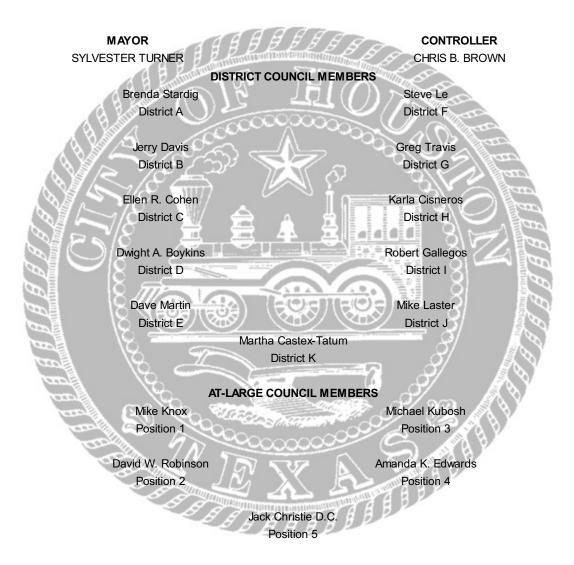

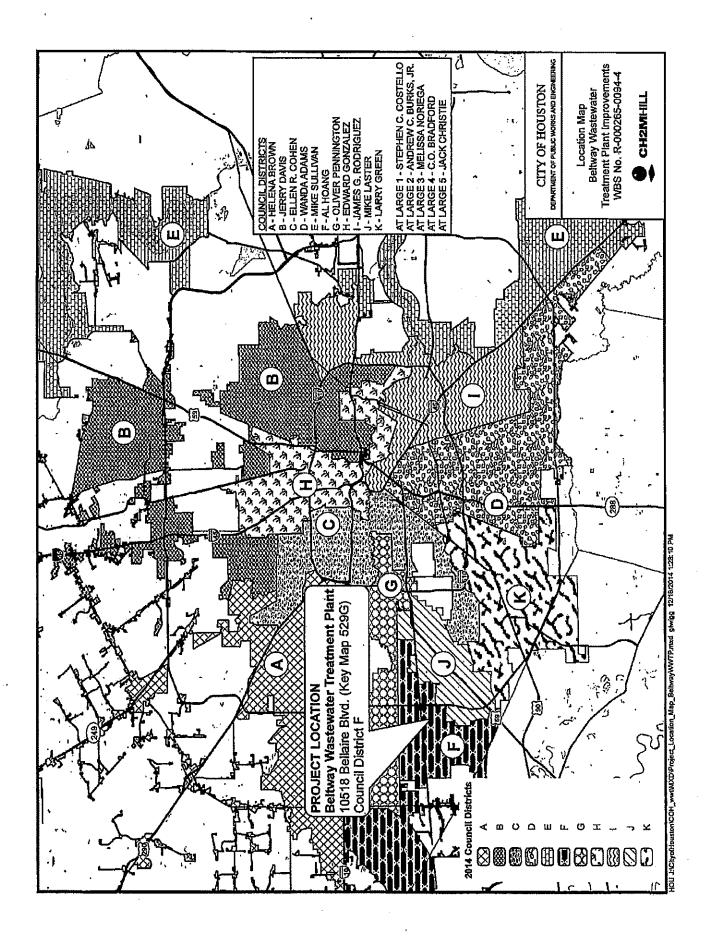

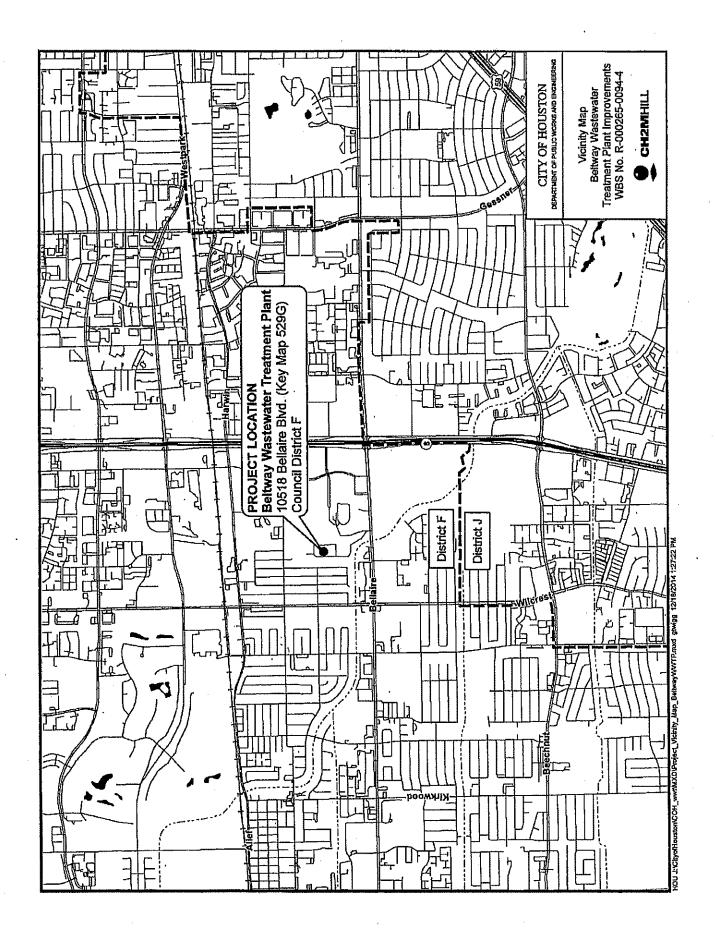

The Director of Houston Public Works and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve payment to **SER Construction Partners**, **LLC**. in the amount not to exceed **\$74,876.25** for Sink Hole Repair Services for the Houston Public Works (HPW) and that authorization be given to issue an automated (SAP) purchase order.

On or about March 22, 2017, HPW's Street and Drainage Division became award of a sink hole across the street from the Almeda Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) collection system. Upon further inspection it was confirmed that due to the cave in, the adjacent sanitary 72-inch manhole (MH) was allowing dirt to enter the wastewater collection system. In addition, the roadway sub-base material under the asphalt pavement of Almeda Road near Orem was deteriorating, creating a void (18X12X12). The Strategic Procurement Department issued a purchaser order to SER Construction Partners, LLC. to address the sink hole. SER Construction Partners, LLC. completed repairs May 25, 2017.

It was imperative that this sink hole be repaired immediately to avoid causing a health and safety hazard to City of Houston personnel and public vehicular traffic traveling along the Almeda Road corridor. The sink hole could have also potentially overflowed, spilling sewage, resulting in Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) non-compliance.

The EPO covered provisions for repairing the sink hole and compromised roadway. The Scope of work required the contractor to provide all labor, materials, equipment, permits, insurance, supervision and transportation necessary to immediately mobilize, and provide traffic control, . Work included, but was not limited to, sinkhole and manhole repairs, installation of new 72" sanitary manhole and 24" sewer line repairs. The work also included demolition and restoration of asphalt pavement, and removal of all debris and excess project material upon completion.

