Background:

In 2017, the State Legislature changed the annexation laws in Texas. The changes significantly limited a municipality's options for conducting full purpose (also called general purpose) annexations while they have had no effect on a municipality's ability to annex for limited purposes through a Strategic Partnership Agreement (SPA) with utility districts. Such agreements allow the City to annex all or part of a district for limited purposes. The City can then charge a sales tax and provide specific, limited services to the area. The City cannot levy a property tax in areas annexed for limited purposes.

Since the inception of the Strategic Partnership Agreements in 2000, the City of Houston has executed such agreements with 242 utility districts. Without exception, these agreements have been the result of a request by the district itself, and state law requires that the district approve the agreement prior to Council's consideration of it. At the beginning of a new "round" of annexations, the City will send a general announcement to area districts, and those that are interested respond. When a district enters into an agreement with the City for the first time, a new Strategic Partnership Ordinance is created. Subsequent ordinances between the same district and the City to add territory or to change boundaries are approved as amendments to existing agreements.

These agreements have created net revenue of approximately \$79.1 million to the City in FY 2023 and, because the split is usually 50/50, these agreements have led to around \$39.6 million being redistributed back to the community through the utility districts. While the City does not monitor the expenditures of each district, we are aware that most districts use their funds to supplement existing district services, which effectively lowers utility and tax rates. In some instances, districts have used the proceeds to fund regional parks and other public amenities. Through these agreements, the City has maintained a good working relationship with the utility districts in the Houston area.

The City is required to hold two public hearings in accordance with Section 43.0751(d) of the Texas Local Government Code, which states in pertinent part: Before the governing body of a municipality or a district adopts a strategic partnership agreement, it shall conduct two public

hearings at which members of the public who wish to present testimony or evidence regarding the proposed agreement shall be given the opportunity to do so.

The hearings called by this ordinance are for an amendment to the existing agreement, with the following Utility District:

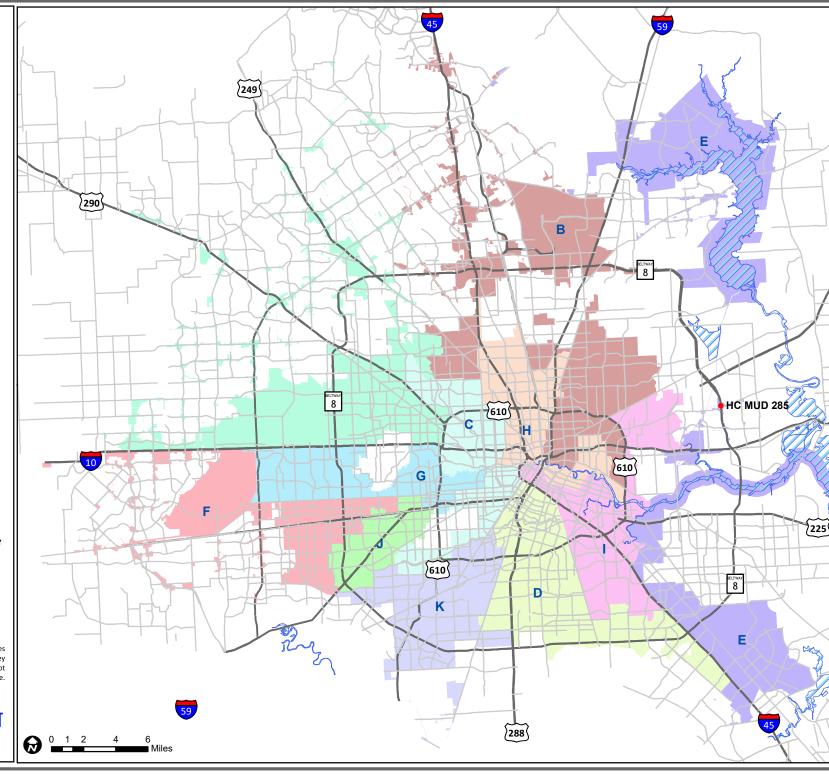

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These agreements have created net revenue of approximately \$79.1 million to the City in FY 2023 and, because the split is usually 50/50, these agreements have led to around \$39.6 million being redistributed back to the community through the utility districts. While the City does not monitor the expenditures of each district, we are aware that most districts use their funds to supplement existing district services, which effectively lowers utility and tax rates. In some instances, districts have used the proceeds to fund regional parks and other public amenities. Through these agreements, the City has maintained a good working relationship with the utility districts in the Houston area.

