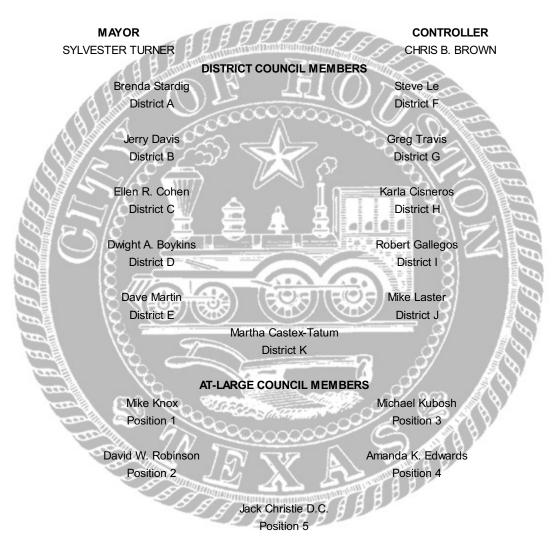

Background: RECOMMENDATION:

Pass a motion approving membership fees in Airports Council International-North America (ACI-NA) for the calendar year 2019 in the amount of \$152,220.00.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

Airports Council International (ACI) is the trade association of airport owners and operators worldwide. Headquartered in Montreal, Canada, ACI has 641 members operating 1,953 airports in 176 countries. ACI is comprised of five geographical regions: Africa, Asia-Pacific, Europe, Latin America/Caribbean, and North America. The North America region, which includes Canada and the United States, is represented by ACI-NA, based in Washington, D.C. ACI-NA airport members enplane 95% of all domestic and virtually all the international airline passenger and air cargo traffic in North America.

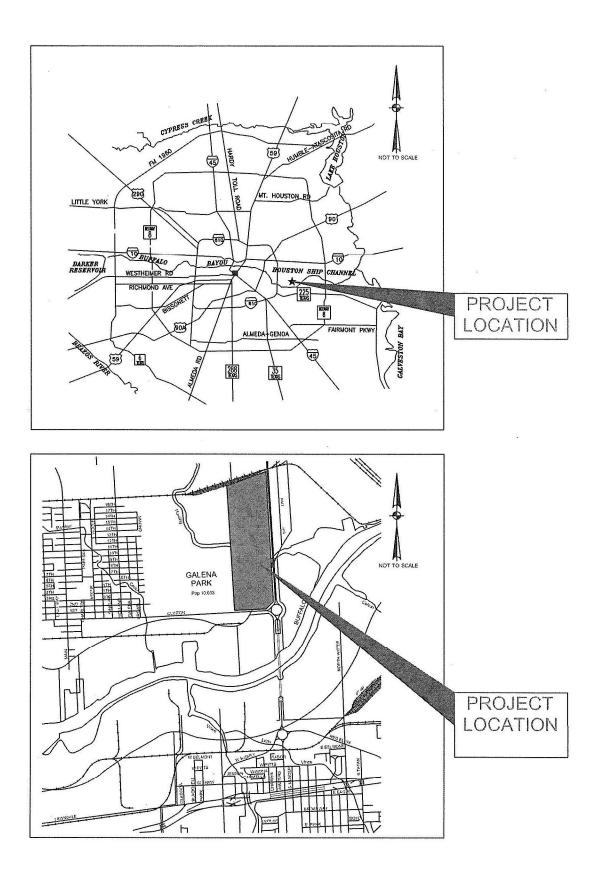

ORDINANCE AMENDING BY REPLACING ARTICLE VII OF CHAPTER 28 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, HOUSTON, TEXAS, HAZARDOUS ENTERPRISES ORDINANCE, in its entirety; adding provisions relating to variance, notice procedures and variance application fee; containing findings and other provisions relating to the foregoing subject; declaring certain conduct unlawful and providing for a penalty therefore; providing for severability

Background:

The Planning and Development Department (P&D) recommends City Council adopt an ordinance amending Chapter 28, Article VII related to Hazardous Enterprises. P&D collaborated with the Houston Fire Department and the Legal Department on the proposed amendments to improve the Code based on observations from administrating the ordinance over the past two decades. It is important to note that the distance requirements are in addition to other existing rules governing hazardous material, including the Construction Code, the Fire Code, and applicable state and federal laws and regulations. There are no changes to those other rules by this action.