This recommendation is made pursuant to Chapter 252, Section 252.022 (a) (2) of the Texas Local Government Code for exempted procurements "which provides a procurement necessary to preserve

or protect the public health or safety of the munic	ipality's residents" .

ARA-CenterPoint GRIP Approve

Summary:

ORDINANCE relating to the Retail Gas Utility Rates of CENTERPOINT ENERGY RESOURCES CORP. d/b/a CENTERPOINT ENERGY CENTERPOINT and as CENTERPOINT ENERGY TEXAS GAS; approving an interim rate adjustment subject to refund and otherwise maintaining current rates in effect until changed

Background:

The Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department (ARA) recommends that City Council adopt an ordinance approving the CenterPoint Energy Resources Corp., D/B/A CenterPoint Energy Entex and CenterPoint Energy Texas Gas (CenterPoint) Gas Reliability Infrastructure Program (GRIP) interim rate adjustment subject to refund and otherwise maintaining current rates in effect until changed. CenterPoint provides natural gas distribution services in the Houston metropolitan area, serving approximately 385,000 residential, 24,000 small general service and 1,100 large volume customers in Houston. The City of Houston exercises original jurisdiction over the rates, operations, and services of CenterPoint under the provisions of the Texas Utilities Code for customers inside city limits.

The GRIP permits CenterPoint to implement an interim rate adjustment to recover return on the change in invested capital and changes in depreciation and property taxes related to the new investment without filing a full base rate change request. The GRIP was established during the 78th Legislative Session to incentivize investment in Texas' gas pipeline infrastructure to meet continuing growth in the state and to enhance safety by replacing aging facilities.

