

Summary:

9:00 A.M. PUBLIC HEARING for updates to Chapter 42 (Subdivisions, Developments and Platting) and Chapter 26, Article VIII (Off-Street Parking and Loading) of the City's Codes of Ordinances

Background:

For three years, the Planning and Development Department has been working with the Livable Places Action Committee (LPAC) to update portions of the City's development codes to provide a wider variety of homes to meet the needs of Houstonians. They focus on affordability, equity and walkability.

These updates are for Chapter 42 (Subdivisions, Developments and Platting) and Chapter 26, Article VIII (Off-Street Parking and Loading) of the City's Codes of Ordinances. They scale back some of the rules that increase development costs and encourage more neighborhood-focused homes. These changes would be effective in accordance with active deed restrictions.

Planning Commission held a public hearing on the proposed amendments on March 16, 2023, and approved the amendments on June 8, 2023.

The proposed changes address five main areas:

Second Dwelling Unit: Increases maximum size and reduces parking by basing it on the unit size.

Multi-Unit Residential: Brings back this affordable housing type, which is small scaled, 3–8-unit apartments with a height restriction, to fit better within neighborhoods.

Courtyard Style Development: Promotes this housing type where lots are located around a common courtyard space, and do not require street frontage. The proposal includes green space requirement per lot, parking could be separate from the units and have a height restriction so that homes are at neighborhood scale.

Narrow Lot Development: Incentivizes rear and shared access and restricts front-access driveway widths to improve pedestrian safety and reduce impervious surfaces in the rights-of-way and provides more public access to the public curb.

Market Based Parking: For all residential development types mentioned above, allows marketbased parking closely adjacent to significant transportation options. This means the City will not have a minimum parking requirement, and the property owner may provide parking based on market needs.

REQUIREMENTS

- Allowed on property with no deed restrictions
- Platted as individual lots surrounding a courtyard
- Lots must front courtyard, alley, shared driveway, PAE, courtyard access drive, pedestrian pathway, or public street

- Maximum height is 30 feet
- Total depth is no more than 150 feet back from the public street





- Properties may not be subdivided to lots narrower than allowed by active deed restrictions
- No more than 27 dwelling units per acre, except properties with side or rear access via alley, flag staff, shared driveway or permanent access easement (PAE) may increase to 35 dwelling units per acre


(Distance from Property Line)

- For properties 40 feet or wider or those taking access from alley, flag staff, shared driveway or permanent access easement (PAE):
- at least 5 feet along local and collector streets, or
- at least 15 feet along major thoroughfares with right-ofway of 80 feet or less

19-foot garage building line is required

ACCESS

- All properties that can, should take access from an alley



On behalf of <u>Houston's Age-Friendly/Livable Community (AF/LC) Plan 2019</u>, led by AARP Houston, thank you for the opportunity to weigh in on the proposed changes to the Chapter 42. On behalf of Blueprint Houston, thank you for the opportunity to weigh in on proposed changes to Chapter 42 recommended through the Livable Places initiative. Our mission is to promote the evolution and implementation of Plan Houston as the basis for planning the City's future. We believe these changes will advance Plan Houston's vision for a healthy and prosperous future by orienting our growth around the plan's strategies and actions.

Adopted in 2015 as Houston's first general plan, Plan Houston identifies a community-driven vision and goals for Houston's long-term future and proposes core strategies and actions to achieve them. We have reviewed the proposed changes to Chapter 42 and have found the following areas of alignment:

Core Strategy: Spend Money Wisely **Action 6:** Ensure that long-term growth supports the City's fiscal viability.

More dense housing should lead to a larger tax base on the same amount of land. By facilitating the development of more housing diversity and missing middle housing, the City is better able to permit more dense housing products and ways to subdivide land. More options mean developers and homeowners can be more creative about how they bring other housing products to market that will be financially viable.

Livable Places has been an iterative effort for the last two years with participation from community groups, developers, housers, and other local government partners. Proposed regulatory reforms would allow for the development of more housing in high-demand areas, such as adjacent or near major activity centers, where land prices are higher due to the locational attributes of proximity to employment/office uses.

Core Strategy: Support our Global Economy

Action 5: Improve and promote Houston's Quality of Life to attract and retain talented and creative workers and business.

Enabling more "missing middle" housing options will inevitably allow our City of Houston a wider range of households with varying housing needs (i.e. less than half of all newly formed households in Houston are nuclear families, source: Kinder Institute State of Housing 2020 report). That means more smaller dwelling units will be developed which will play a pivotal role in housing service workers, gig economy workforce, and other creative industries that support our economic competitiveness.

The Greater Inwood Super Neighborhood Council (SNC5) after reviewing the presentation by Director Margaret Wallace Brown on the Livable Places housing recommendations and update to Chapter 42 of the Code of Ordinances approves of the proposed changes. It is our belief that he changes will increase the variety and affordability of home for Houstonians.

Those changes include the allowance of a second dwelling unit that is larger than currently permitted and provisions for parking based upon the unit size. Bringing back multi-unit residential allowing for 3-8 apartments with height restrictions and appropriate parking. Allowing a new courtyard style housing type with lots around a common courtyard and lots do not require a street frontage. Allowing narrow lot development that provide vehicle access from a shared driveway. Modifying the Code to allow market-based parking in proximity where other transportation options exist and make housing affordable.

We believe that while each of the proposed or updated housing styles may not be appropriate to each community or neighborhood, the flexibility of the housing options lends themselves to the City of Houston overall and increases both the availability and variety of housing options to Houstonians.

Background:

For three years, the Planning and Development Department has been working with the Livable Places Action Committee (LPAC) to update portions of the City's development codes to provide a wider variety of homes to meet the needs of Houstonians. They focus on affordability, equity and walkability.

These updates are for Chapter 42 (Subdivisions, Developments and Platting) and Chapter 26, Article VIII (Off-Street Parking and Loading) of the City's Codes of Ordinances. They scale back some of the rules that increase development costs and encourage more neighborhood-focused homes. These changes would be effective in accordance with active deed restrictions.

Planning Commission held a public hearing on the proposed amendments on March 16, 2023, and approved the amendments on June 8, 2023.

The proposed changes address five main areas:

Second Dwelling Unit: Increases maximum size and reduces parking by basing it on the unit size.

Multi-Unit Residential: Brings back this affordable housing type, which is small scaled, 3–8-unit apartments with a height restriction, to fit better within neighborhoods.

Courtyard Style Development: Promotes this housing type where lots are located around a common courtyard space, and do not require street frontage. The proposal includes green space requirement per lot, parking could be separate from the units and have a height restriction so that homes are at neighborhood scale.

Narrow Lot Development: Incentivizes rear and shared access and restricts front-access driveway widths to improve pedestrian safety and reduce impervious surfaces in the rights-of-way and provides more public access to the public curb.

Market Based Parking: For all residential development types mentioned above, allows market-based parking closely adjacent to significant transportation options. This means the City will not have a minimum parking requirement, and the property owner may provide parking based on market needs.