The proposed changes will:

- 1. Clarify and strengthen enforcement language.
- 2. Expand the definition of Sensitive Use from child care facility, healthcare facility, or school to also include a library, church, or public park.
- 3. Expand the definition of Enterprise to include any use, regardless of the location on a tract.
- 4. Allow a Restricted Permit for a designated portion of a building, if the designated area of the building is constructed with concrete masonry unit or reinforced concrete walls and meets applicable local, state, and federal rules and requirements associated with the use.
- 5. Clarify the notification procedure and add notification requirements for the new variance process.
- 6. Establish a process where, upon receiving a recommendation from the Fire Marshal, P&D Director, and city engineer, the Planning Commission may grant a variance if the application meets the following criteria:
 - a. documentation supplied by the applicant in the application and at the hearing supports the granting of the variance;
 - b. strict application or enforcement of the requirements of the Code would result in unnecessary hardship or be contrary to sound public policy due to the existence of unusual characteristics that affect the tract, building, or structure in question;

- c. granting of the variance is not solely based on economic reasons, nor is the need for the request created by the applicant;
- d. result in substantial justice being done;
- e. the manufacturing, processing, generation, storage, or use of the hazardous material is not reasonably expected to pose a hazard to human health or the environment;
- f. applicant has established appropriate mitigation and safeguards, including, but not be limited to additional containment infrastructure, monitoring requirements, or operational procedures, will be provided and maintained at the facility;
- g. public notice was provided in accordance with the Code;
- h. the application supports and maintains the intent and general purposes of this article; and
- i. the granting of the variance is not reasonably expected to be injurious to the public health, safety, or welfare, established by evidence presented in the application and at the hearing.
- 7. Establish a fee to recover costs associated with: 1) the review and consideration of a variance request application, 2) property owner notification, and 3) investigation of work performed without proper approval.
- 8. Remove language regarding "registrations" related to the 1996 effective date of the ordinance.
- 9. Allow for minor technical amendments to clarify the ordinance language.

The new variance process creates a necessary process where the City can consider unique circumstances of a project such as specific mitigation and safeguards of the hazardous material.

The proposed changes were released for public consideration and comment in July 2017. P&D presented the amendments to the City Council Public Safety and Homeland Security Committee on March 8, 2018 and revised the proposed language to extend the notification period from 20-days to 30-days based on Council Member input during the Committee consideration. There were no significant comments or objections.

ORDINANCE **AMENDING SECTION 44-5 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES** relating to tax relief for the restoration or preservation of historic sites; making findings and containing other provisions relating to the foregoing subject; containing a savings clause; providing for severability

Background:

Chapter 44, Section 44-5 allows for certain ad valorem tax exemptions for the rehabilitation and restoration of properties that have been designated Landmarks, Protected Landmarks, or Contributing Structures located within historic districts. The investment must be at least 25% of the value of the historic structure and focused on restoration and rehabilitation, in accordance with the list of qualified expenses identified in the Code of Ordinances.

The amendment sets forth two tiers of exemptions:

Exemption equals Qualified Expenditures:

If the said qualifying expenditures are at least 25 percent but less than 100 percent of the base value, then the exemption for each tax year on the assessed value of the structure shall be equal to the amount of the qualifying expenditures; and

Exemption equals the HCAD value on January 1 of the next year:

If qualified expenses are 100 percent or more of the base value of the improvements, then the exemption for each tax year shall be:

- for single-family residential properties that are not within Qualifying Census Tracts, the exemption shall be equal to the qualifying expenditures; or
- for properties other than single-family residential properties and all properties within a Qualifying Census Tracts, the exemption shall be 100 percent of the assessed value of the historic structure or improvements not including the value of any land associated with this historic site.

For purposes of this section, Qualifying Census Tracts means any population census tract if either:

(1) the poverty rate for such tract is at least 20 percent; or

(2) the median family income for such tract does not exceed 80 percent of the metropolitan area median family income.

For purposes of this section, Qualifying Census Tracts means any population census tract if either:

(1) the poverty rate for such tract is at least 20 percent; or

(2) the median family income for such tract does not exceed 80 percent of the metropolitan area median family income.