On March 29, 2018, CenterPoint filed an annual GRIP interim rate adjustment for customers within the Houston Division. CenterPoint is requesting a revenue requirement increase of \$9.4 million for service to retail gas customers within the Houston Division. The adjustment captures changes in invested capital from October 1, 2016 through December 31, 2017 — a \$47.9 million increase in net investment. The requested revenue requirement includes a reduction to reflect changes in the federal income tax resulting from the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017, which reduced the federal corporate income tax rate from 35% to 21% effective January 1, 2018. The proposed tax adjustment reduced CenterPoint's total request by approximately \$700,000 from \$10.1 million to \$9.4 million. If the requested adjustment is adopted, the fixed customer charge for all customer classes would increase as follows:

ARA-CenterPoint GRIP Approve

Background:

The Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department (ARA) recommends that City Council adopt an ordinance approving the CenterPoint Energy Resources Corp., D/B/A CenterPoint Energy Entex and CenterPoint Energy Texas Gas (CenterPoint) Gas Reliability Infrastructure Program (GRIP) interim rate adjustment subject to refund and otherwise maintaining current rates in effect until changed. CenterPoint provides natural gas distribution services in the Houston metropolitan area, serving approximately 385,000 residential, 24,000 small general service and 1,100 large volume customers in Houston. The City of Houston exercises original jurisdiction over the rates, operations, and services of CenterPoint under the provisions of the Texas Utilities Code for customers inside city limits.

The GRIP permits CenterPoint to implement an interim rate adjustment to recover return on the change in invested capital and changes in depreciation and property taxes related to the new investment without filing a full base rate change request. The GRIP was established during the 78th Legislative Session to incentivize investment in Texas' gas pipeline infrastructure to meet continuing growth in the state and to enhance safety by replacing aging facilities.

On March 29, 2018, CenterPoint filed an annual GRIP interim rate adjustment for customers within the Houston Division. CenterPoint is requesting a revenue requirement increase of \$9.4 million for service to retail gas customers within the Houston Division. The adjustment captures changes in invested capital from October 1, 2016 through December 31, 2017 — a \$47.9 million increase in net investment. The requested revenue requirement includes a reduction to reflect changes in the federal income tax resulting from the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017, which reduced the federal corporate income tax rate from 35% to 21% effective January 1, 2018. The proposed tax adjustment reduced CenterPoint's total request by approximately \$700,000 from \$10.1 million to \$9.4 million. If the requested adjustment is adopted, the fixed customer charge for all customer classes would increase as follows:

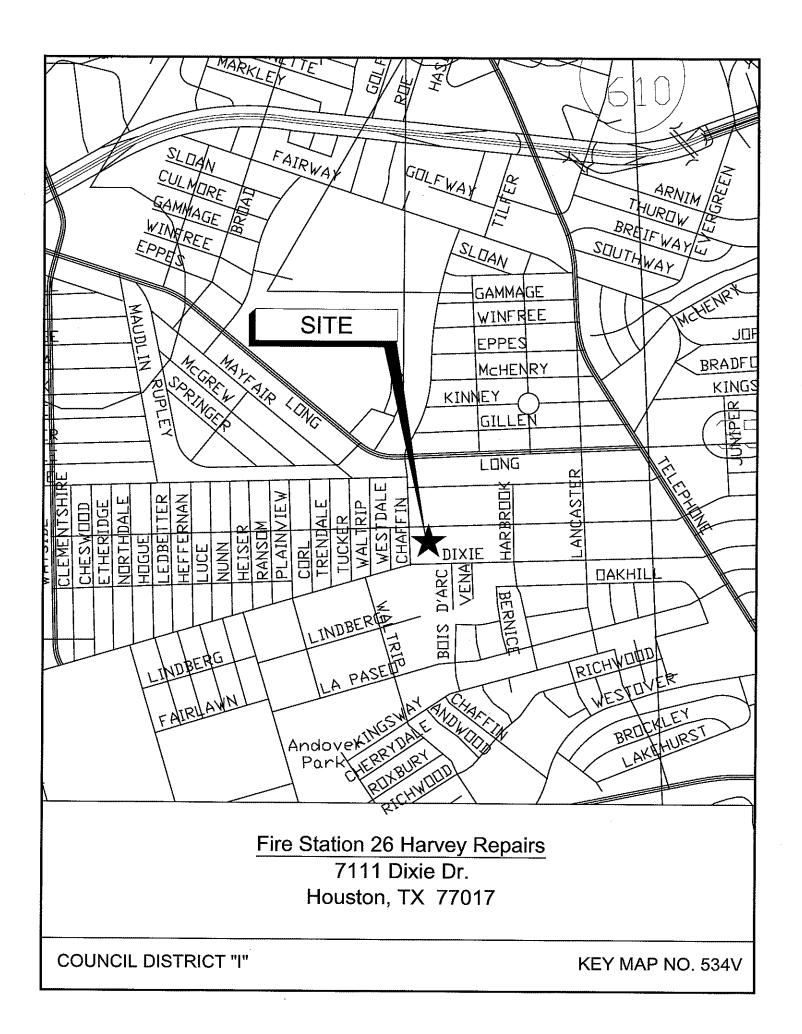

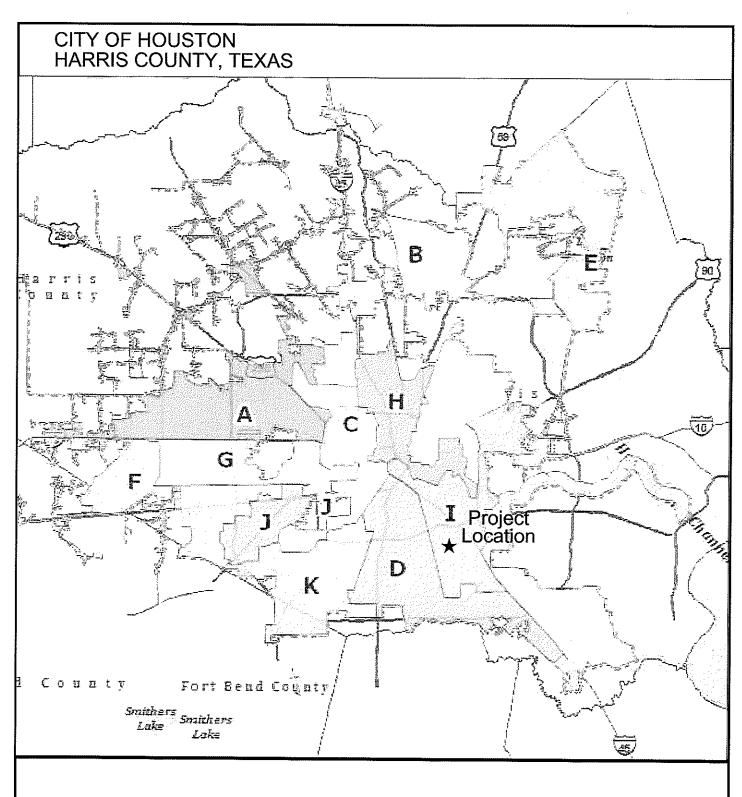

Background:

RECOMMENDATION: Appropriate funds for the TOC/JOC Contracting Program to address FCA Priority 1 and 2 deficiencies for FY2018.

BACKGROUND: In December 2011, the General Services Department contracted with Parsons Commercial Technology Group, Inc. (Parsons) to complete comprehensive facility condition assessments for various City facilities. Parsons conducted a facility condition assessment on 421 facilities; identified and prioritized building deficiencies; and provided cost estimates for repair or replacement.

The most critical repairs identified in the FCA report as Priority 1 and 2 deficiencies are being addressed and funded through the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). These deficiencies have created, or will soon create, conditions that are safety hazards, are in extreme or accelerated deterioration, or can result in failing and interrupted operations.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION: This action is to address Priority 1 and 2 projects at two major Police Department facilities that were approved in the FY2018 CIP. The scope of work includes, but is not limited to, mechanical, electrical, and plumbing repairs or replacements; roof repairs or replacement; life safety and fire protection code compliance; and interior construction and finishes. Therefore, the General Services Department (GSD) recommends that City Council appropriate \$1,000,000 to fund the necessary repairs/replacements.

Background:

RECOMMENDATION: Appropriate funds for the TOC/JOC Contracting Program to address FCA Priority 1 and 2 deficiencies for FY2018.

