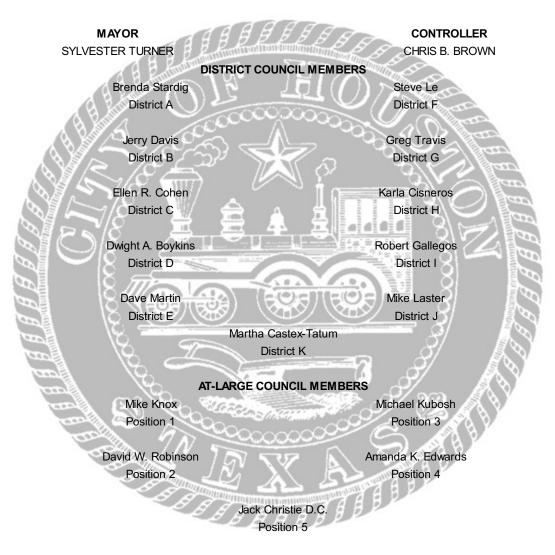

**SUBJECT:** Accept Work for Neighborhood Street Reconstruction (NSR) Project 456.

**RECOMMENDATION:** (SUMMARY) Pass a motion to approve the final Contract Amount of \$13,170,199.70 or 3.36% over the original Contract Amount, accept the Work and authorize final payment.

**PROJECT NOTICE/JUSTIFICATION:** This project was part of the Capital Improvement Plan which replaced existing residential streets that have been deteriorated beyond economical repair and normal maintenance, and improved drainage.

**DESCRIPTION/SCOPE:** This project consisted of neighborhood street reconstruction. The proposed improvements consisted of concrete roadways with curbs, sidewalks and underground utilities, as required. Bury, Inc. designed the project with 660 calendar days allowed for construction. The project was awarded to SER Construction Partners, LLC with an original Contract Amount of \$12,742,572.02.

**LOCATION:** The project area is generally bound by Hammerly on the north, Brittmore Road on the east, IH-10 westbound frontage road to the south and Addicks Dam Road on the west. The project is located in Key Map Grids 449 T, 449 U, 449 X, 449 Y, and 489 B.

**CONTRACT COMPLETION AND COST:** The Contractor, SER Construction Partners, LLC, has completed the work under the subject Contract. 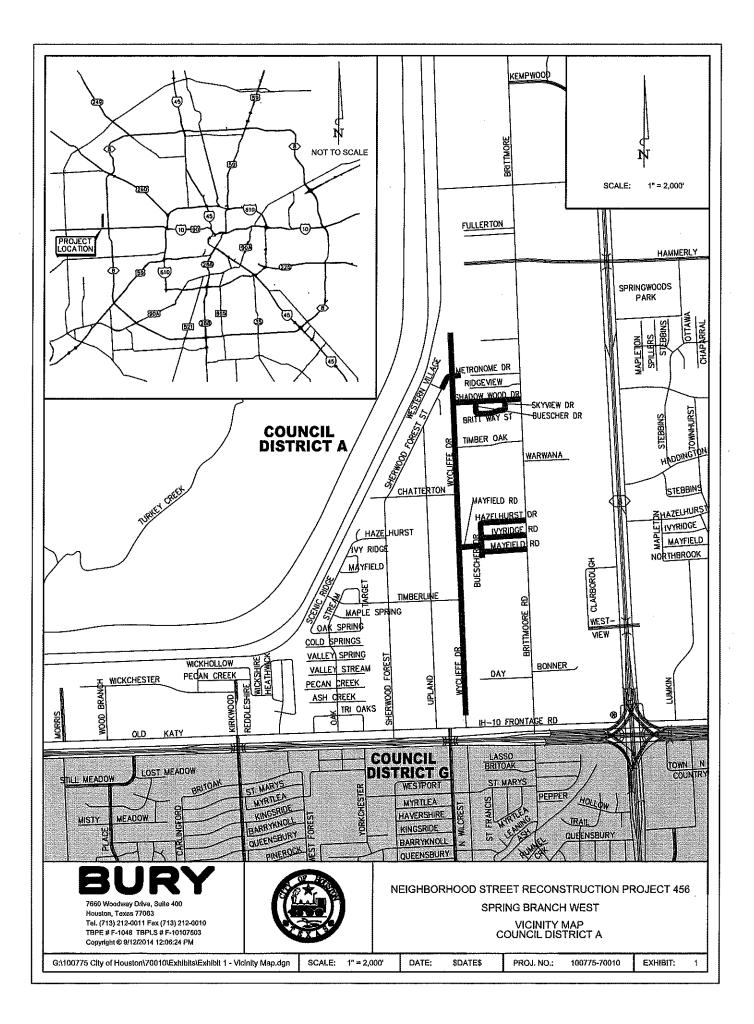

