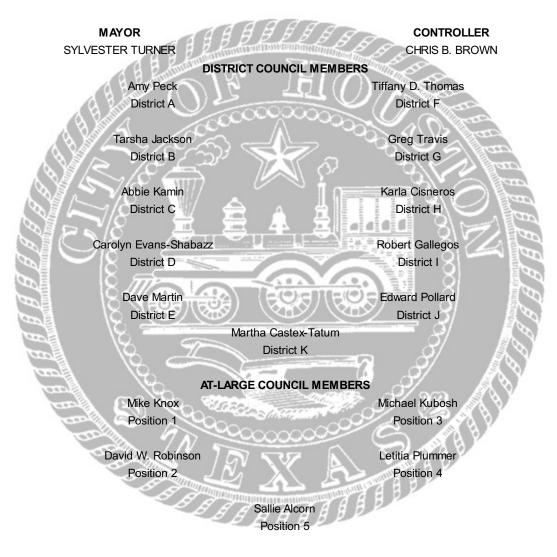

The Housing and Community Development Department (HCDD) recommends Council approval of a n Ordinance authorizing the City of Houston (City) to enter into a contract with the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) and accept \$398,738.00 of Homeless Housing Services Program (HHSP) funds for FY 2022 to address youth homelessness in Houston.

The youth set-aside funding must be used by the City on activities eliminating and/or preventing homelessness in youth-headed households (age 18-24). Specifically allowable activities include essential services, street outreach and transitional living for persons experiencing homelessness in youth-headed households; provision of direct services and case management to persons experiencing homelessness in youthheaded households; or other homelessness-related activities as approved by the TDHCA.

HHSP was established by the 81st Texas Legislature through an appropriations rider and codified during the 82nd Texas legislative session. Through HHSP, the state provides funding to the nine largest cities in Texas in support of services to homeless individuals and families. Cities currently served through HHSP include Arlington, Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, Plano and San Antonio.

An Ordinance allocating the accepted HHSP funds for use by local nonprofit organizations will be presented to Council for consideration in the future.

This contract was subsequently amended on December 4, 2019 by Ordinance No. 2019-0971 to increase the spending authority by \$521,169.40, extend the contract to December 18, 2021, and for implementing 26 additional bike kiosk stations and purchasing of 199 bicycles for kiosk stations. Expenditures as of November 22, 2021 totaled \$4,594,260.20.

The current contract scope of work originally required the contractor to provide all required supervision, labor, materials, tools, equipment, insurance, transportation and expenses necessary for the purchase and installation of 71 bike kiosk stations and 568 bicycles, as specified in the Advanced Funding Agreement with TxDOT. In year-2016, the City was awarded \$3.7 million in federal grant dollars to assist in funding the expansion of the existing City bike-share program

known as Houston B-Cycle. The City's PDD sponsored an application for a grant from the Federal Highway Administration, where the grant reimbursed the City for \$3.5 million for the cost of expanding the system. Houston Bike Share, a local nonprofit that administers Houston B-Cycle, provided the remaining \$880,000.00.

To date, the City and Houston Bike Share have worked together to purchase and install 95 B-Cycle stations and 753 bikes. Grant funded stations are available in 22 neighborhoods and ridership is steadily increasing. This contract extension and spending authority increase are necessary to purchase the last two stations and 14 bikes required by the AFA with TxDOT. The requested increase in spending authority is needed to match the amount of funding available through the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) grant. The extension of the contract with B-Cycle LLC is needed to complete the final purchase of equipment.

For this reason and upon conducting a cost analysis, it was determined that these bikes and added bike kiosk stations, if purchased from other competitors, would not be able to communicate or dock with the existing equipment, of which 95% is owned by the City. It was also deemed cost-prohibitive to uproot and replace all the existing 33 stations with another competitor's versions and models of bike kiosks stations and software. As is, the current bikes interface into the kiosk through a proprietary docking system. Only B-Cycle LLC bicycles fit into a B-Cycle dock. Other off-the-shelf competitor bicycles could not physically dock into a B-Cycle kiosk station. Additionally, all other competing vendors use their own proprietary design, and no two vendors' bicycles are compatible with other bike-share vendors' docks. Lastly, other competitors' software technology cannot interface with the existing bike-share system, and for security measures, B-Cycle LLC utilizes proprietary software and Radio Frequency Identification Devices (RFID) for bicycles, which is essential for communicating with the stations.