BACKGROUND: In December 2011, the General Services Department contracted with Parsons Commercial Technology Group, Inc. (Parsons) to complete comprehensive facility condition assessments for various City facilities. Parsons conducted a facility condition assessment on 421 facilities; identified and prioritized building deficiencies; and provided cost estimates for repair or replacement.

The most critical repairs identified in the FCA report as Priority 1 and 2 deficiencies are being addressed and funded through the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). These deficiencies have created, or will soon create, conditions that are safety hazards, are in extreme or accelerated deterioration, or can result in failing and interrupted operations.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION: This action is to address Priority 1 and 2 projects at two major Police Department facilities that were approved in the FY2018 CIP. The scope of work includes, but is not limited to, mechanical, electrical, and plumbing repairs or replacements; roof repairs or replacement; life safety and fire protection code compliance; and interior construction and finishes. Therefore, the General Services Department (GSD) recommends that City Council appropriate \$1,000,000 to fund the necessary repairs/replacements.

SUBJECT: An ordinance amending City of Houston, Texas, Ordinance No. 2018-65 by extending the date for placement and removal of manufactured homes and recreational vehicles for victims of flooding related to Hurricane Harvey; containing findings and other provisions relating to the foregoing subject; providing for severability; and declaring an emergency.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Approve an ordinance amendment temporarily waiving certain requirements of the Code of Ordinances to facilitate the temporary placement of manufactured homes and recreational vehicles for victims of flooding related to Hurricane Harvey.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION: Beginning on August 26, 2017, and continuing over the next several days, Hurricane Harvey brought record rainfall and devastation to the Houston area. Tens of thousands of homes were flooded and rendered uninhabitable. Due to the catastrophic impacts of Hurricane Harvey, the Federal Emergency Management Agency and Texas General Land Office authorized the use of manufactured home units and recreational vehicles to be used as temporary housing for flood survivors while homes are being repaired. The City has also received requests from residents to allow the temporary placement of privately owned manufactured homes or recreational vehicles upon residential property where their homes were rendered uninhabitable by Hurricane Harvey related flooding.

Chapter 29 of the Code of Ordinances, Houston, Texas, generally prohibits the use of manufactured homes and recreational vehicles as residences, except within certain dedicated places such as manufactured home parks and recreational vehicle parks, and for periods of limited duration. In addition, Chapter 29 requires compliance with Chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances for finalization of placement permits for manufactured homes and recreational vehicles that are in flood hazard areas. The City desires to waive the placement and use requirements of Chapters 19 and 29 of the City Code to facilitate the temporary residential use of manufactured homes and recreational vehicles when they are placed within the boundaries of the same tract or parcel where the flood damaged residence is situated. In instances where it is not feasible to place a manufactured home or recreational vehicle on the same tract or parcel where the flood damaged home Is situated, the City desires to temporarily allow placement on City owned or Land

Assemblage Redevelopment Authority ("LARA") property. Such waiver shall be for a temporary period of 180 days with only one 180-day extension. All manufactured home units and recreational vehicles must be removed from private, City owned and LARA properties by December 31, 2019.

This action will amend ordinance No. 2018-65 passed by Council on January 31, 2018, to extend the date temporary housing can be placed from June 1, 2018 to December 31, 2018 and extends the date when all temporary housing shall be removed from August 31, 2019 to December 31, 2019.

It is recommended that City Council approve this ordinance amendment to temporarily allow residential use of federal and state provided manufactured homes and recreational vehicles, as well as privately owned manufactured homes and recreational vehicles for victims of Hurricane Harvey while their residential homes are being repaired.