## **Background:**

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve an Ordinance authorizing the issuance of one or more series of City of Houston, Texas Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes, Series 2019 (the "Series 2019 Notes"), approving and authorizing the distribution of a Preliminary Official Statement ("POS") and Official Notice of Sale ("NOS") to be used in connection with the sale of the Series 2019 Notes.

### SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The City's General Fund revenue collections are not evenly distributed throughout the fiscal year. The major revenue source is ad valorem taxes, the largest part of which is collected shortly before the tax delinquency date of February 1st of each year. In order to finance its general operation expenditures each fiscal year, the City borrows against anticipated collection of taxes and revenues to cover temporary cash flow shortages. This request is for City Council's approval to issue Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes for Fiscal Year 2020 in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$400 million.

The Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes are structured in two parts, primarily to allow the City to comply with federal tax laws and arbitrage regulations. The first ordinance will approve the initial borrowing. This initial issuance is sized to comply with the federal tax law exemptions and avoid arbitrage penalties. We currently project that the initial issuance will be between \$150 and \$300 million approximately and this amount, based on preliminary cash flows for FY2020, will continue to be conservatively refined until the pricing in July. The ordinance also authorizes the preparation of the POS and NOS in respect to the competitive sale of the initial Series 2019 Notes. Prior to

distribution, the finance working group will approve and deem final the POS and NOS in conformity with the City's disclosure policies. The closing for the Notes is anticipated to occur in July.

The second ordinance will authorize the Mayor and City Controller to authorize the terms of one or more supplemental borrowings if there are additional cash needs later in the fiscal year. If a supplemental borrowing occurs (not to exceed \$400 million in aggregate for the initial and any supplemental borrowing), the finance working group is authorized to determine certain matters relating to the supplemental borrowing consistent with the terms of this ordinance. The supplemental notes, if issued, would be repaid prior to fiscal year end. The supplemental borrowing option was last utilized in FY 2009, in an amount of \$40 million for Hurricane Ike related expenditures.

For the first borrowing, electronic bids for the Notes are expected to be received on or about July 10, 2019 with the winning bid or bids approved via motion at the City Council meeting. If any bid becomes a leading bid within two minutes prior to the scheduled end of the bidding, the time period for submission of bids will automatically be extended by two minutes from the time that such bid was received. At the close of the bidding period, the Office of the City Controller, Finance Department and the City's Financial Advisors will verify interest rate calculations of bids received and join the City Council session to announce the results.

Since this is a competitive auction, there will not be a necessity for an underwriting team. The Law Offices of Francisco G. Medina are recommended as bond counsel. Holland & Knight LLP is recommended as disclosure counsel and special tax counsel.

The supplemental notes, if issued, would be repaid prior to fiscal year end. The supplemental borrowing option was last utilized in FY 2009, in an amount of \$40 million for Hurricane Ike related expenditures.

The City's usual practice for Tax and Revenue Anticipation Note borrowings is to invite electronic bids for the Notes. Depending on the size of any supplemental borrowing, this might be the method of sale used, or the size might better be handled through a negotiated sale or private placement.

At this time, there is no anticipation that an underwriting team would be necessary (particularly if bidding is used as the method of sale). The Law Offices of Francisco G. Medina are recommended as bond counsel. Holland & Knight LLP is recommended as disclosure counsel and special tax counsel.