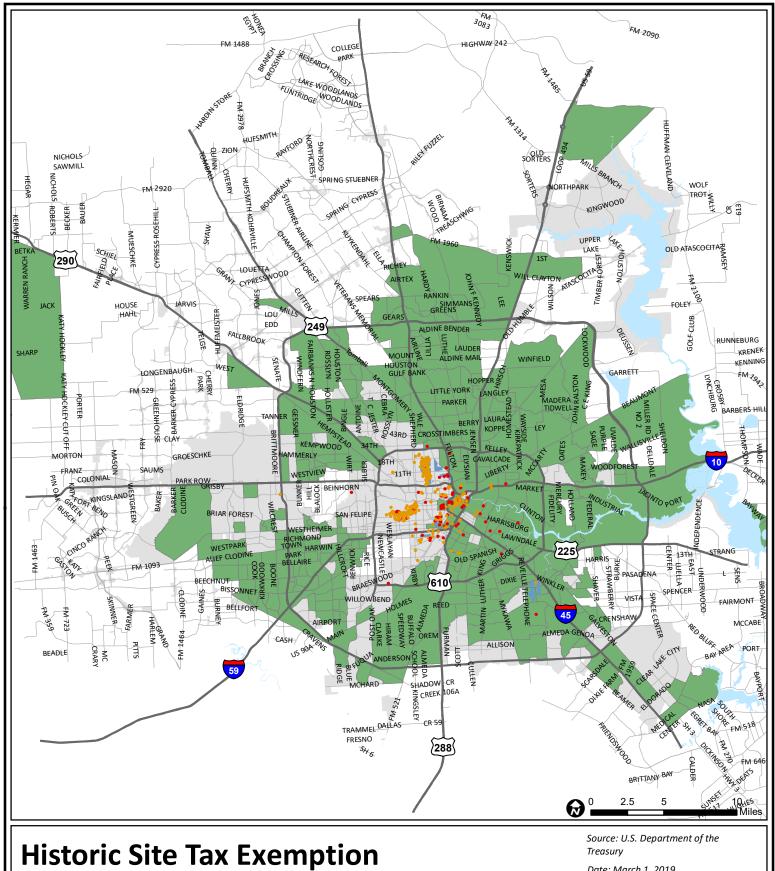

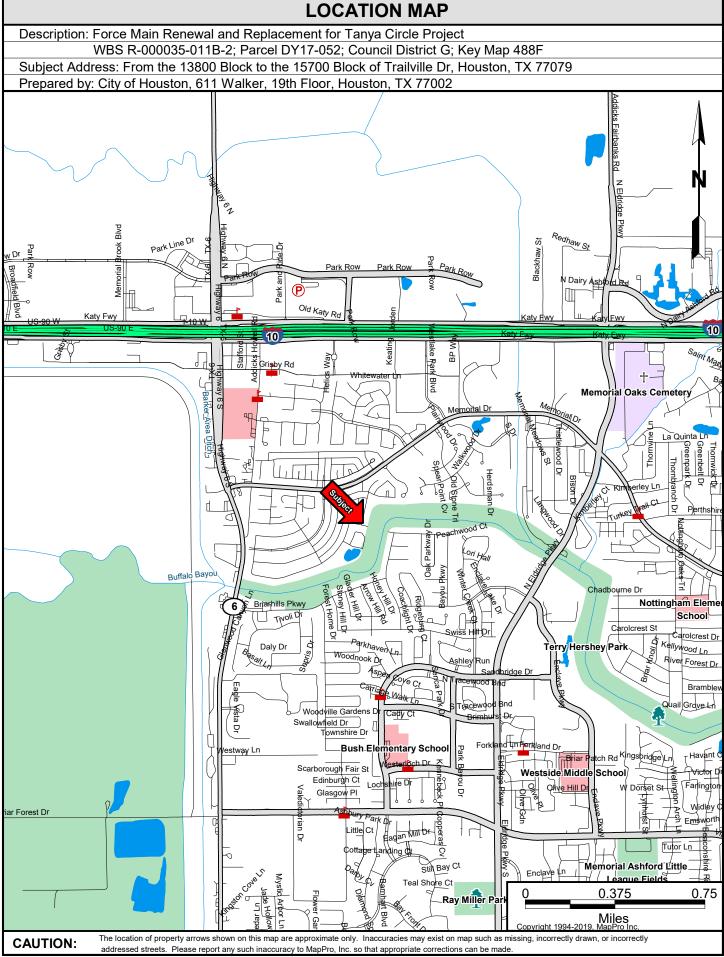

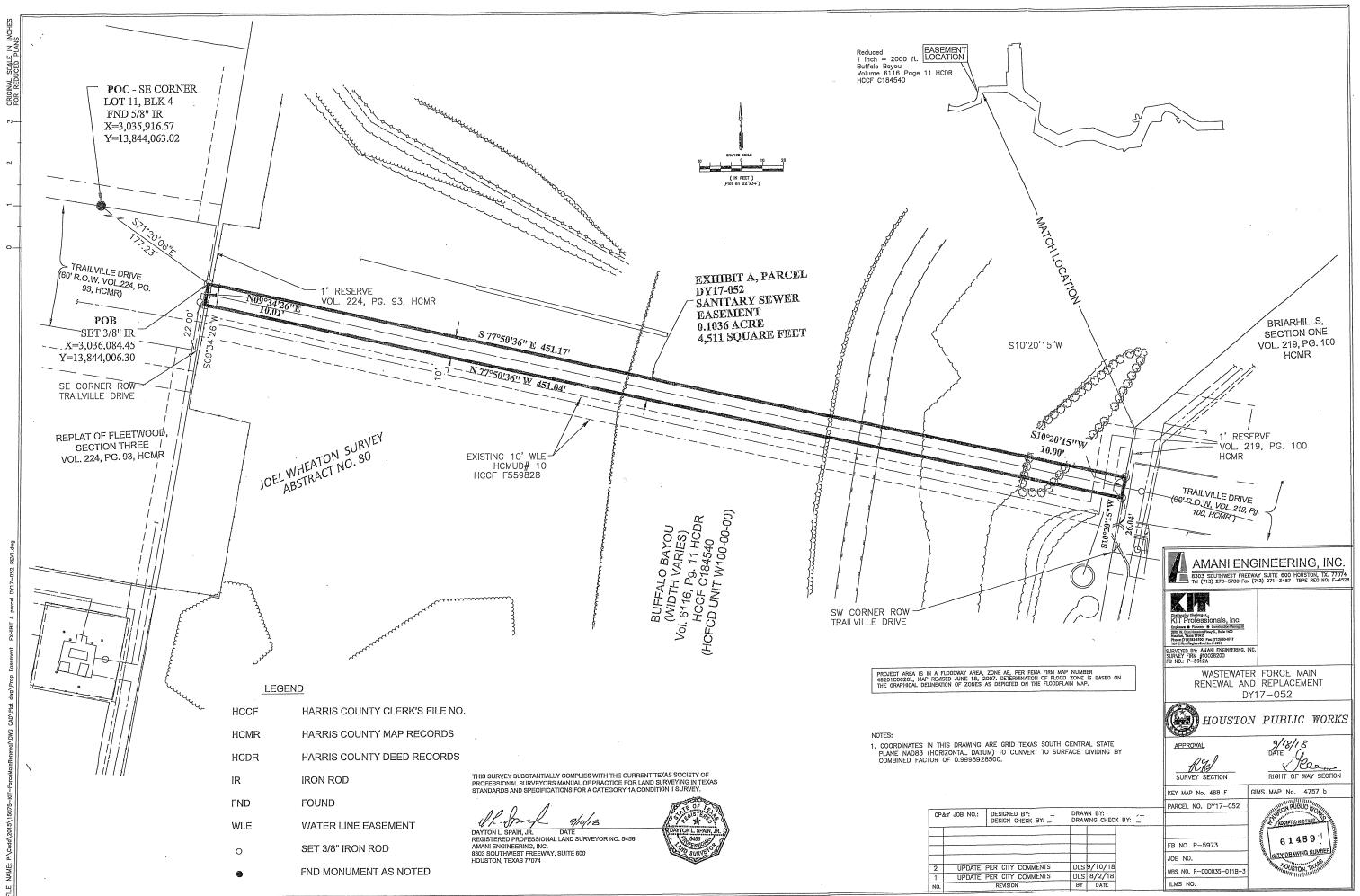

The Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department (ARA) recommends that City Council adopt an ordinance authorizing participation with other Entergy Texas, Inc. (Entergy) service area cities in matters concerning Entergy before the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC or Commission). Entergy provides electric service to approximately 450,000 Texas retail customers. Entergy serves approximately 1,800 customers in the Kingwood area — 1,500 residential and 300 commercial customers. The City of Houston (City) exercises original jurisdiction over the rates, operations and services of Entergy under the provisions of the Public Utility Regulatory Act for customers within city limits.