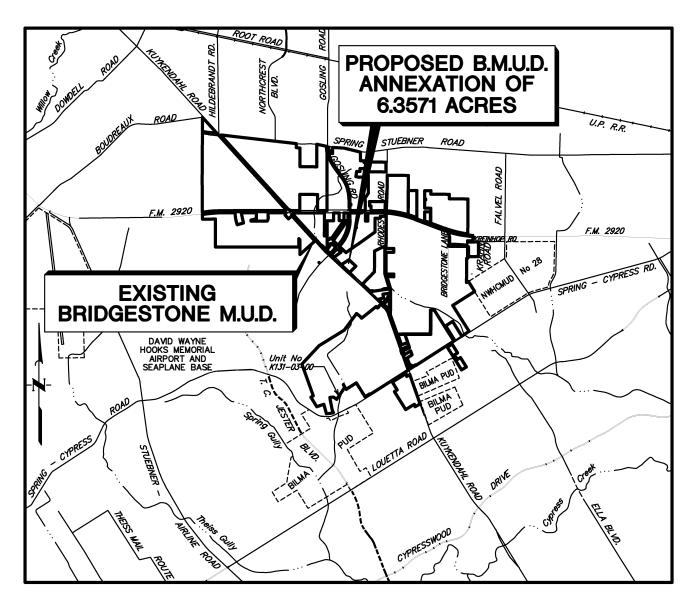

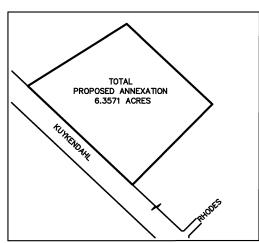

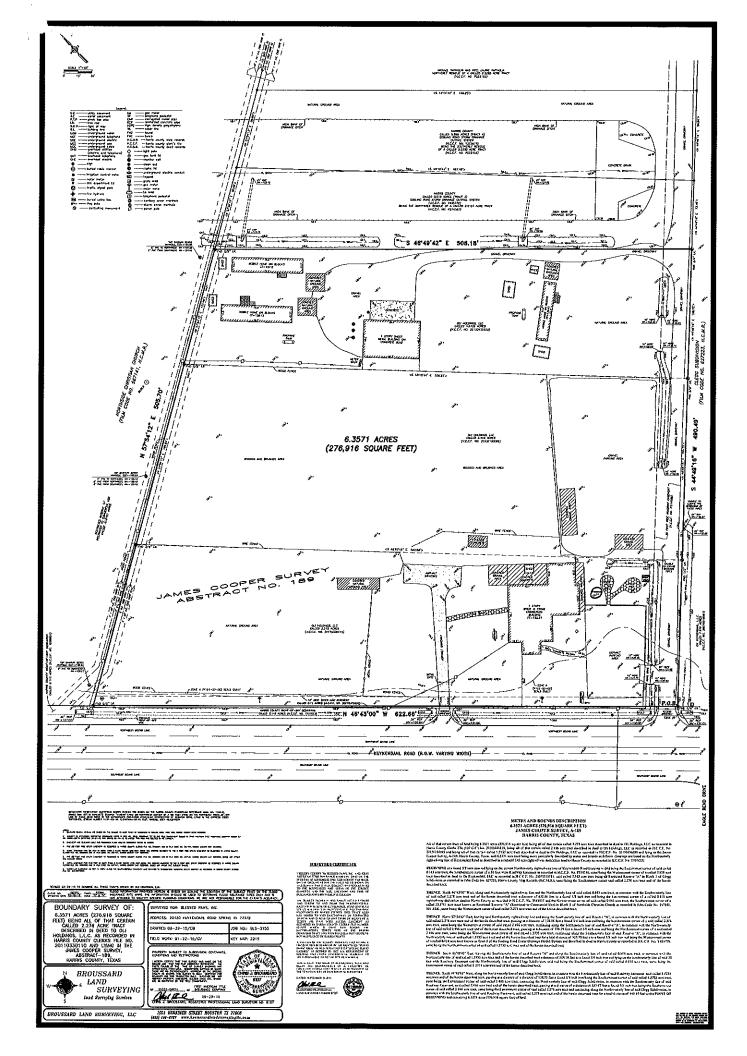
Proposed annexation of 6.3571 Acres of Land (HARRIS COUNTY KEY MAP: 291-S)