Such agreements allow the City to annex all or part of a district for limited purposes. The City can then charge a sales tax and provide specific, limited services to the area. 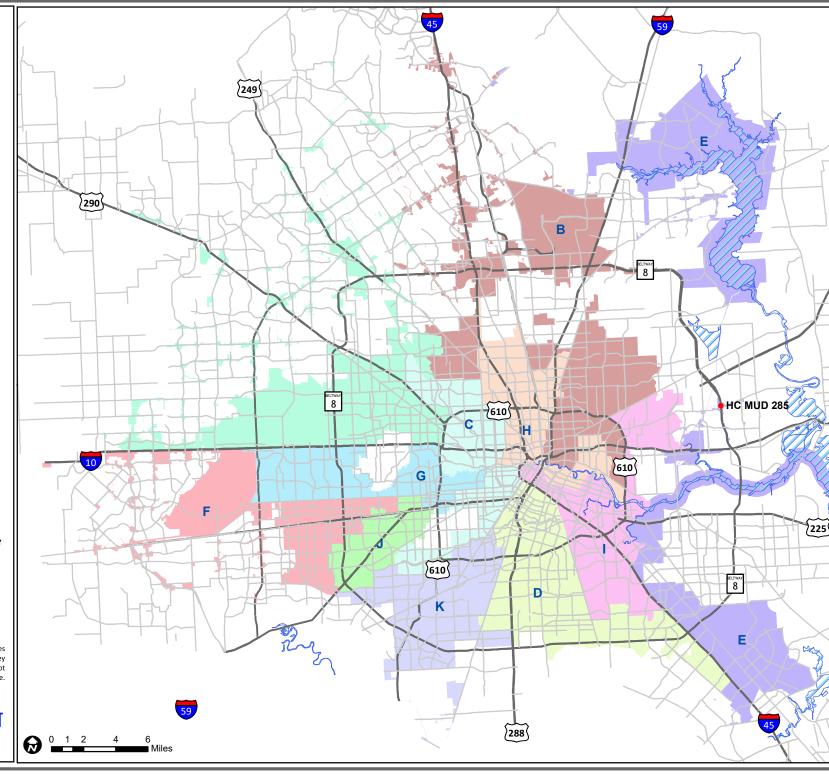

Background:

RECOMMENDATION: Approve the 2024 Operations and Maintenance Budget for the Lake Livingston Project operated by Trinity River Authority, in the amount of \$5,735,828.00.

NOTICE/JUSTIFICATION: The Trinity River Authority ("TRA") is a conservation and reclamation district created by the 54th Legislature in 1955. TRA manages Lake Livingston for the benefit of the City of Houston ("City") and TRA, with the City owning 70% of the surface water rights (806 MGD) and TRA owning 30% of the surface water rights (314 MGD). Lake Livingston surface water rights are about 73% of the City's total water rights, which are approximately 1.1 billion gallons per day.

On September 2, 1964, the City and TRA entered into a contract ("1964 Contract") for the construction, operation, and maintenance of Lake Livingston. Under the 1964 Contract, the City pays for 70% of the operation and maintenance ("O&M") costs, along with debt service on construction bonds ("Lake Livingston Project"). The 1964 Contract remains in effect until all bonds are paid and for so long as the City and TRA take water from Lake Livingston.

Section 9.16 of the 1964 Contract requires TRA to submit to the City an annual budget for the Lake Livingston Project. The proposed 2024 budget by TRA is \$5,735,828.00. This budget reflects a funding increase of \$406,592.00 as compared to TRA's 2023 budget of \$5,329,236.00, which was approved by City Council on February 15, 2023, Motion No. 2023-0111.

This increase is due to TRA's cost increases in the following categories:

· Salaries and Benefits-

This category contains an increase of approximately \$253,000 related mostly to an increase in employee provided health insurance premiums. The Project also anticipates salary increases related to merit, progressions and tenure expenses for skilled and long-term staff. The total number of employees remains static with no additional positions added.

· Supplies- This category contains an overall decrease of approximately \$2,000

related mostly to a decrease in fuel costs.

Services and This category contains an overall increase of approximately \$218,000

related mostly to estimated repair and maintenance expenses at Wallisville

Saltwater Barrier, IT allocations, and property insurance premiums.