The City participates in numerous Entergy administrative and litigated proceedings, including contested cases related to utility-initiated rate adjustment filings, as a member of the Steering Committee of Cities (the Coalition), a group of similarly situated cities with Entergy customers within their city limits. Coordinating efforts maximizes the efficient use of resources and expertise in reviewing, analyzing, and investigating Entergy's filings. Several proceedings are anticipated for the 2019 calendar year, including requests for rate revenue increases through incremental cost recovery mechanisms such as the Distribution Cost Recovery Factor (DCRF).

Houston ratepayers continue to benefit from participation in the Coalition. In the 2018 full base rate proceeding, Entergy Coalition member cities were instrumental in settling Entergy's base rate request. As a result of the settlement, the company agreed to an approximate \$4.3 million rate decrease, rather than the initially requested \$117.5 million increase in rates. Coalition intervention in the 2011/2012 full base rate proceeding led to an approximate \$88 million reduction to Entergy's proposed requested rate increase — \$112 million utility proposed increase versus the \$24 million Commission awarded increase.

Adoption of the ordinance ensures the City's continued participation in the Coalition for the remainder of the 2019 calendar year. Therefore, ARA recommends Council adopt an ordinance authorizing participation with other Entergy service area cities in matters concerning Entergy Texas, Inc. before the PUC during calendar year 2019.

Several proceedings are anticipated for the 2019 calendar year, including requests for rate revenue increases through incremental cost recovery mechanisms such as the Distribution Cost Recovery Factor (DCRF).

Houston ratepayers continue to benefit from participation in the Coalition. In the 2018 full base rate proceeding, Entergy Coalition member cities were instrumental in settling Entergy's base rate request. As a result of the settlement, the company agreed to an approximate \$4.3 million rate decrease, rather than the initially requested \$117.5 million increase in rates. Coalition intervention in the 2011/2012 full base rate proceeding led to an approximate \$88 million reduction to Entergy's proposed requested rate increase — \$112 million utility proposed increase versus the \$24 million Commission awarded increase.

Adoption of the ordinance ensures the City's continued participation in the Coalition for the remainder of the 2019 calendar year. Therefore, ARA recommends Council adopt an ordinance authorizing participation with other Entergy service area cities in matters concerning Entergy Texas, Inc. before the PUC during calendar year 2019.

Background:

Specific Explanation:

The Director of the Administration and Regulatory Affairs (ARA) Department and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve an ordinance appropriating **\$629,899.00** out of the Reimbursement of Equipment/Projects Fund (1850) and an amending ordinance to increase the contract amount from **\$13,885,322.00** to **\$17,436,830** for the Contract between the City of Houston and T2 Systems Canada, Inc. for the purchase of parking meter multi-space, solar pay station warranties, spare parts, and pay station purchase price options for the Administration and Regulatory Affairs (ARA) Department.

The reimbursement of Fund 1850 will come from parking meter revenues collected in ARA's Parking Management Special Revenue Fund 8700. In FY19, Parking Management is projected to generate about \$20.5 million in meter revenue, parking fines and permit fees of which \$7 million is deposited into the General Fund. The additional spending authority is requested for warranties, communications, hosting and spare parts for FY20 and FY21 and Phase V meters (if necessary). Seventy-one percent (71%) of the contract allocation is dedicated to capital purchases and 29% is for maintenance and operations covering nine fiscal years (FY12 to FY21). The average annual operating costs for the pay stations under this contract is \$565,871.00 per fiscal year.

It is the Administration and Regulatory Affairs Department's intent to return to Council periodically to appropriate the Reimbursement of Equipment/Projects Fund (1850).

This contract was awarded February 1, 2012 by Ordinance No. 2012-0096 for a five year contract term, with one successive one-year term in the original amount of \$7,279,501.00. On October 21, 2015, by Ordinance 2015-1036, the maximum contract amount was increased from \$7,279,501.00 to \$13,885,322.00 and the term was extended to expire five years after the first amendment countersignature date to allow for a complete replacement and technology upgrade of the City's parking meter fleet as the meters reach their end of life. Phase 1 (276 pay stations) was deployed in March 2016, Phase II (291 pay stations) was completed in December 2016, and Phase III (276 pay stations) was completed in the Summer of 2018.

Phase IV pay stations will be new additions to the ParkHouston pay station inventory. These meters will be deployed to manage parking in the following unmetered locations; Museum Park (34), Memorial Park (18), East Downtown (10), Midtown (10) and spares for replacements (10). Should Phase V meters be necessary, this will be subject to a stakeholder engagement process.