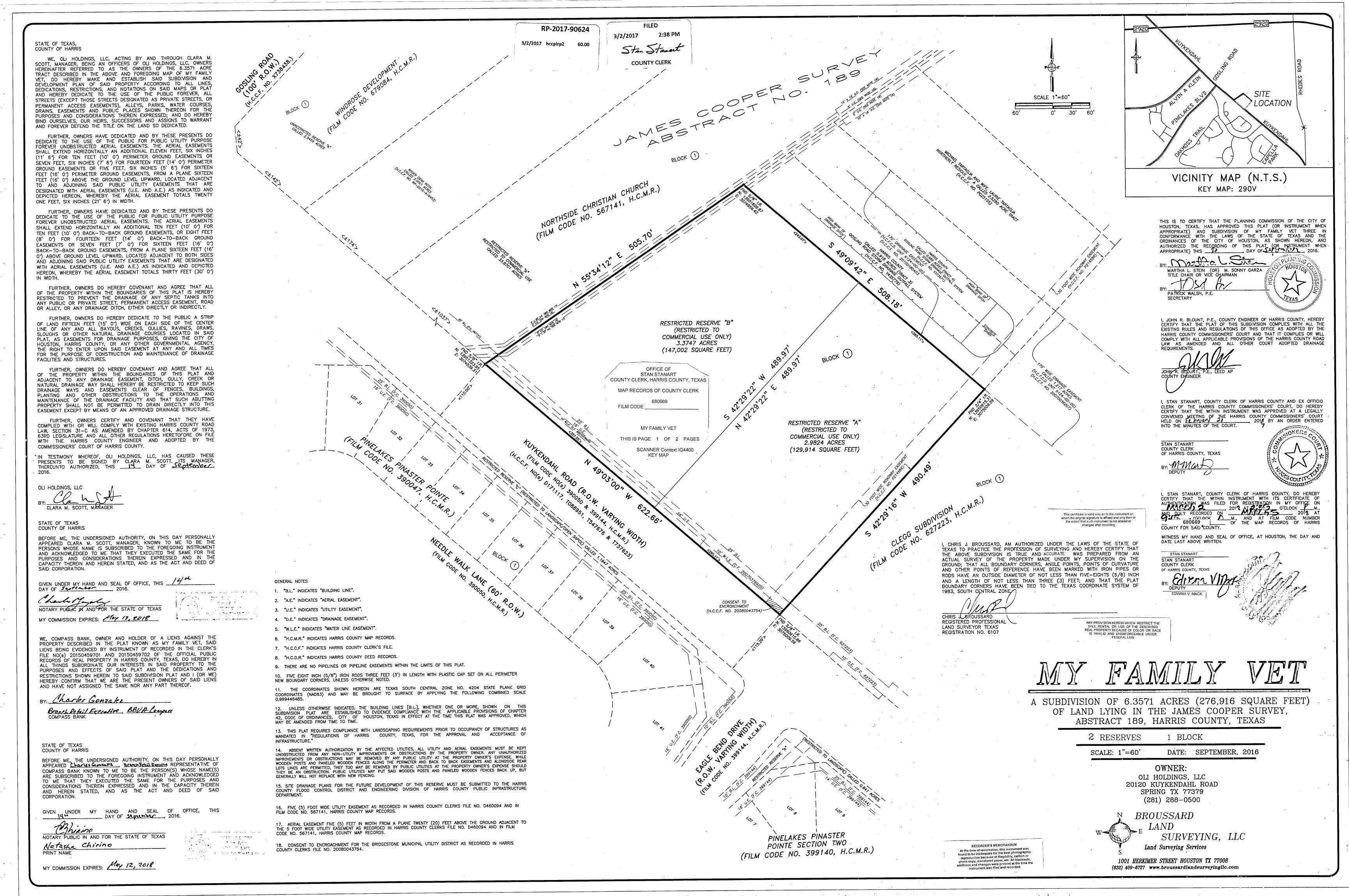


VICINITY MAP

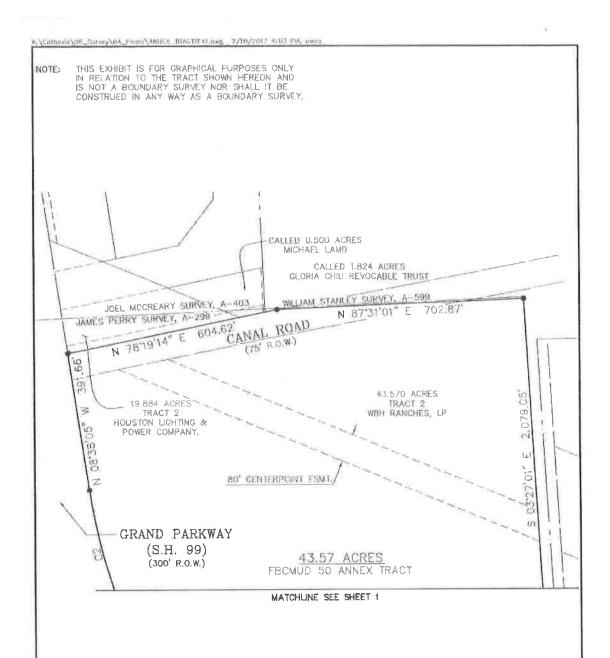


LOCATION MAP

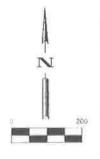

SUBJECT: Homeowner Agreement for 2015 Flood Mitigation Assistance Home Elevation Project between the City of Houston and the property owner at 4419 Meyerwood Drive, Houston, Texas 77096-4202 for the disbursement of funds from the Texas Water Development Board under the FEMA Flood Mitigation Assistance Grant.