· Capital Outlays- This category reflects a decrease of approximately \$28,000 related to a

decrease in machinery and equipment.

Houston Public Works (HPW) reviewed the submitted budget and concluded that the budget is reasonable given the work proposed.

The funds are allocated in the HPW budget the following fiscal year according to TRA's annual budget submittal during the month of October. TRA's Fiscal Year 2024 starts on December 1, 2023 and ends on November 30, 2024. Seven months of TRA's budget are allocated to the City's FY24 Budget (December 2023 to June 2024) and the remaining five months are allocated to the City's FY25 Budget (July 2024 to November 2024). Payments made to TRA are based upon documented actual monthly O&M expenditures.

It is recommended that City Council approve the 2024 TRA O&M budget for the Lake Livingston Project in the amount of \$5,735,828.00.

On September 2, 1964, the City and TRA entered into a contract ("1964 Contract") for the construction, operation, and maintenance of Lake Livingston. Background:

Emergency Purchase Order (E32996) – Approve spending authority in an amount not to exceed \$850,000.00 for the operations and maintenance of the Cryogenic Oxygen Plant at the 69th Street Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) from Air Products and Chemicals, Inc. for Houston Public Works.

Specific Explanation:

The Director of Houston Public Works (HPW) and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve spending authority in an amount not to exceed \$850,000.00 for operations and maintenance of the Cryogenic Oxygen Plant at the 69th St. and that authorization be given to issue a purchase order to Air Products and Chemicals, Inc.

The Chief Procurement Officer issued an emergency purchase order to Air Products and Chemicals, Inc., on March 10, 2023, for the operation and maintenance of the Cryogenic Oxygen Plant at the 69th Street WWTP. The 69th St. WWTP is the largest plant in the greater Houston Area and the State of Texas. This Cryogenic Oxygen producing plant is the only source that provides 160 tons/day of pure oxygen to the treatment facility. Without an oxygen plant, the treatment process could not be completed, which would cause catastrophic environmental disasters for the greater Houston area and the state of Texas.

During routine inspections, plant operators found repairs that needed immediate attention due to safety related concerns. Air Products and Chemicals, Inc. has made past repairs and are familiar with the operations of the plant. Due to the age and condition of the plant HPW has a CIP project to replace the plant. The project is currently in design.

This recommendation is made pursuant to Chapter 252, Section 252.022 (a) (2) of the Texas Local Government Code for exempted procurements, "which provides a procurement necessary to preserve or protect the public health or safety of the municipality's residents."

Summary:

ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 3-2 and 3-3 of the Code of Ordinances, Houston, Texas, relating to the location of alcohol premises - <u>DISTRICT H - CISNEROS</u> and <u>DISTRICT I - GALLEGOS</u>

Background:

The Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department (ARA) and the Mayor's Office of Economic Development request that City Council approve an ordinance amending Chapter 3, Article I, Section 3-2, of the City of Houston Code of Ordinances related to the creation and regulation of Entertainment Zones.

The City of Houston Code of Ordinance Section 3-2 makes it unlawful to sell alcohol within 300 feet of a church, school, public hospital, or within 1,000 feet of a school district that has requested an alcohol-free zone.

In 2003, City Council approved Ordinance 2003-1319, which established Entertainment Zones, including the creation of the Downtown Entertainment Zone. An Entertainment Zone is a mixed-use area consisting of at least 10 acres or 10 city blocks that is characterized by high density, mixed uses, and special development interests such as a TIRZ or enterprise zone. Once approved by City Council, an Entertainment Zone creates an exemption to statutory distance requirements for establishments that wish to sell and serve alcohol within 300 feet of a church, school, or public hospital.

The proposed amendments to Chapter 3, Article I, Section 3-2, will:

- Expand the geographic boundaries of the existing zone to all areas within the elevated freeways.
- Eliminate restrictions on the number of establishments per block face that can serve alcohol in the Downtown Entertainment Zone.
- Eliminate outward facing signage indicating the sale of alcohol at an establishment.
- Prohibit certification eligibility for a Late Hours Certificate from TABC.

The proposed expansion will not impact establishments that are not located within 300 feet of a church, school, public hospital, or within 1,000 feet of a school district that has requested an alcohol-free zone. These establishments will be eligible to sell and serve alcohol without an entertainment zone designation.

