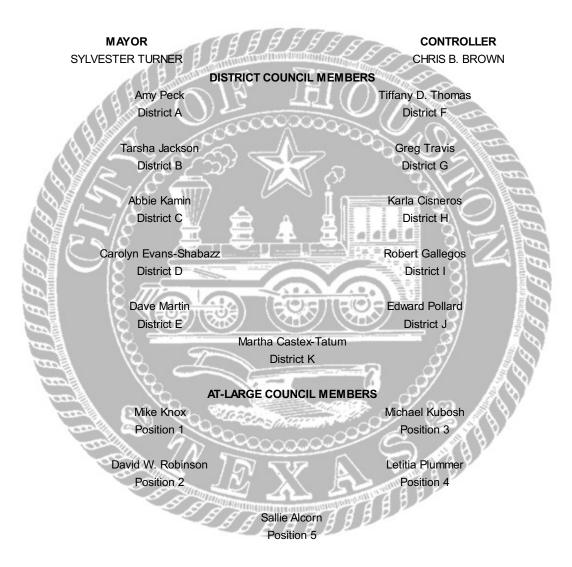

Background:

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a motion authorizing the Mayor and City Controller to award the sale of up to \$75,000,000 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes, Series 2021 (the "Notes") and take any other action required related to the issuance of the Notes, including ratification and confirmation of the use of the Preliminary Official Statement provided to prospective bidders in connection with the offering for sale of the Notes and approval of the preparation and distribution of the Official Statement.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

On August 4, 2021, City Council passed two Ordinances No. 2021-0654; 2021-0670 (the "Ordinances") authorizing the issuance and sale of Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes, Series 2021 (the "Notes"). As in prior years, the proceeds of the Notes will be used to fund General Fund operating expenditures in anticipation of the receipt of ad valorem tax revenues later in Fiscal Year 2022.

On or about September 2, 2021, a Notice of Sale and Preliminary Official Statement was made available to prospective purchasers relating to the offering of up to \$75,000,000 of Notes and requesting the delivery of the bids on September 15, 2021. The bids are received through an auction format described below that allows a broker/dealer to bid for the total principal amount of the Notes or a lesser principal amount; therefore, the "winning bid" may be awarded to more than one firm.

As in prior years, electronic bids for the Notes will be received via Grant Street (a web based auction system) between 8:30 a.m. – 9:00 a.m. Central Daylight Time on September 15, 2021; however, to encourage competitive bidding, if any bid becomes a leading bid (i.e. lowest yield) within two minutes prior to the scheduled end of the bidding, then the time period for submission of bids will automatically extend by two minutes to allow other bidders additional time to consider improving their pricing. At the close of the bidding period, the Office of the City Controller, Finance Department, and the City's financial advisors will verify interest rate calculations of bids received and provide the results to the City Council. Upon receiving the results, City Council is requested to adopt a motion to award the sale to one or more purchasers based on the lowest true interest cost, ratify and confirm the use of the Preliminary Official Statement and authorize the distribution of the Official Statement. It is expected

that the proceeds from the sale of the Notes will be available on Thursday, September 30, 2021.

On May 20, 2020, City Council approved Ordinance No. 2020-440 which amended Chapter 46 and established a provision to allow the mayor to issue declarations and executive orders suspending requirements of Chapter 46 of the Code as appropriate, in a declared disaster. Throughout the pandemic, the mayor issued several of these orders to provide temporary relief to the industry, including extension of permit renewal deadlines; elimination of permit caps; and waiver of taxi color scheme requirements, among others.

The vehicle-for-hire industry in Houston has been decimated by the event cancellations that resulted from the pandemic, as well as the continued growth of the rideshare industry. Accordingly, operators have asked the City to codify many of the relief measures put in place during the pandemic. After reviewing the impact of the temporary measures, ARA is recommending the following: removal of the taxicab permit cap (allowing the industry the ability to expand and contract as needed); reduction of the fee for limousine and charter wheelchair accessible and electric vehicles (to encourage deployment of these vehicles and to provide parity with relief given to the taxicab industry); elimination of taxicab color scheme requirements; elimination of the 180-day waiting period to put a taxicab vehicle in service; elimination of the transferability of taxicab permits; add the proration of taxicab permit fees; and extension of the vehicle service age from 10 years to 15 years.

The proposed Chapter 46 amendments were presented by ARA to the Regulatory and Neighborhood Affairs Committee on August 10, 2021.