The new pay stations offer the "extend-by-phone" feature, which allows a customer to enter their cell phone number at the meter pay station to receive text alerts and pay for additional parking when paying by credit card. They also feature "pay-by-plate" functionality, which will eliminate the need for customers to pay and return to their vehicle to display a physical receipt on their dashboard. Under "pay-by-plate", Parking Compliance Officers will receive notifications in their handheld units that a vehicle has paid using the plate number when a receipt is not displayed. Improved financial controls include electronic locks on the collection cabinet that are programmable to track who is opening the meter pay station at any time.

This purchase will be funded by Fund 1850 (Reimbursable) for capital expenses. The table below breaks down contract cost by fiscal year.

Specific Explanation:

The Director of the Administration and Regulatory Affairs (ARA) Department and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve an ordinance appropriating **\$629,899.00** out of the Reimbursement of Equipment/Projects Fund (1850) and an amending ordinance to increase the contract amount from **\$13,885,322.00** to **\$17,436,830** for the Contract between the City of Houston and T2 Systems Canada, Inc. for the purchase of parking meter multi-space, solar pay station warranties, spare parts, and pay station purchase price options for the Administration and Regulatory Affairs (ARA) Department.

The reimbursement of Fund 1850 will come from parking meter revenues collected in ARA's Parking Management Special Revenue Fund 8700. In FY19, Parking Management is projected to generate about \$20.5 million in meter revenue, parking fines and permit fees of which \$7 million is deposited into the General Fund. The additional spending authority is requested for warranties, communications, hosting and spare parts for FY20 and FY21 and Phase V meters (if necessary). Seventy-one percent (71%) of the contract allocation is dedicated to capital purchases and 29% is for maintenance and operations covering nine fiscal years (FY12 to FY21). The average annual operating costs for the pay stations under this contract is \$565,871.00 per fiscal year.

It is the Administration and Regulatory Affairs Department's intent to return to Council periodically to appropriate the Reimbursement of Equipment/Projects Fund (1850).

This contract was awarded February 1, 2012 by Ordinance No. 2012-0096 for a five year contract term, with one successive one-year term in the original amount of \$7,279,501.00. On October 21, 2015, by Ordinance 2015-1036, the maximum contract amount was increased from \$7,279,501.00 to \$13,885,322.00 and the term was extended to expire five years after the first amendment countersignature date to allow for a complete replacement and technology upgrade of the City's parking meter fleet as the meters reach their end of life. Phase 1 (276 pay stations) was deployed in March 2016, Phase II (291 pay stations) was completed in the Summer of 2018.

Phase IV pay stations will be new additions to the ParkHouston pay station inventory. These meters will be deployed to manage parking in the following unmetered locations; Museum Park (34), Memorial Park (18), East Downtown (10), Midtown (10) and spares for replacements (10). Should Phase V meters be necessary, this will be subject to a stakeholder engagement process.

The new pay stations offer the "extend-by-phone" feature, which allows a customer to enter their cell phone number at the meter pay station to receive text alerts and pay for additional parking when paying by credit card. They also feature "pay-by-plate" functionality, which will eliminate the need for customers to pay and return to their vehicle to display a physical receipt on their dashboard. Under "pay-by-plate", Parking Compliance Officers will receive notifications in their handheld units that a vehicle has paid using the plate number when a receipt is not displayed. Improved financial controls include electronic locks on the collection cabinet that are programmable to track who is opening the meter pay station at any time.

This purchase will be funded by Fund 1850 (Reimbursable) for capital expenses. The table below breaks down contract cost by fiscal year.

