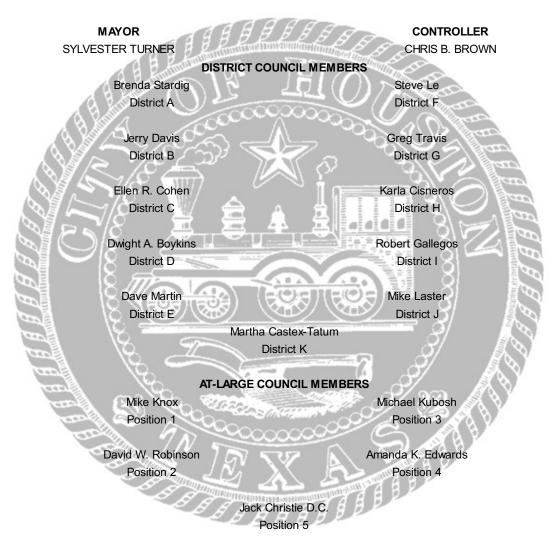

PROJECT NOTICE/JUSTIFICATION: This project is part of the City's Capital Improvement Program to increase the safety, chemical capacity, reliability and the efficiency of operations at the East Water Purification Plant.

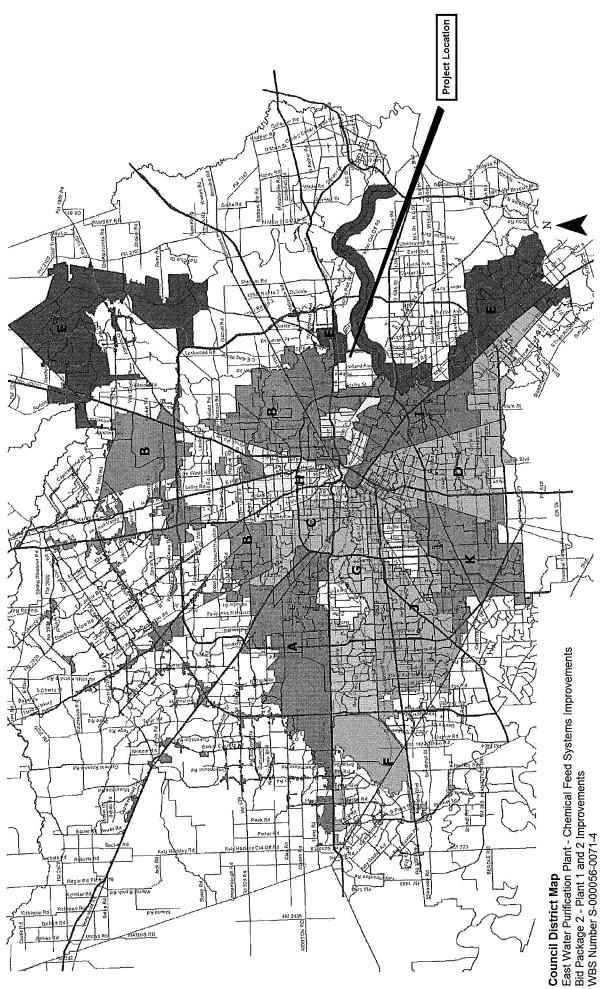


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Area Map

- The FY19 FY23 CIP Budget totals \$12,289,000 and includes provisions for the design and construction of sidewalks, intersection improvements, pedestrian mobility improvements, street reconstruction, and concrete panel replacements.
- The FY19 Operating Budget includes \$4,789,000 for capital expenditures and \$116,600 for administration and overhead. The Authority must advise the Chief Development Officer of any budget amendments. Adjustments to the budget of \$400,000 or more require City Council approval.

• The FY19 Operating Budget has a municipal services charge of \$507,330.

Background:

SUBJECT: Ordinance approving the Fiscal Year 2019 Operating Budget for the Fifth Ward Redevelopment Authority and a Fiscal Years 2019 – 2023 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) Budget for Reinvestment Zone Number Eighteen, City of Houston, Texas (Fifth Ward Zone).

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: City Council adopt an ordinance approving the Fiscal Year 2019 Operating Budget for the Fifth Ward Redevelopment Authority and a Fiscal Years 2019 - 2023 CIP Budget for Reinvestment Zone Number Eighteen, City of Houston, Texas (Fifth Ward Zone).