RECOMMENDATION: **(SUMMARY)** Adopt an ordinance approving and authorizing a Homeowner Agreement for the 2015 Flood Mitigation Assistance Home Elevation Project between the City of Houston and the property owner at 4419 Meyerwood Drive, Houston, Texas 77096-4202 and disburse funds.

PROJECT NOTICE/JUSTIFICATION: The 2015 Flood Mitigation Assistance Grant for 42 flood-prone homes was awarded to the City of Houston on the behalf of the homeowners. On September 28, 2016, City Council passed Ordinance No. 2016-0735 approving an agreement between the City of Houston and Texas Water Development Board for administering the Grant and to receive funds as sub-applicant from the Texas Water Development Board for reimbursement of the cost to complete the elevation of the flood-prone homes up to \$14,846,975.92 for 42 approved homes.

<u>DESCRIPTION</u>: This project consists of elevating the home at least 12-inches above the base flood elevation.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 499 (the "District") was created through the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality ("TCEQ") in 2007. The District consists of 298.8 acres within Harris County and is located in the vicinity of West Lake Houston Parkway and Atascocita Road and is along the west side of Lake Houston. The District is entirely within the corporate limits of the City.

On February 11, 2009, City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2009-88 approving a Utility Functions and Services Allocation Agreement (the "Agreement") whereby the District would construct approximately \$26,929,273 of water, wastewater, and storm drainage improvements and convey them to the City as they were completed, and the City would participate in the costs of the

improvements in the amount of \$6,255,917. Ordinance No. 2009-88 appropriated \$6,255,917 from the Combined Utility System General Purpose Fund for the Agreement, with the intent that the Combined Utility System General Purpose Fund be reimbursed with bond proceeds from the Water and Sewer System Consolidated Construction Fund.

On July 12, 2017, the District submitted its first payment request to the City in the amount of \$1,977,993, which the City paid from the Combined Utility System General Purpose Fund. 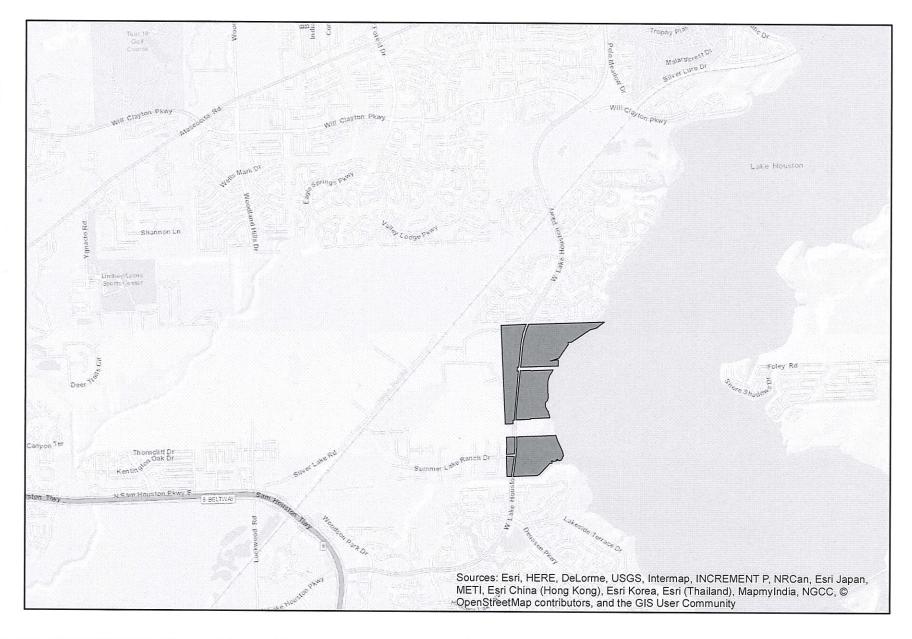