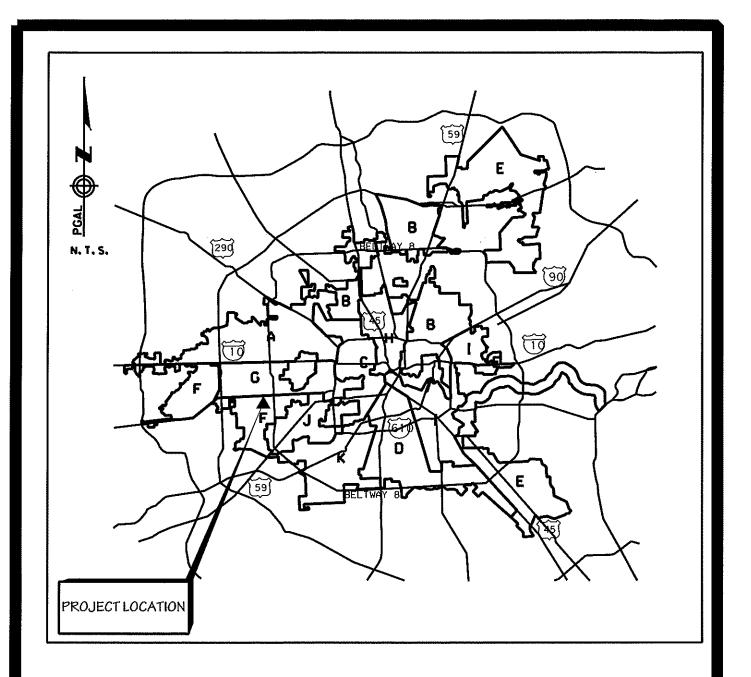

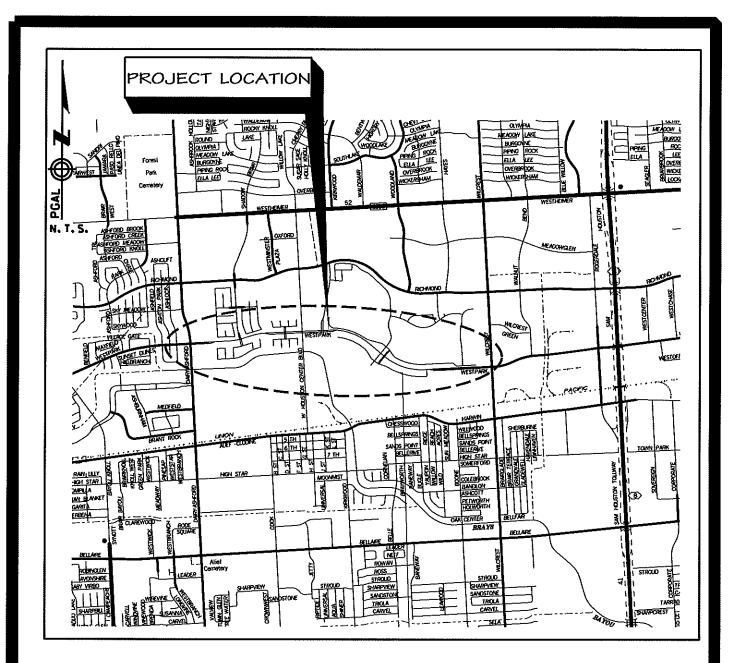

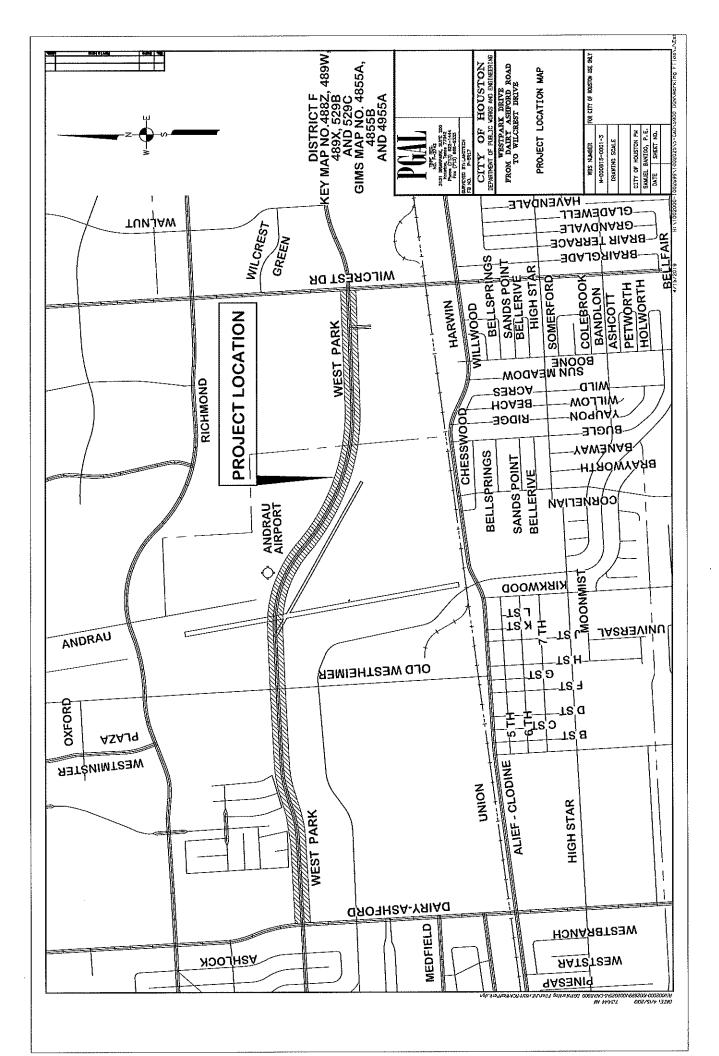

### **Background:**

Approval of an ordinance authorizing the application and acceptance of award for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) FY 2018 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program.

### SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The Houston Fire Department (HFD) requests City Council approve an ordinance authorizing the application and acceptance of award for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) FY 2018 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program in the amount of \$2,701,780 with a cash match of \$405,266 for a total program cost of \$3,107,046.

For the 2018 Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG), HFD proposes two projects; Vehicle Exhaust Extraction Systems project and Blue Card Incident Command training program.

In the prior grant period, HFD was awarded the 2017 AFG to install vehicle exhaust removal systems in our 15 busiest fire stations. To continue to improve the health of its workforce by reducing firefighter exposure to vehicle exhaust, a known carcinogen, HFD is now requesting \$1,800,017 to install vehicle exhaust removal systems at 30 additional fire stations. These fire stations house multiple emergency response vehicles; all of which release toxic fumes throughout the day. These stations are staffed on a 24/7/365 basis. Installation of vehicle exhaust systems are expected to improve the health of emergency response firefighters permanently assigned to staff those stations.

Previously, HFD secured funding from the 2016 AFG to certify every officer and Incident Command Technician in the Blue Card Program. The intent of this program is to address multiple core competencies identified in the National Preparedness Goal through the introduction of the Blue Card Hazard Zone Incident Command Training and Certification Program (Blue Card). The Blue Card program enables HFD to improve upon issues related to fire management and suppression, threat and hazard identification, operational coordination, and operational

communication. As HFD implemented the training and certification process, the need to include our Engineer Operators (EO) became apparent, as EOs are capable of functioning as an officer for HFD. Therefore, HFD is now seeking \$1,307,029 to continue the Blue Card training for 650 EOs and 30 recently promoted officers.