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The Administration has undertaken a comprehensive review of the proposed FY19 TIRZ budgets and recommends approval of the FY19 Operating Budget for the Fifth Ward Redevelopment Authority (Authority) and the FY19 – FY23 CIP Budget for Reinvestment Zone Number Eighteen (Zone).

- Total Operating Budget for FY19 is \$9,020,397 which includes \$562,750 for required fund transfers and \$8,457,647 for Project Costs.
- The FY19 Operating Budget includes \$7,243,047 in Developer Reimbursements primarily funded by the General Land Office (GLO).
- The FY19 FY23 CIP Budget for the Zone totals \$2,505,000 for affordable housing (land acquisition, design, and construction), sidewalks, cultural facilities, historic preservation and community parks.
- The FY19 Operating Budget includes \$1,000,000 for capital expenditures and \$92,800 for administration and overhead.
- The FY19 Budget provides for the transfer of \$194,876 to the City's Housing and Community Development Department for Affordable Housing.

- The Authority must advise the Chief Development Officer of any budget amendments. Adjustments to the budget that exceed the lesser of \$400,000 or 5% of Project Costs require City Council approval.
- The FY19 operating budget does not have a municipal service charge.

Background:

S78-H27687.A4 – Approve an ordinance amending ordinance no. 2012-0897 (Passed by City Council on October 10, 2012) to increase the maximum contract amount from \$3,255,000.00 to \$3,555,000.00 for an Interlocal Agreement between the City of Houston and Harris County, Texas for the cost of operation and maintenance of the Joint Radio Maintenance Facility for Houston Information Technology Services.

Specific Explanation:

The Chief Information Officer and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve an amending ordinance to increase the maximum contract amount from \$3,255,000.00 to \$3,555,000.00 to allow the City to pay for 50% of the cost of operation and maintenance of the Join Radio Maintenance Facility through an Interlocal Agreement (ILA) between the City of Houston and Harris County, Texas for Houston Information Technology Services (HITS).

The ILA (OA 4600011832) was originally awarded by City Council on October 10, 2012, per Ordinance No. 2012-0897, the City of Houston and Harris County entered into an ILA to co-locate each parties radio shop equipment and personnel in a facility located at 2318 Greens road. The agreement includes the acquisition of land, construction of the facility, operation, and maintenance responsibilities of the joint facility. Both City and Harris County own 50% of the land and the improvements. The facility houses a Network Operations Center as well as repair and maintenance for all Harris County and City of Houston public safety and general government radios. Subsequent to City Council's approval of the Ordinance to initiate the contract, Ordinances have been approved as follows:1) October 9, 2013, per Ordinance No. 2013-0896, City Council approved a first amendment to amend certain terms of the agreement and to increase the maximum contract amount to \$3,205,000.00 2) April 1, 2015, per Ordinance terms, 3) May 25, 2016, per Ordinance No. 2016-0378, City Council approved a second amendment to amend the Agreement to clarify insurance terms, 3) May 25, 2016, per Ordinance No. 2016-0378, City Council approved a third amendment to amend the Agreement to add provisions and guidelines for shared services and to increase the maximum contract amount to \$3,255,000.00 to pay for the cost of operation and maintenance of the Joint Radio Maintenance Facility.

SUBJECT: Petition for the City's consent to the addition of three tracts of land totaling 47.0800 acres to Harris County Water Control and Improvement District No. 159 (Key Map No. 365 V, 366 S, T).

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Petition for the City's consent to the addition of three tracts of land totaling 47.0800 acres to Harris County Water Control and Improvement District No. 159 be approved.

<u>SPECIFIC EXPLANATION</u>: Harris County Water Control and Improvement District No. 159 was created through the TCEQ in 2007 for the purposes of providing stormwater drainage and recreational facilities. The district currently consists of 3,109.06 acres within Harris County and is within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City. This district shares a boundary south of Bridgeland Creek Parkway with Harris County Water Control and Improvement District No. 157 that cuts through existing single family residential lots, and other parcels. In order to shift the shared boundary of the district to follow major roadways, the district has petitioned the City for consent to add three tracts of land totaling 47.0800, to the district. Vacant property is proposed to be developed as single family residential, open space/roads, and detention/amenity lakes. The proposed annexation tracts are located in the vicinity of Langham Creek, Grand Parkway, Cypress Creek, and Fry Road. The addition of land to the district will not release it from the City's extraterritorial jurisdiction.