ARA and the Mayor's Office of Economic Development met with stakeholders from all the churches located within the proposed Zone, as well as the schools, the Board of Central Houston, Inc., various business owners, HoustonFirst, and residential building managers. Overall, stakeholders were in favor of, or had no objection to, the proposed expansion. The Islamic Da'Wah Center, which is in the current Downtown Entertainment Zone, was not in favor of the proposed expansion.

The proposed expansion of the Downtown Entertainment Zone was presented by ARA to the Quality of Life Committee on October 25, 2023.

ARA - Expanding the Downtown Entertainment Zone

Background:

The Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department (ARA) and the Mayor's Office of Economic Development request that City Council approve an ordinance amending Chapter 3, Article I, Section 3-2, of the City of Houston Code of Ordinances related to the creation and regulation of Entertainment Zones.

The City of Houston Code of Ordinance Section 3-2 makes it unlawful to sell alcohol within 300 feet of a church, school, public hospital, or within 1,000 feet of a school district that has requested an alcohol-free zone.

In 2003, City Council approved Ordinance 2003-1319, which established Entertainment Zones, including the creation of the Downtown Entertainment Zone. An Entertainment Zone is a mixed-use area consisting of at least 10 acres or 10 city blocks that is characterized by high density, mixed uses, and special development interests such as a TIRZ or enterprise zone. Once approved by City Council, an Entertainment Zone creates an exemption to statutory distance requirements for establishments that wish to sell and serve alcohol within 300 feet of a church, school, or public hospital.

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- Expand the geographic boundaries of the existing zone to all areas within the elevated freeways.
- Eliminate restrictions on the number of establishments per block face that can serve alcohol in the Downtown Entertainment Zone.
- Eliminate outward facing signage indicating the sale of alcohol at an establishment.
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The proposed expansion will not impact establishments that are not located within 300 feet of a church, school, public hospital, or within 1,000 feet of a school district that has requested an alcohol-free zone. These establishments will be eligible to sell and serve alcohol without an entertainment zone designation.

ARA and the Mayor's Office of Economic Development met with stakeholders from all the churches located within the proposed Zone, as well as the schools, the Board of Central Houston, Inc., various business owners, HoustonFirst, and residential building managers. Overall, stakeholders were in favor of, or had no objection to, the proposed expansion. The Islamic Da'Wah Center, which is in the current Downtown Entertainment Zone, was not in favor of the proposed expansion.

The proposed expansion of the Downtown Entertainment Zone was presented by ARA to the Quality of Life Committee on October 25, 2023.

Proposal to Expand the Downtown Entertainment Zone



Responses to Frequently Asked Questions

1. What is an Entertainment Zone?

Response: An Entertainment Zone is a mixed land use area consisting of at least 10 acres, or 10 city blocks that is characterized by high-density mixed land uses and special development interests such as a TIRZ or enterprise zone.

Chapter 3, §3-2 of the City of Houston Code of Ordinances makes it unlawful to sell alcoholic beverages within 300 feet of a church, school, or public hospital (or within 1,000 feet of a school if the school district has requested an alcohol-free school zone).

An Entertainment Zone, once approved by City Council, creates an exemption to these statutory distance requirements for establishments that wish to sell and serve alcohol within 300 feet of a church, school, or public hospital.

2. Houston already has an Entertainment Zone downtown. Thus, what is the purpose of this new, proposed Downtown Entertainment Zone?

Response: There are two existing Entertainment Zones located in Houston – one in downtown (created in 2003; *see attached map for boundaries*) and one in Midtown (created in 2021; *see attached map for boundaries*).

However, the existing Entertainment Zone located downtown is severely limited, both in terms of land area and in terms of the number of establishments that are allowed to serve alcohol. The unintended result is that this has limited the number of restaurants and food-serving entertainment options available to serve both residents of, and visitors to, Houston's downtown.

3. How does the proposed Downtown Entertainment Zone differ from the existing Entertainment Zone located downtown?

Response: The proposed Downtown Entertainment Zone addresses the two limitations of the existing downtown zone. It expands the geographic boundaries of the existing zone and eliminates the limitations on the number of establishments per block face that can serve alcohol. The proposed Downtown Entertainment Zone will also address concerns of alcohol signage that is outward facing.