This Invitation to Bid (ITB) was advertised in accordance with the requirements of the State of Texas bid laws. The initial estimated quantities included in the bid were decreased after the bids received came in over the budgeted amount planned for this award. The City exercised its right to reduce the estimated quantities after bids were opened and both bidders agreed to hold the line item prices offered in their original bid. TIRZ budgets to be presented to City Council on September 15, 2021 for consideration and approval are listed below:

TIRZ #1 – ST. GEORGE PLACE (DISTRICT G, J) was created to stabilize property values, address deteriorated buildings and incompatible land uses and provide for the design and construction of roadway and streets, public utility systems, sidewalks, landscaping and land acquisition in a district of the City known as St. George Place (formerly known as Lamar Terrace).

The projected incremental property tax revenue is \$5.5M, which comprises \$3.5M from City revenue and \$2.0M from HISD. The FY22 budget is \$19.0M and allocates \$15.9M for project costs. Projects include access management improvements at the intersection of Richmond and Westheimer (\$2.9M), improvements of Anderson Park (\$2.7M), beautification of medians along Richmond Avenue from S Rice to Hillcroft (\$1.0M) and full reconstruction of Beverley Hill, Schumacher, Star Lane from Chimney Rock to Fountain View; and Bering Drive from Westpark to Richmond (\$5.7M). The budget also includes \$3.0M in transfers, the majority of which being for affordable housing (\$1.8M) and educational facilities (\$815K).

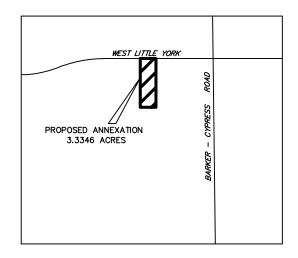
Proposed Annexation of 3.3346 Acres of Land