The Utility District Review Committee has evaluated the application with respect to wastewater collection and treatment, potable water distribution, storm water conveyance, and other public services.

The proposed annexation tracts will be served by Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 489 which is provided with wastewater collection and treatment by the Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 418 Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant. This regional plant also provides wastewater treatment to Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 418 and Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 418. A Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 419. A Harris County Municipal District No. 489.

The nearest major drainage facility for Harris County Water Control and Improvement District No. 159 is Cypress Creek, which flows into Spring Creek, then to the San Jacinto River, and finally into Lake Houston. A portion of proposed annexation tract 3 (6.37 acres) is in the 500 year floodplain. Proposed annexation tracts 1 & 2 (13.99 & 26.72 acres, respectively) are not in the 100 or 500 year floodplain.

By executing the Petition for Consent, the district has acknowledged that all plans for the construction of water conveyance, wastewater collection, and storm water collection systems within the district must be approved by the City of Houston prior to their construction.

The Utility District Review Committee recommends that the subject petition be approved.

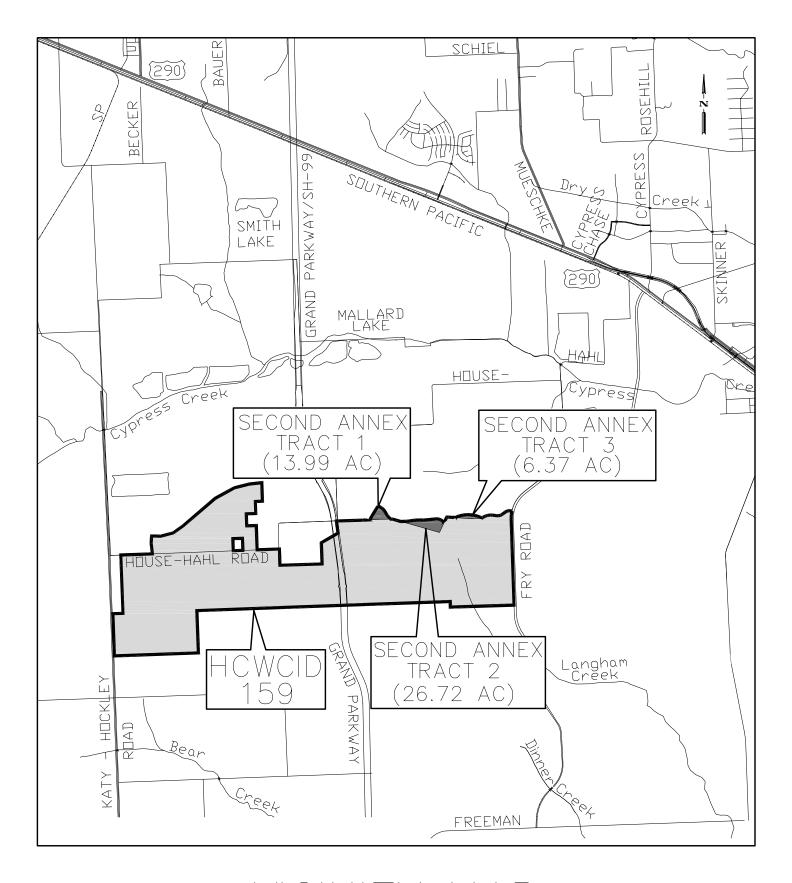

PREVIOUS HISTORY AND SCOPE: City Council approved the original contract with Arcadis

U.S. Inc. on August 17, 2011 under Ordinance 2011-0717 for the professional engineering services contract for this Pump and Lift Station Renewal and Replacement project. The scope of services under the original contract consisted of Basic Services Phase I – Preliminary Design, Phase II – Final Design, and Phase III – Construction Phase Services and various Additional Services.

PREVIOUS HISTORY AND SCOPE: City Council approved the original contract with Arcadis U.S. Inc. on August 17, 2011 under Ordinance 2011-0717 for the professional engineering services contract for this Pump and Lift Station Renewal and Replacement project. The scope of services under the original contract consisted of Basic Services Phase I – Preliminary Design, Phase II – Final Design, and Phase III – Construction Phase Services and various Additional Services.