For this reason and upon conducting a cost analysis, it was determined that these bikes and added bike kiosk stations, if purchased from other competitors, would not be able to communicate or dock with the existing equipment, of which 95% is owned by the City. It was also deemed cost-prohibitive to uproot and replace all the existing 33 stations with another competitor's versions and models of bike kiosks stations and software. As is, the current bikes interface into the kiosk through a proprietary docking system. Only B-Cycle LLC bicycles fit into a B-Cycle dock. Other off-the-shelf competitor bicycles could not physically dock into a B-Cycle kiosk station. Additionally, all other competing vendors use their own proprietary design, and no two vendors' bicycles are compatible with other bike-share vendors' docks. Lastly, other competitors' software technology cannot interface with the existing bike-share system, and for security measures, B-Cycle LLC utilizes proprietary software and Radio Frequency Identification Devices (RFID) for bicycles, which is essential for communicating with the stations.

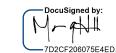

Sections 37-221 through 37-227 of the City of Houston's Code of Ordinances allow cable channels to be made available for Public Educational and Governmental (PEG) programming to be cablecast through the City's PEG channel playback facilities. Various cable and video operators in the state of Texas hold state-issued certificates of authority authorizing them to operate in the Houston area. As a result, the City has access to four cable channels for PEG programming. The City's Municipal Channel broadcasts on one of these channels; the remaining three channels are used for Public and Educational programming developed and produced by the Contractor. In addition to providing channels, the state-issued certificates of authority provide funding of approximately \$3.4.M annually for the ongoing operations of PEG programming. Historically, these funds have been evenly divided between the Municipal Channel and the public access channel currently operated by HMS.

This RFP was advertised in accordance with the requirements of the State of Texas bid laws and as a result, two (2) proposals were received from HMS and Creed Global Media. The evaluation committee consisted of evaluators from the Administration and Regulatory Affairs Department and the Mayor's Office. The proposals were evaluated based upon the following criteria:

- Professional Qualifications
- Involvement with a similar project.
- Strategy and Operational Plan.
- Price Proposal

HMS received the highest overall score, and the Mayor's Office is confident that HMS can perform the required services outlined in the RFP.

M/WBE Participation:

The RFP was advertised with a 9% M/WBE participation. The Contractor submitted a Good Faith Effort to the Office of Business Opportunity, which was approved for 5.26% M/WBE goal. Therefore, the Contractor has designated the below-name companies as its certified M/WBE subcontractors:

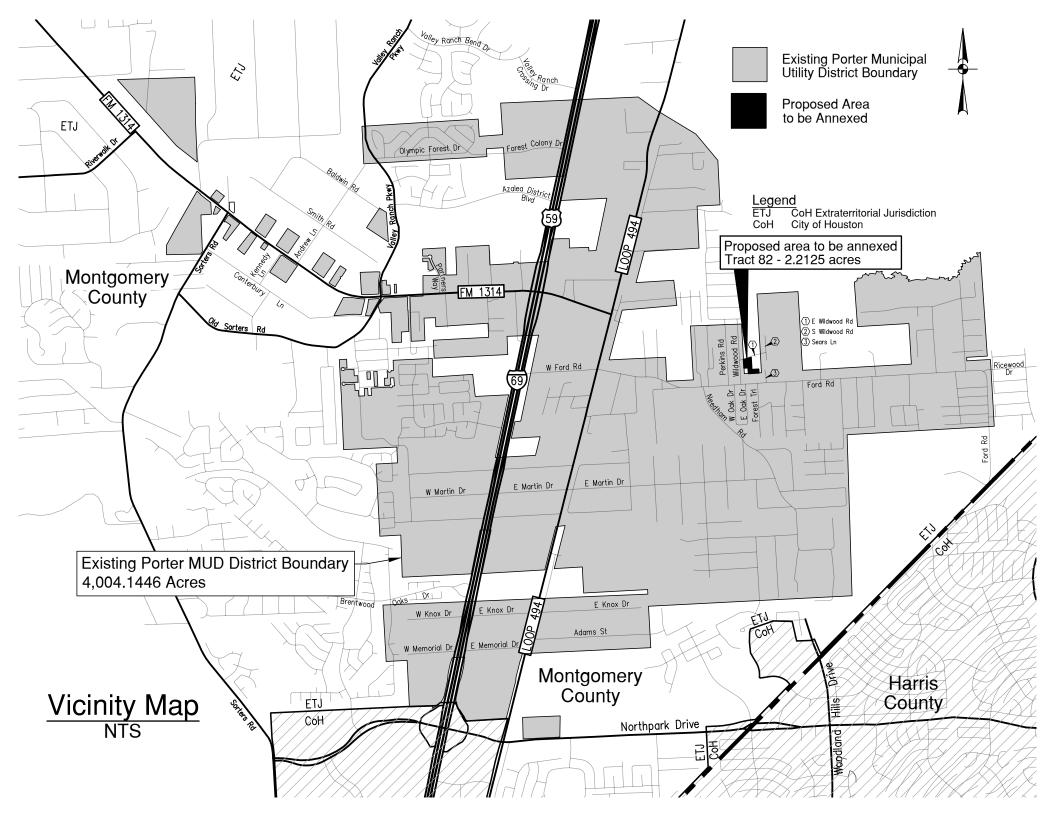

The District consists of 134.40 acres of land located in the vicinity of El Dorado Boulevard, Beamer Road, Whitcomb Road, and Interstate 45, and is entirely within the corporate limits of the City of Houston. Development of the District will require storm drainage and water and wastewater service, including collection, distribution, treatment and water supply facilities.

The Agreement establishes the terms and conditions which govern services provided. In accordance with the Agreement, the District will provide water and wastewater service to its residents until the District connects to future wastewater facilities. Once these facilities have been completed, the District will connect to the City's facilities and convey its internal water and wastewater facilities to the City for ownership, operation, and maintenance. At that time, the City will collect water and wastewater revenues from residents of the District on the same basis as all other City Customers.

Projected build out of the District will result in an estimated taxable value of \$143,000,000.00.

Houston Public Works recommends the Agreement be approved.

Background:

SUBJECT: First Amendment to Professional Engineering Services Contract between the City and Bowman Engineering & Consulting, Inc. (F/K/A Q Consultants, Inc.) dba Quadrant Consultants Inc. for Kirkwood Paving and Drainage: Briar Forest Drive to Westheimer Road.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve First Amendment to the Professional Engineering Services Contract with Bowman Engineering & Consulting, Inc. (F/K/A Q Consultants, Inc.) dba Quadrant Consultants Inc. and appropriate funds.

PROJECT NOTICE/JUSTIFICATION: This project is part of the Street and Traffic Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and is required to meet the City of Houston standards as well as improve traffic circulation, mobility, and drainage in the service area. The deterioration of existing pavement and future traffic volume requires that this roadway be reconstructed.

DESCRIPTION/SCOPE: This project consists of the design for reconstruction of approximately 4,000 linear feet, a four-lane divided concrete roadway with storm drainage, curbs, sidewalks, driveways, street lighting, traffic control, and necessary underground utilities. The scope includes improvement of drainage and upgrade of the existing roadway to Major Thoroughfare and Freeway Plan (MTFP) standards.

LOCATION: The project area is generally bound by Briar Forest Drive on the north, Westheimer Road on the south, Wilcrest Drive on the east and Dairy Ashford Road on the west.

PREVIOUS HISTORY AND SCOPE: City Council approved the original Contract on July 19, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-0510. The scope of services under the Original Contract consisted of Phase L. Preliminary Design Phase L. Final Design Phase H. Construction Phase Services and

Additional Services. Under this Contract, the Consultant has accomplished Phase I - Preliminary Design.

SCOPE OF THIS AMENDMENT AND FEE: Under the scope of the First Amendment, the Consultant will accomplish Phase II - Final Design, Phase III - Construction Phase Services and Additional Services to revise the scope and update the design for the newly adopted Kirkwood Subproject 1 cross-section of the project configuration. A fee of \$30,240.00 is budgeted for Basic Services and \$184,615.20 for Additional Services.

