for EWP2A. HWT evaluated each proposal independently. Each contractor was then interviewed by HWT with the City and an Authority representative as observers. Following the interviews, HWT and the City convened for a final evaluation and scoring of the proposals on a consensus basis. McCarthy Building Companies, Inc. (McCarthy) was chosen as the major subcontractor to perform the work for EWP2A.

Project Cost: The total Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) of \$45,515,774.00 includes the direct construction cost of \$34,137,536.00 for EWP2, the indirect construction cost of \$9,671,361.00, and a management reserve of \$1,706,877.00. The major items for indirect construction costs include the cost of \$887,156.00 for the performance and payment bonds, the cost of \$861,304.00 for the engineering services during construction, and the cost of \$3,948,000.00 for the construction allowances for items currently under design.

The City of Houston's total contribution is \$5,052,646.32. The Water Authorities will contribute \$40,463,127.68.

Pay or Play Program: The proposed contract requires compliance with the City's 'Pay or Play' ordinance regarding health benefits for employees of City contractors. In this case, the consultant provides health benefits to eligible employees in compliance with City policy.

M/WBE Information:

a. M/WBE-Construction: The Capacity Study performed for EWP2 showed an 8% capacity for M/WBE participation for direct construction costs. Currently, the proposed amount of participation from the Design-Builder (Houston Waterworks Team) is 11.55%.

b. Included in the indirect costs is the construction allowance of \$3,948,000.00 for items that are in the design phase such as the expansion of Waterworks Way Boulevard, the purchase of additional lime treated soils, additional flowable concrete, additional rebar, and the purchase of Permeability Reducing Admixture Hydrostatic (PRAH). When the design is complete, the Project Director will authorize the use of these funds for construction. However, although the final amount for construction is not yet determined, it is anticipated that the construction and purchase of the allowance items will increase the M/WBE participation for direct construction costs.

c. Early Work Package 1 (EWP1) was approved on December 19, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-1017 with an M/WBE goal of 80,45% of the direct construction costs. Construction has recently commenced and M/WBE data is not available yet.

d. Early Work Package 4 (EWP4) is scheduled to be on Council Agenda on February 21, 2018 and has an M/WBE goal of 15% of the direct construction costs. Construction has not commenced and M/WBE data is not available yet.

e. M/WBE-Design: The status of the design for this project is 30% complete. The original contract amount previously appropriated to design this project totals \$85,134,000.00. The consultant has been paid \$23,835,693.60(28%) to date. Of this amount, \$7,829,584.77 (32.85%) has been paid to M/WBE sub-consultants to date. The design goal for this project is 24%. Currently, this project is exceeding the design goal.