An additional appropriation was approved on December 19, 2017 under Ordinance 2017-1002 for the Phase III Engineering Services costs associated with Change Order No. 2 for Lift Station Renewal and Replacement Consolidation of Post Oak, Stablewood and Buckingham Lift Stations.

During construction phase of the Gulfway Lift Station, the project encountered unforeseen conflicts between gas pipelines and the proposed gravity line necessary for the abandonment of the Gulfway Lift Station. Section 26.04 (e) of the Tax Code requires that the Effective Tax Rate and the Rollback Tax Rate be reported to the governing body of each taxing unit. The Effective Tax Rate of Tax Year 2018 is \$0.613782 on each \$100 of taxable value and the Rollback Tax Rate is \$0.645886 on each \$100 of taxable value.

No Public Hearings

Section 26.05(d) of the Tax Code requires the City of Houston to hold two public hearings before adopting a tax rate that exceeds the rollback rate or the effective tax rate, whichever rate is lower. Since the City of Houston proposed a tax rate that does not exceed the rollback rate or the effective rate, the public hearings are not required.

Publications

Section 140.010 of the Local Government code requires the City of Houston to publish the effective, preceding year's, and proposed tax rates before adopting a tax rate. Publication is required in a newspaper and Internet website of the municipality.

Summary

City Council must pass a motion to place a specific proposed tax rate on future City Council Agenda. The City Council meeting to vote on the proposed tax rate may occur following the publication on September 20th but may not be later than October 20th.

The proposed tax rate of \$0.588310 on each \$100 taxable value must be apportioned between Maintenance and Operations (M&O) and Interest and Sinking Fund (I&S). The M&O rate is

\$0.419242 on each \$100 of taxable value and the I&S rate is \$0.169068 on each \$100 of taxable value which, when combined, equal the total tax rate of \$0.588310 on each \$100 of taxable value.

It is therefore recommended that City Council adopt the recommendation of the Director of the Finance Department that the Effective Tax Rate for Tax Year 2018 is \$0.613782 on each \$100 of taxable value and the Rollback Tax Rate is \$0.645886 on each \$100 of taxable value and place the proposed tax rate of \$0.588310 of each \$100 of taxable value for Tax Year 2018 on the Agenda of City Council for October 10th.

The proposed tax rate of \$0.588310 on each \$100 taxable value must be apportioned between Maintenance and Operations (M&O) and Interest and Sinking Fund (I&S). The M&O rate is \$0.419242 on each \$100 of taxable value and the I&S rate is \$0.169068 on each \$100 of taxable value which, when combined, equal the total tax rate of \$0.588310 on each \$100 of taxable value which.

It is therefore recommended that City Council adopt the recommendation of the Director of the Finance Department that the Effective Tax Rate for Tax Year 2018 is \$0.613782 on each \$100 of taxable value and the Rollback Tax Rate is \$0.645886 on each \$100 of taxable value and place the proposed tax rate of \$0.588310 of each \$100 of taxable value for Tax Year 2018 on the Agenda of City Council for October 10th.

I hereby verify that the proposed tax rate for tax year 2018 of .58831 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation will comply with the property tax revenue restrictions of Proposition 1 and the City of Houston Code of Ordinances.

Subject: No Tag Memo – Agenda item to propose the tax rate and provide for publication of the notice

On August 29, 2018, the City approved Motion 2018-0438, which appoints the City's representatives to calculate and publish the City's Proposed Tax Rate, Effective and Rollback Tax Rates.

Per Texas Local Government Code 140.010 a municipality must provide Notice to the Public no later than the later of September 1st or the 30th day after receipt of the certified roll, which is September 20, 2018.

In order to allow additional time to resolve the challenge of the population estimate with the U.S. Census Bureau, the publication of the Notice is scheduled on September 20th. At this time, the City has not gotten an official response from the U.S. Census Bureau on the population challenge, therefore the proposed tax rate is based on the May 24th published U.S. Census population data.

The current proposed tax rate complies with Propositions 1 and H and is in compliance with the schedule prescribed in the Texas Tax Code.

Finance will submit to Council on September 19th the Proposed Tax Rate, Effective and Rollback Tax rates and its intent to consider a tax rate on October 10th.

City Council must pass a motion proposing the Tax Rate to meet the statutory deadline to publish Notice of September 20th, 2018, otherwise the item would be moot.

It is respectfully requested that this item not be tagged to adhere to the State Statute.