The total requested appropriation is \$225,597.96 to be appropriated as follows: \$214,855.20 for contract services and \$10,742.76 for CIP Cost Recovery.

PAY OR PLAY PROGRAM: The proposed contract requires compliance with the City's 'Pay or Play' ordinance regarding health benefits for employees of City contractors. In this case, the Contractor provides health benefits to eligible employees in compliance with City policy.

M/WBE PARTICIPATION: The M/WBE goal established for this project is 24.06%. The original Contract amount totals \$1,200,000.00. The Consultant has been paid \$830,050.00 (69.17%) to date. Of this amount, \$156,590.00 (18.87%) has been paid to M/WBE sub-consultants to date. Assuming approval of the requested additional appropriation, the contract amount will increase to \$1,414,855.20. Background:

The Housing and Community Development Department (HCDD) recommends Council approval of an Ordinance authorizing the following:

- The Amendment and submission of the 2021 Annual Action Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which includes the HOME Investment Partnerships Grant-American Rescue Plan (HOME-ARP) Allocation Plan and the application to allow HCDD to receive HOME-ARP grant funds from HUD. The application estimates a total of \$37,352,805.00 in federal funds to benefit eligible residents;

The 15-day review period extended from November 4, 2021 through November 19, 2021.

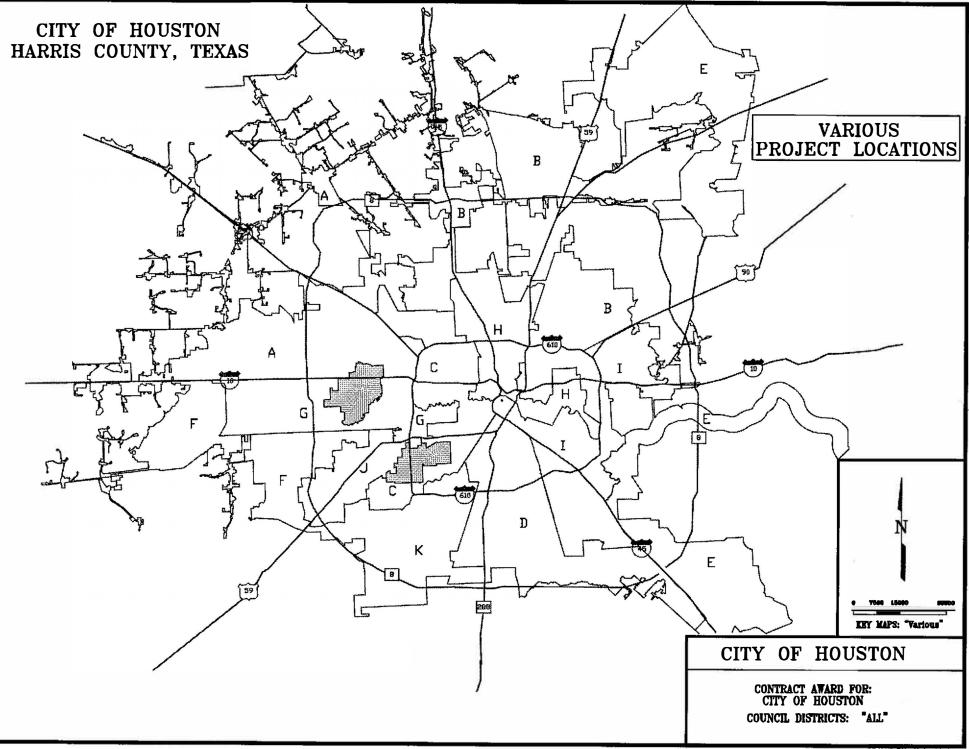

WHO IS THE CONSULTANT CONDUCTING THE DRAINAGE AND IMPACT FEE STUDY?

The consultant conducting the study is NewGen Strategies and Solutions.

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE DRAINAGE AND IMPACT FEE STUDY?