<u>Expansion of Geographical Boundaries</u>: As evidenced by the attached maps, the proposed Downtown Entertainment Zone would expand the current 11-block Zone to encompass **all** of Downtown Houston as bounded by the elevated freeways.

Elimination of Limitation on the Number of Establishments per Block Face: Currently, the small Downtown Entertainment Zone only allows three locations to sell alcohol on a single block face within the Zone – effectively creating an environment where new restaurants looking to open downtown will need to be more than 300 feet from a church, school, or public hospital to be eligible to serve alcohol downtown. The proposed Downtown Entertainment Zone eliminates the "three locations per block face" limitation.

It is important to note that although this proposal will eliminate the physical limitation on the number of alcohol establishments that may operate on a single block face, the proposal still protects those sensitive land uses within 300 feet of an alcohol establishment by requiring that any such establishment hold and maintain a Food & Beverage Certificate issued by the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC).

4. Are the requirements for the proposed expanded Downtown Entertainment Zone and the Midtown Entertainment Zone the same for each zone?

Response: No, the requirements are not the same. During the development of an Entertainment Zone proposal, the requirements and limitations are discussed with impacted stakeholders including churches, businesses, schools, and residents. The requirements are then finalized based on the specific needs of the businesses and residents of that zone.

For example, like the proposed Downtown Entertainment Zone, the Midtown Entertainment Zone requires a location within 300 feet of an affected church, school, or public hospital to obtain a Food & Beverage Certificate with their TABC permit. However, unique to the Midtown Entertainment Zone, public spaces located within 300 feet of a church may also obtain other types of TABC permits to serve alcohol, including a Late Hours Certificate. Midtown Arts & Theater Center Houston (MATCH) is an example of a public space within 300 feet of a church that has obtained a different type of TABC permit.

The proposed expanded Downtown Entertainment Zone will require all establishments that are located within 300 feet of a church, school, or public hospital to obtain a Food & Beverage Certificate with their TABC permit. All alcohol-related signage will be required to face inwards, away from the street. Businesses that sell alcohol within 300 feet of a church, school or public hospital will not be allowed to obtain a Late Hours Certificate from TABC.

5. Which stakeholders were included in discussions about this proposal?

Response: The City met with representatives from all the churches located within the proposed Zone boundaries including Annunciation Catholic Church, Holy Cross Catholic Church, Co-Cathedral of Sacred Heart, First Baptist Church, First United Methodist Church, Antioch

Missionary Baptist Church, and the Islamic Da'wah Center. Except for the Islamic Da'wah Center, which is in the **current** Downtown Entertainment Zone, the remaining churches were not opposed to the proposed expansion of the Downtown Entertainment Zone.

The City also met with representatives from two (2) schools located in the Central Business District, as well as the Board of Central Houston, Inc., HoustonFirst, area businesses, and various residential building managers. The stakeholders expressed support for the proposed expansion.

6. What is the effective date of the proposed, expanded, Downtown Entertainment Zone?

Response: The proposed Downtown Entertainment Zone will be effective immediately upon approval by City Council.

Dear Committee Chair Gallegos & Members of the Quality-of-Life Committee -

Please accept this letter as public comment on the proposed expansion of the Downtown Entertainment Zone on behalf of Central Houston Inc (CHI). Since 1983, CHI, a 501c6 non-profit organization, has worked extensively on projects and initiatives to advance the vitality and wellbeing of Downtown Houston.

Our organization also administers the Houston Downtown Management District (HDMD), which this year celebrates 28 years of property owners coming together to voluntarily assess themselves to raise revenue needed to manage and improve the community. These assessment revenues are used to build, maintain, and program the public realm – inclusive of everything from power-washing Downtown sidewalks to producing Farmer's Markets and supporting Downtown retail.

The HDMD boundary includes the area currently designated as the Downtown Entertainment Zone, and as proposed, the expansion would create an area contiguous with the HDMD district boundary. This letter respectfully offers feedback from businesses, residents and property owners directly affected by the proposed changes.

First, we commend City staff for thinking creatively about addressing limitations that impede the Downtown area's ability to realize its potential as a vibrant, mixed-use place. Even before the pandemic, Downtown struggled as a location for active, ground-floor businesses. The challenges of the pandemic resulted in the loss of 55 ground-floor tenants, most of which were small businesses that brought life to our streets and provided our residents, workers, and visitors with access to food, culture, services, and entertainment.