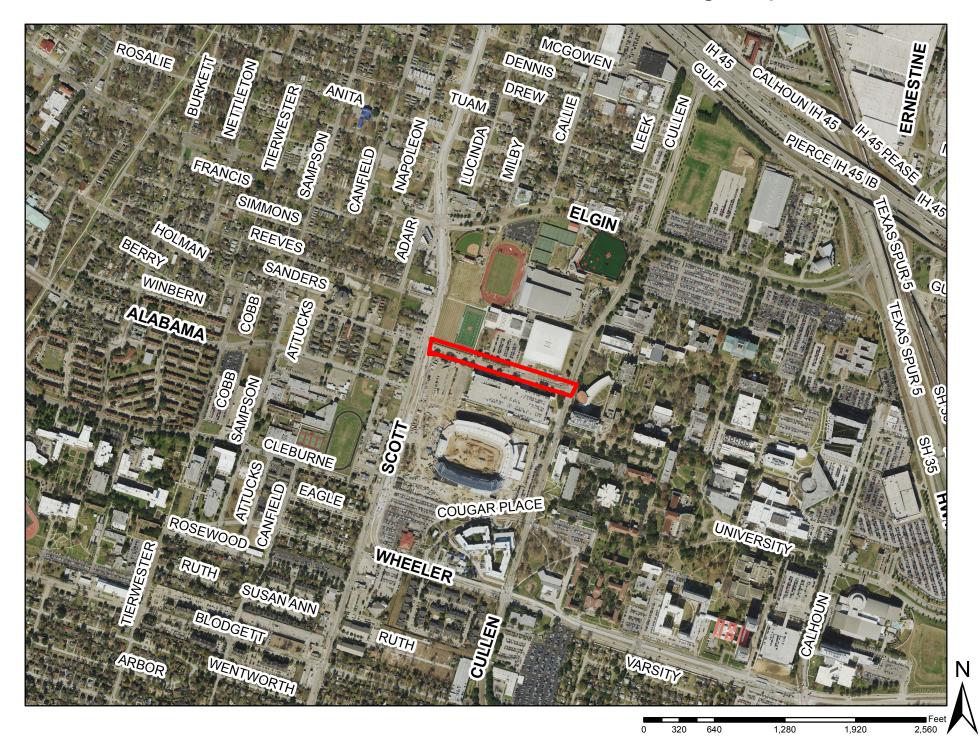

Dear Mr. Walsh:

Pursuant to Ord. 2014-364, the University of Houston (the "University") requests the City of Houston to re-name the portion of Holman Street between Cullen and Scott Street within the University of Houston campus ("UH Holman"). Our check for an ordinance application fee is enclosed in the amount of \$648.53.

The University wishes to recognize and commemorate the substantial contributions of the late Judge Roy M. Hofheinz, Sr., to the University and to Houston. There are currently no streets, buildings, or city monuments named for Judge Hofheinz, a man whose public service greatly advanced the city. Judge Hofheinz was one of Houston's most creative entrepenurs, and served our community as a state legislator, as the Harris County Judge, and as the Mayor of Houston. He envisioned and developed the Houston Astrodome, Astroworld, and many other significant properties. He provided crucial moral leadership to Houston by prohibiting racial discrimination in public areas several years before other cities. He was instrumental to the development of the University of Houston, helping it become a part of the Texas state system and raising money for several of its significant buildings. The University is asking for a small portion of Holman Street to be renamed in Judge Hofheinz's honor. The portion to be renamed terminates on the University campus and is wholly within its boundaries. If the renaming is approved, Holman Street west of Scott Street will continue to keep its name. As shown below, all the requirements for renaming this small portion of Holman have been met:

- 1. The University's campus completely abuts the relevant portion of Holman Street, therefore the University owns property on both sides of UH Holman, as required by Ord. 2014-364.
- 2. The complete length of UH Holman will be included in the name change.

- 3. The University, together with the Hofheinz family, has selected "Hofheinz Plaza" as the new name for UH Holman. This name was selected by the University to honor Judge Hofheinz, who served our community as a state legislator, Harris County Judge, and Mayor of Houston. Judge Hofheinz's life contributed beyond measure to the advancement of the City of Houston and the University of Houston. The proposed street name complies with the City of Houston's Naming Procedures and Standards set forth in Section 41-22, as amended by Ord. No. 2014-364, including Section 41-22(a)(9) and (a)(10). If the name "Hofheinz Plaza" will not work for the City, we propose the alternative name "Hofheinz Place".
- 4. For ease of reference, I include a survey depicting UH Holman.

Background:

Request for Proposal received July 19, 2018 for S83-T26618 – Approve an ordinance authorizing a contract between the City of Houston and Cigna Health and Life Insurance Company for pharmacy benefit management and administration services for City of Houston employees, retirees, and eligible dependents.