Pursuant to voter approval of Proposition 1 in 2010 (later validated by approval of Proposition A in 2018), the City established the Dedicated Drainage and Street Renewal Fund (DDSRF) as a 'Pay-as-You-Go' fund for drainage and streets including two new revenue sources: a drainage impact fee and a drainage utility charge.

The original drainage impact fee study was completed in 2012, with the drainage impact fees adopted by Council approval of Ordinance 2013-281 on April 3, 2013. As required by Chapter 395 of the Local Government Code, the impact fee study must be updated every ten years.

Ordinance 2011-254, approved by Council April 6, 2011, established the drainage utility and set rates for the drainage charge including a provision that the rates could not be increased for 10 years.

The study will evaluate the drainage needs of the City, including necessary capital investment, to satisfy the statutory requirements that the fees and rates imposed are necessary to support new development and provide nondiscriminatory, reasonable, and equitable drainage utility services within the service area.

WHAT IS THE VALUE OF THE CONTRACT WITH NEWGEN?

The budget is \$1.6 M, \$500,000 to be spent in the current fiscal year and \$1.1 M in the outyears.

HAS THERE BEEN SIGNIFICANT CHANGES TO THE DRAINAGE NEEDS OF THE CITY?

Yes. Atlas 14 is a study conducted by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to analyze rainfall data in order to revise rainfall amounts that define 100-year storm events. The results of the Atlas 14 study will be incorporated into the Drainage fee study.

WHAT WILL THE CONSULTANT EVALUATE FOR THE IMPACT FEE STUDY?

The consultant will assist the City in developing the land use assumptions and the Capital Improvements Plan in conformance with Chapter 395 of the Local Government Code.

WHEN WILL THE STUDY CONCLUDE?

We expect the study to last at least a year and a half.

IS BENCHMARKING INCLUDED IN THE STUDY?

Yes, the consultant will conduct a comparative benchmarking to major cities within Texas and other cities around the country that have similar geographical traits.

Background:

SUBJECT: This Home Elevation Project Deposit Agreement is entered into by and between the City of Houston and the property owner(s) at 14235 Kellywood Lane, Houston, Texas 77079.

RECOMMENDATION: (SUMMARY) Adopt an ordinance approving and authorizing the City of Houston / Homeowner 2016 Flood Mitigation Assistance Home Elevation Project Deposit Agreement between the City of Houston and the Homeowner(s) located at 14235 Kellywood Lane, Houston, Texas 77079, and disburse funds.

DESCRIPTION: This project consists of elevating the home located at 14235 Kellywood Lane in accordance with the City of Houston flood plain ordinance (Chapter 19).

SCOPE OF THIS AGREEMENT: The Homeowner(s) entered into a contract ("Homeowner Contract") with the City of Houston to accept 2016 Flood Mitigation Assistance grant funds to elevate their home located at 14235 Kellywood Lane. City Council approved this action on April 28, 2021, under Ordinance 2021-0327. The Homeowner(s) also entered into a contract ("Contractor Agreement") with Planet Three Consulting Corp., as part of the aforementioned Council action, to complete the engineering and construction of the home elevation project described in the Contractor Agreement.

Upon City Council approval of this agreement the Homeowner(s) have agreed to deposit the amount of \$2,145.00 with the City to hold and disburse, as appropriate, to pay for costs associated with the engineering and construction of the elevation project not covered by the Flood Mitigation Assistance Grant ("Non-Eligible Work"). The City will disburse funds to the Contractor as the

Homeowner(s) verifies completion of non-eligible grant contracted work.

The "Homeowner Agreement," Attachment F, "Non-Eligible Work Acknowledgement," requires that all Non-Eligible Work performed at the homeowner's property related to the elevation project be contracted and paid for 100% prior to the City's initial Notice to Proceed, to prevent any possible liens or encumbrances. The purpose of this "Deposit Agreement" is to hold the Non-Eligible Work funds in escrow for compliance of the "Non-Eligible Work Acknowledgement," and ensures the Homeowner's Non-Eligible Work will be completed by the Contractor prior to payment.

Homeowner selected non-elevation work:

- Front Porch Footings (required to be done in conjunction with the grant work to avoid a cold joint between the porch foundation and house foundation so the foundation for a future front porch is integrated with the house foundation)