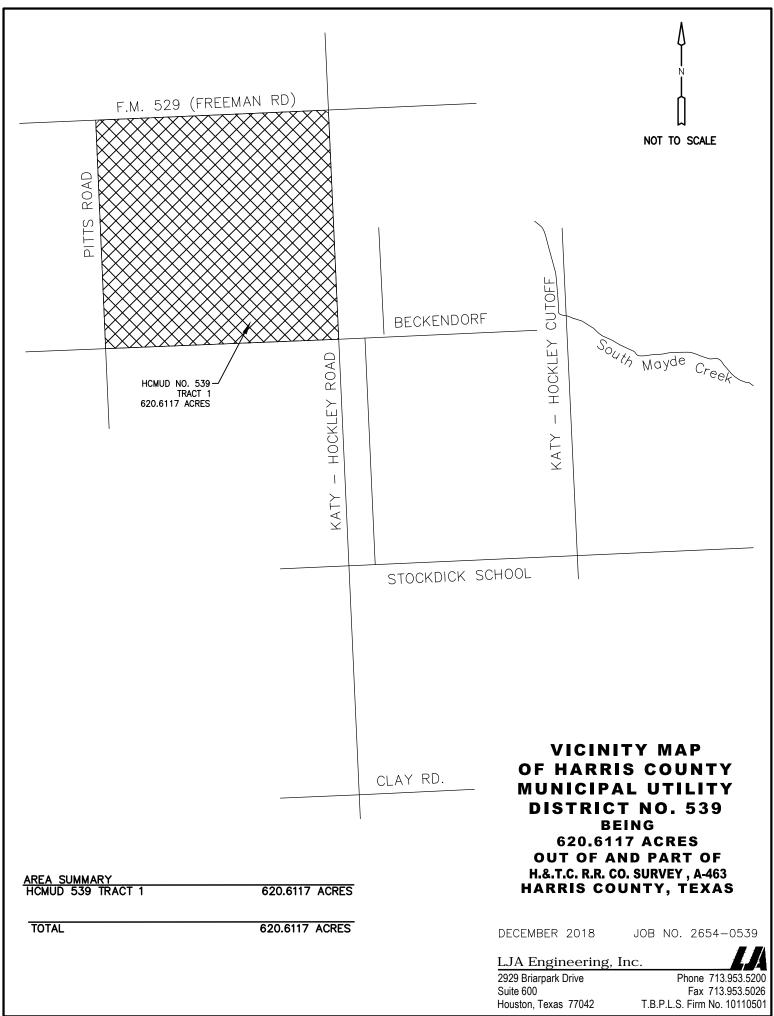

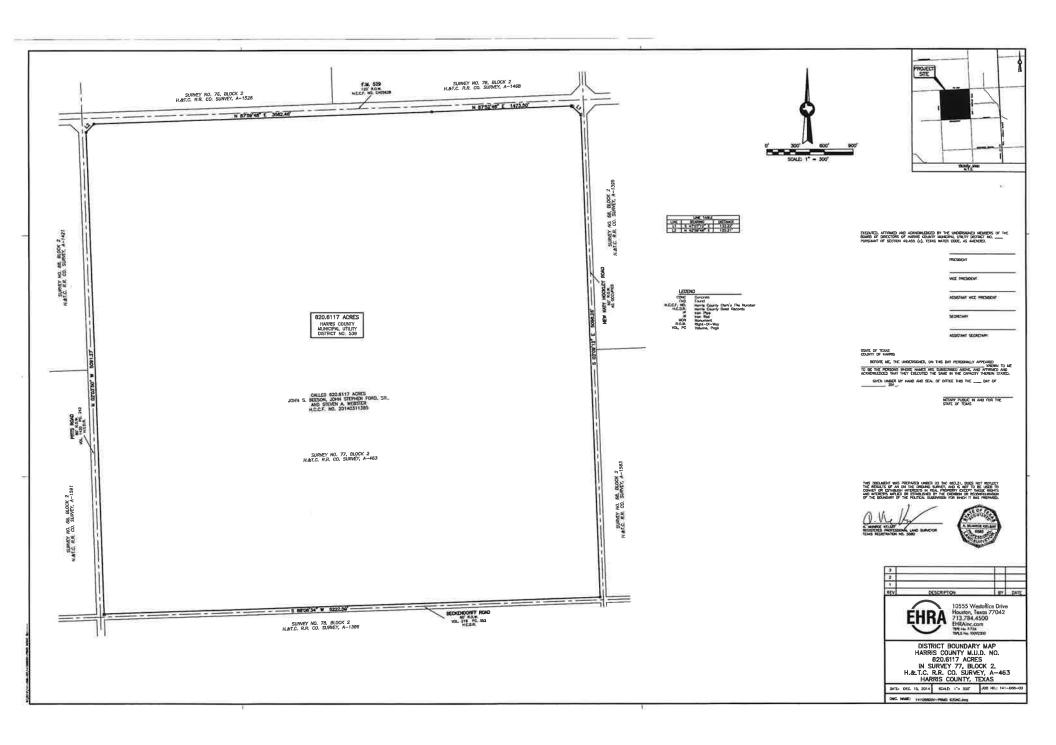

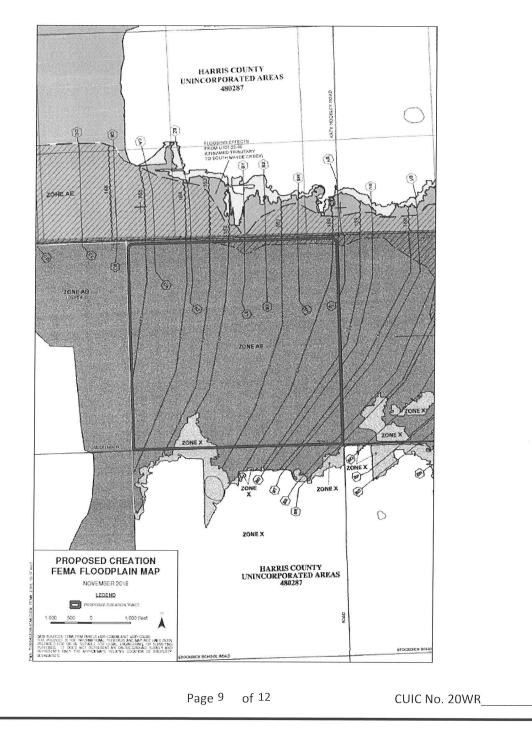