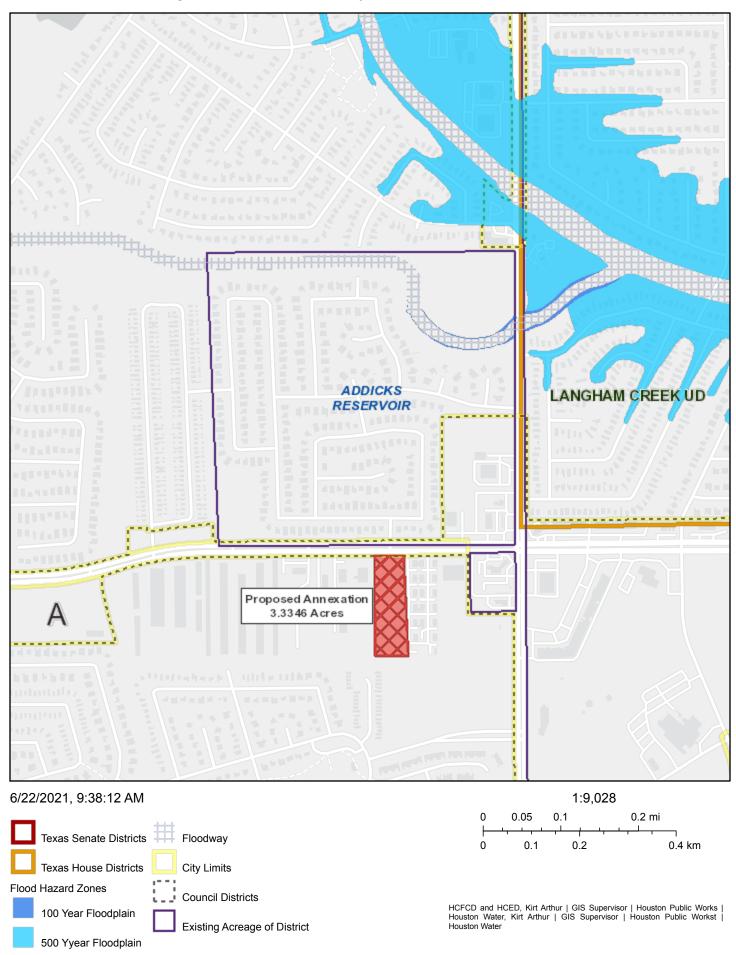


VICINITY MAP

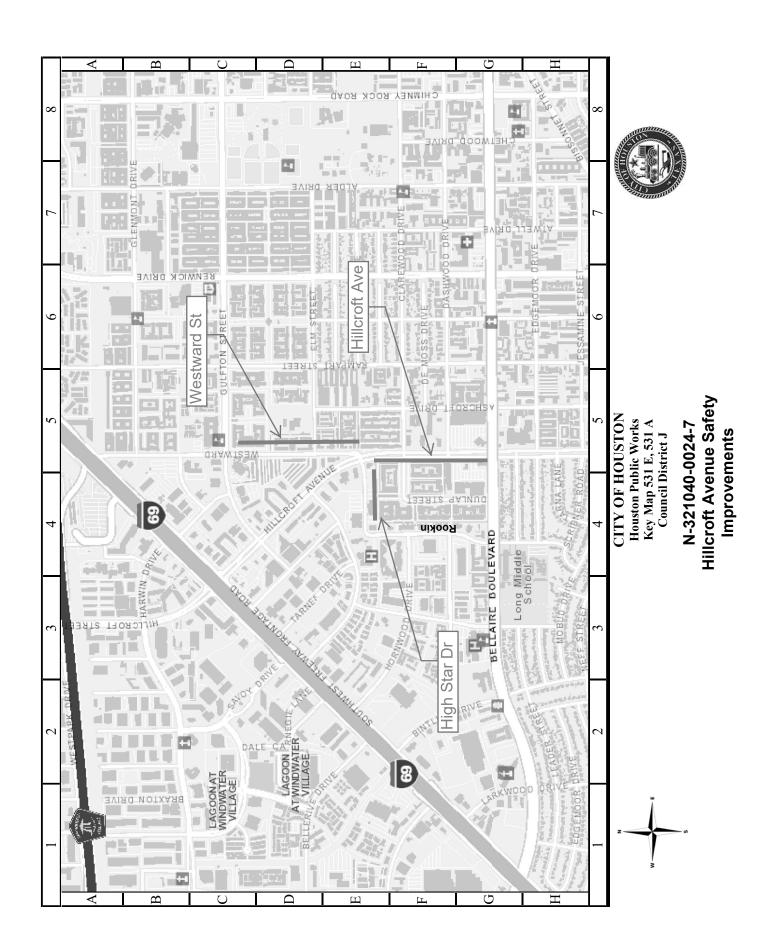

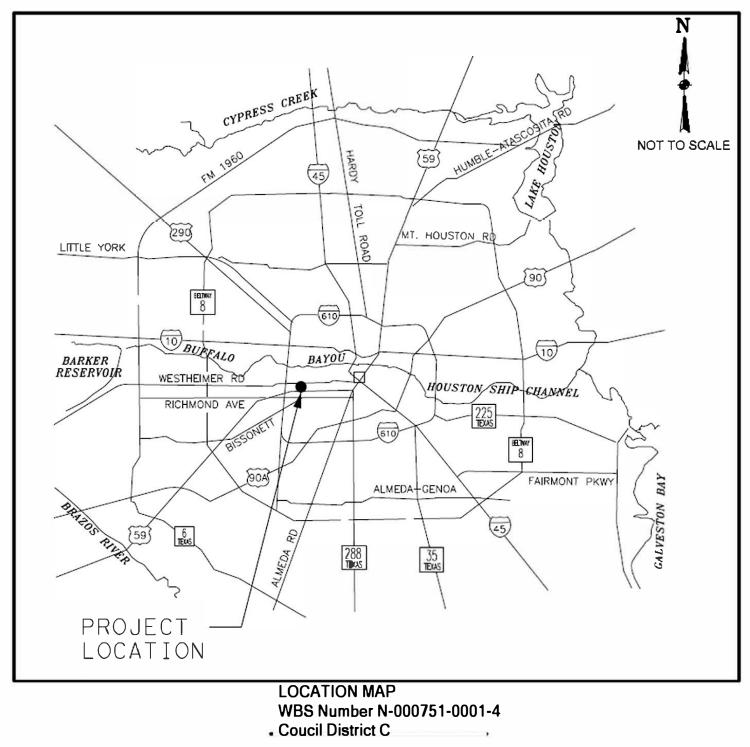

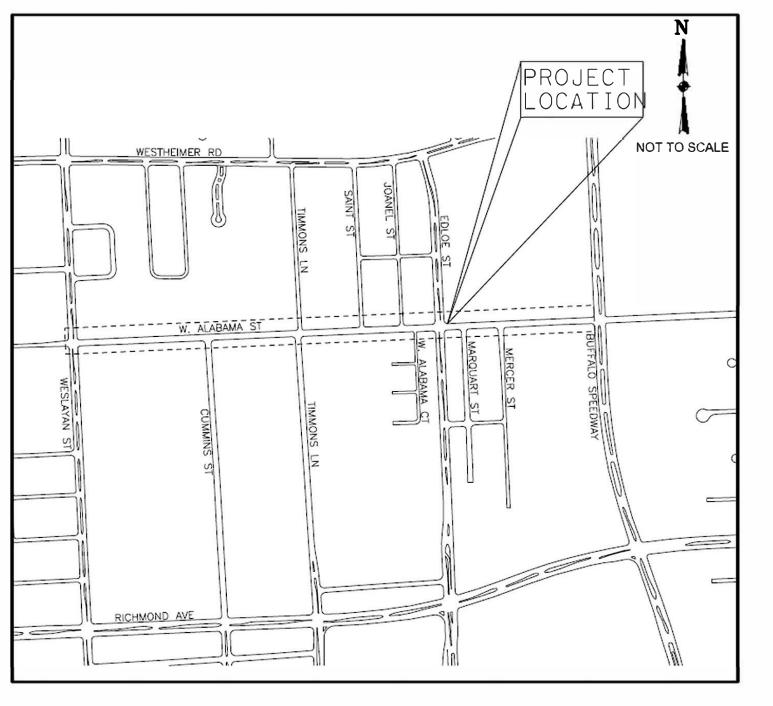

- No subsequent application for additional disaster assistance for any purpose or to repair damage or make improvements of any sort will be made by the recipient to any Federal entity in perpetuity.
- 4. The foregoing covenants and agreements are adopted for, and placed upon the Property, and shall run with the land, be binding upon all parties, now and at any time hereafter. The foregoing covenants may be enforced by Grantee, General Land Office (GLO) or U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) jointly or severally; however, failure, refusal or inability by either Grantee, GLO or HUD, jointly or severally, to enforce any of the foregoing covenants shall in no event be deemed a waiver or release of the right to do so thereafter.

TIRZ budgets to be presented to City Council on *September 8, 2021* for consideration and approval are listed below:

TIRZ #13 – OLD SIXTH WARD (DISTRICT H) was created to provide the mechanisms needed to assist in the repositioning of the historic Old Sixth Ward from a blighted and deteriorated neighborhood into a viable residential community. Proposed public improvements include provisions for the design and construction of roadways and utility systems, parks, land acquisition, historic preservation, cultural and public facilities improvements, environmental remediation, streetscape improvements and public art. The projected incremental property tax revenue is \$2.7M, which comprises \$2.2M from City increment and \$548K from HISD. The FY22 budget is \$3.6M and allocates \$2.2M for project costs: include multimodal improvements along Sawyer street from Washington Avenue to Memorial Drive (\$452K), multi-modal improvements along Edwards street from Sawyer St. to Silver St. (\$368K), and pedestrian crossing improvements on Washington (\$790K). The budget also includes \$1.3M in transfers: affordable housing (\$914K), educational facilities (\$149K), and municipal services (\$143K). The Five-Year CIP (FY22 – FY26) totals \$7.1M.