Specific Explanation:

The Director of Human Resources Department and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve an Ordinance authorizing an award for a **five (5) year contract with two (2) one-year options** to **Cigna Health and Life Insurance Company** (CIGNA) for pharmacy benefit management services. The City of Houston's Human Resources Department has elected to proceed with the traditional rebate option for the pharmacy benefits management needs, which imposes no monthly administrative fee per member for the duration of the contract. The Director of Human Resources Department and/or Chief Procurement Officer may terminate the contract at any time upon one-hundred and eighty (180) days written notice to the contractor.

The Scope of Work requires the contractor to provide pharmacy benefit management services, which include managing the entire process inclusive of claims processing, administrative services, formulary reporting, rebate management, management of specialty drugs, network management and reporting.

Currently, the City has four (4) different self-funded plan designs: Consumer Driven Health Plan (CDHP), Open Access Plan (OAP), Limited EPO Plan and Retirees of Texas Option Plus Plan (RTOP), of which the RTOP will be discontinued effective May 1, 2019. These plans differ by deductible, copayment or coinsurance.

The Request for Proposal (RFP) was advertised in accordance with the State of Texas bid laws, and

thus, submittals were received from seven (7) firms: CIGNA, United Healthcare, CVS Healthcare, Envision Rx. Blue Cross Blue Shield of Texas. Script Care and Express Scripts. The Evaluation

Committee consisted of Voting and non-Voting members. The Voting members were comprised of individuals from the Human Resources Department and Finance Department. The non-Voting members consisted of individuals from the Human Resources Department, Fire Department, Municipal Courts and Segal Consulting. The evaluation was based upon the following criteria:

- 1. Responsiveness of Proposal
- 2. Technical Competence
- 3. Price Proposal

Cigna Health and Life Insurance Company received the highest overall score and was deemed to be the best qualified vendor to perform the requirements as outlined in the RFP.

This item was presented to Council Committee on Budget & Fiscal Affairs on January 8, 2019.

Summary:

ORDINANCE approving and authorizing an Administrative Services Agreement for Third-Party Administrator for Self-funded Pharmacy Benefits Management Services, effective May 1, 2019, between the City of Houston and CIGNA HEALTH AND LIFE INSURANCE COMPANY, for the Human Resources Department

Background:

Request for Proposal received July 19, 2018 for S83-T26618 – Approve an ordinance authorizing a contract between the City of Houston and Cigna Health and Life Insurance Company for pharmacy benefit management and administration services for City of Houston employees, retirees, and eligible dependents.

Specific Explanation:

The Director of Human Resources Department and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve an Ordinance authorizing an award for a five (5) year contract with two (2) one-year options to Cigna Health and Life Insurance Company (CIGNA) for pharmacy benefit management services. The City of Houston's Human Resources Department has elected to proceed with the traditional rebate option for the pharmacy benefits management needs, which imposes no monthly administrative fee per member for the duration of the contract. The Director of Human Resources Department and/or Chief Procurement Officer may terminate the contract at any time upon one-hundred and eighty (180) days written notice to the contractor.

The Scope of Work requires the contractor to provide pharmacy benefit management services, which include managing the entire process inclusive of claims processing, administrative services, formulary reporting, rebate management, management of specialty drugs, network management and reporting.

Currently, the City has four (4) different self-funded plan designs: Consumer Driven Health Plan (CDHP), Open Access Plan (OAP), Limited EPO Plan and Retirees of Texas Option Plus Plan (RTOP), of which the RTOP will be discontinued effective May 1, 2019. These plans differ by deductible, copayment or coinsurance.

The Request for Proposal (RFP) was advertised in accordance with the State of Texas bid laws, and thus, submittals were received from seven (7) firms: CIGNA, United Healthcare, CVS Healthcare, Envision Rx, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Texas, Script Care and Express Scripts. The Evaluation Committee consisted of Voting and non-Voting members. The Voting members were comprised of individuals from the Human Resources Department and Finance Department. The non-Voting members consisted of individuals from the Human Resources Department, Fire Department, Municipal Courts and Segal Consulting. The evaluation was based upon the following criteria:

- 1. Responsiveness of Proposal
- 2. Technical Competence
- 3. Price Proposal

Cigna Health and Life Insurance Company received the highest overall score and was deemed to be the best qualified vendor to perform the requirements as outlined in the RFP.

This item was presented to Council Committee on Budget & Fiscal Affairs on January 8, 2019.

MWBE Participation:

The Request for Proposal was issued as a goal-oriented contract with a 6% MWBE participation level. Cigna Health and Life Insurance Company has designated the below-named company as its certified MWBE subcontractor.