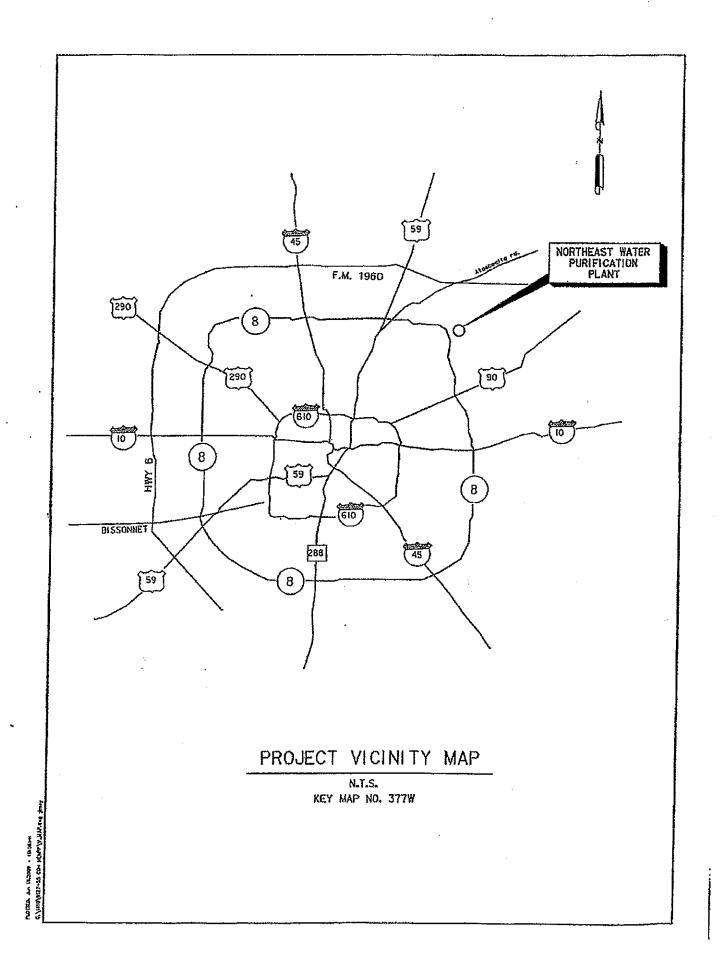

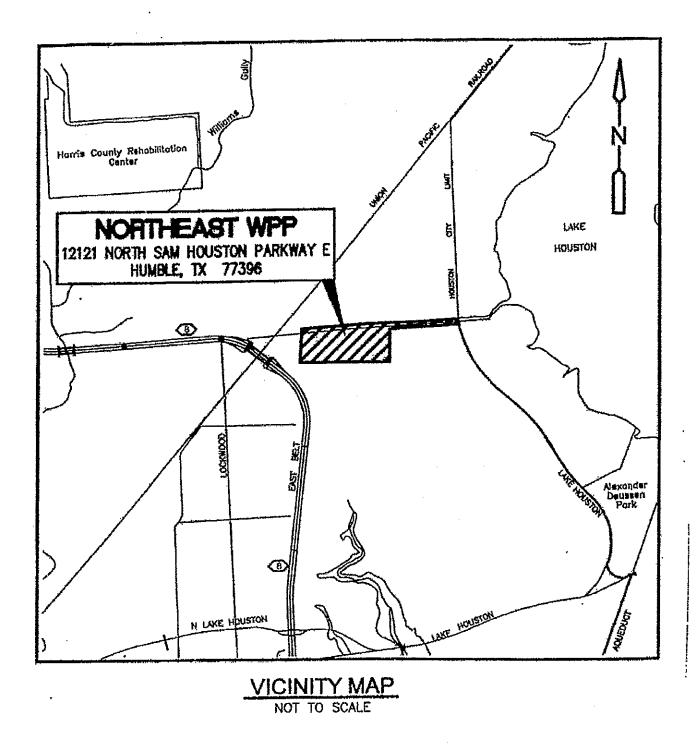

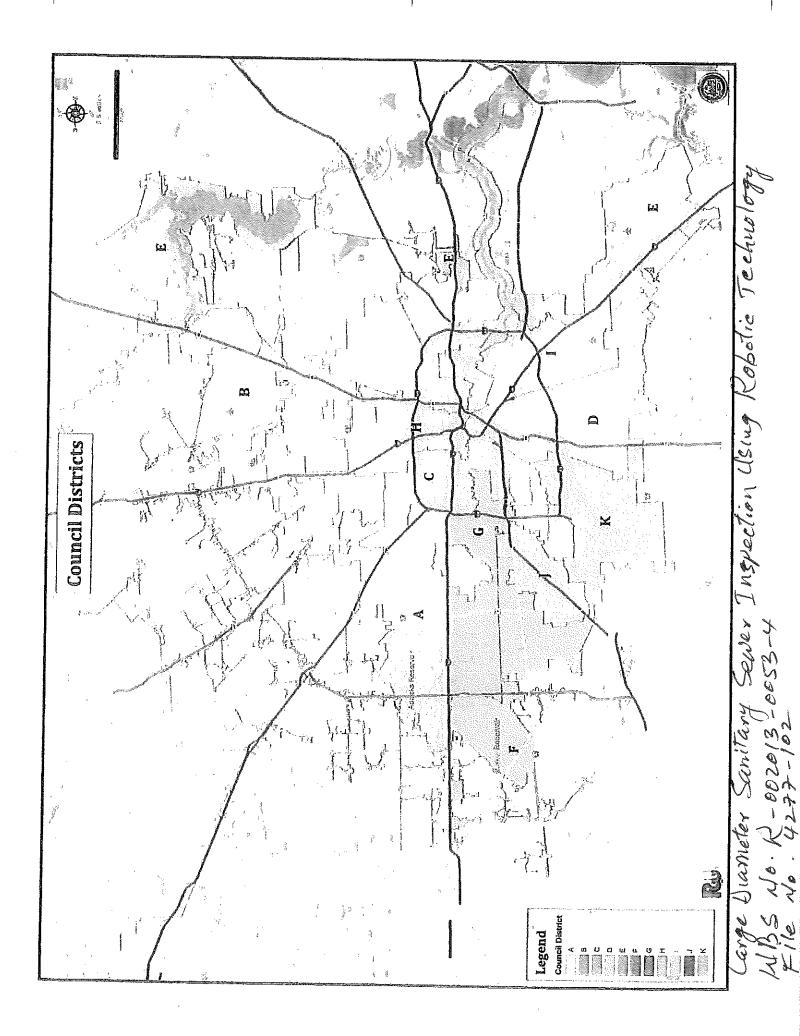

Specific Explanation:

The Director of the Houston Airport System and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve an ordinance awarding a five-year professional services contract with one two-year renewal option to BQR Advertising and Public Relations, Inc. for a total contract amount not to exceed \$3,486,000.00 for On-Demand Marketing Services for the Houston Airport System (HAS). The Director of HAS may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving 14 (fourteen) days written notice to the contractor, with a copy of the notice to the Chief Procurement Officer.

BQR Advertising and Public Relations, Inc. will assist with a broad range of marketing initiatives: website development and support; promotion of revenue-producing airport products, programs and services; development of an HAS marketing strategy and marketing plan; a customer experience strategy; new product research, positioning and launch support. The firm shall furnish all labor, materials, equipment, supplies, and supervision necessary to perform the work and services in a timely manner, in accordance with provisions of the agreement. The firm shall agree to comply with all rules and regulations of the airport, TSA and/or FAA, and with all federal, state and local statutes, ordinances, regulations and policies.

The RFP was advertised in accordance with the requirements of the State of Texas bid laws. As a result, proposals were received from BQR Advertising and Public Relations, Inc., Deutser LLC, Freed Advertising, Richards/Carlberg, and The Voice Society, LLC.