Projects ADDED for FY22 – FY26:

- Sawyer Street Multimodal Improvements from Washington Avenue to Memorial Drive
- Edwards Street Multimodal Improvements from Sawyer St. to Silver St

TIRZ #18 – FIFTH WARD (DISTRICT B) was created to facilitate the revitalization of the historic Fifth Ward from a blighted and deteriorated neighborhood into a viable residential community with supporting commercial and retail development. Proposed improvements would address inadequate or deteriorated streets, utilities and sidewalks, parks and affordable housing. The FY22 budget is \$5.2M and allocates \$4.7M for project costs. Project costs include reimbursement to developers for infrastructure related to a new affordable and market residential development (\$567K). Projects include acquisition of land to address the "deserts" retail, food and other (\$1.8M) and street and sidewalk improvements (\$1.0M). The budget also includes \$493K in transfers, the majority of which is allocated towards educational facilities (\$116K) and affordable housing (\$306K). The Five-Year CIP (FY22 – FY26) totals \$7.4M.

Projects ADDED for FY22 – FY26:

None

TIRZ #21 – HARDY/NEAR NORTHSIDE (DISTRICT H) was created to provide plans and programs needed to reposition a former Union Pacific rail yard site into a transit-oriented, mixed-use development consisting of affordable housing designs for the construction of roadways and streets, utility systems, parks, hike and bike trails, mobility improvements, land acquisition, environmental remediation, and other community focused enhancements. The projected incremental property tax revenue is \$1.0M, all of which is from City increment. The FY22 budget is \$2.0M and allocates \$1.5M for project costs, of which \$438K is dedicated for various developer reimbursements. Project costs include a hike and bike trail along Pickney Street (\$605K), and parcel acquisition to provide a haven for pedestrians near light rail stops (\$59K). The Five-Year CIP (FY22 – FY26) totals \$820K. The budget also includes \$392K in transfers, the majority allocated to affordable housing (\$341K).