As we now work to build back our storefront economy, this expansion will provide greater equality of opportunity within Downtown, support job creation, and advance a critical community goal of driving vibrancy. Further, this expansion allows for greater innovation and creativity to help backfill our vacant storefronts.

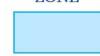
Once occupied with the next wave of enterprising entrepreneurs, those storefronts will help drive a greater utilization of the sidewalks in Downtown. This issue is critical to Downtown, as empty sidewalks make people feel vulnerable and alone. This causes misperceptions of safety in Downtown, contrary to what the data suggests, and those misperceptions foster a downward spiral of consumer behaviors and public opinion. Put simply: Vibrancy is the cure for negative perceptions of public safety, and the proposed Entertainment Zone expansion is a step in the right direction.

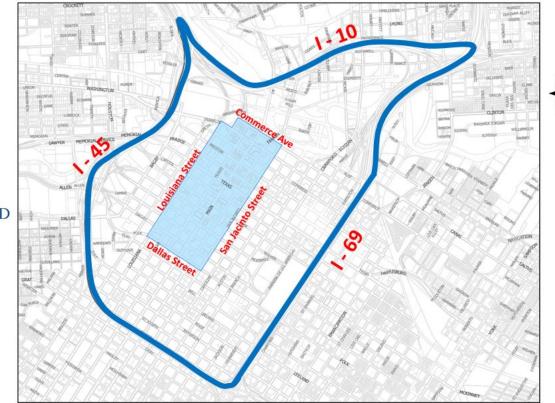

ORDINANCE amending Ordinance No. 2023-155, as amended, to increase the maximum Contract amount; and approving and authorizing First Amendment to the Subrecipient Agreement between the City of Houston and **UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS HEALTH SCIENCE CENTER AT HOUSTON** to amend the Scope of Work for Behavioral Surveillance Services for the Houston Health Department

Background:

The Houston Health Department (HHD) Director recommends that City Council approve an amending Ordinance authorizing a first amendment to the subrecipient agreement between the City of Houston and the **University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston (UTHSC)** to amend the scope of work and increase the maximum contract amount from \$2,519,895.00 to \$2,729,889.00 in connection with the Behavioral Surveillance Services. The CDC provided the Houston Health Department ("HHD") with an additional grant award in support of surveillance services and hepatitis B and C testing.

The original subrecipient agreement was approved on March 8, 2023, under Ordinance 2023-0155for three (3) consecutive years, with a renewal option of two (2) successive one-year terms. The CDC has provided an additional grant award for behavioral surveillance services and hepatitis B and C testing. The current budget period is January 1, 2023, through December 31, 2023, which has increased by \$209,994.00 for a current budget total of \$660,909.00. The five (5) year performance period is January 1, 2022, through December 31, 2026, for a maximum total of \$2,729,889.00.

The purpose of this contract is to monitor trends in the HIV epidemic and to estimate the number of persons diagnosed with HIV infection. This information provides data needed to determine populations and areas in which to focus prevention activities. The behavioral surveillance service is a qualitative study in which participants are recruited from three at risk populations: 1) men who have sex with men (MSM); 2) injection drug users (IDU); and 3) high risk heterosexuals (HRH). Data is collected using a questionnaire developed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Data from the survey will be used for: (1) in specific sexual and drug-use behaviors known to be associated with HIV/STD infection; (2) estimating demographic, social and behavioral correlates of

behavioral outcomes of interest; (3) estimating the prevalence and trends of HIV testing behaviors and exposure to and utilization of HIV/STD prevention services funded by CDC, state and local health departments; and (4) characterizing prevention-service gaps and missed opportunities for prevention.

Grant Source:

The funding for this project is from a federal government grant through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Background:

The Houston Health Department (HHD) Director recommends that City Council approve an amending Ordinance authorizing a first amendment to the subrecipient agreement between the City of Houston and the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston (UTHSC) to amend the scope of work and increase the maximum contract amount from \$2,519,895.00 to \$2,729,889.00 in connection with the Behavioral Surveillance Services. The CDC provided the Houston Health Department ("HHD") with an additional grant award in support of surveillance services and hepatitis B and C testing.

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Data from the survey will be used for: (1) in specific sexual and drug-use behaviors known to be associated with HIV/STD infection; (2) estimating demographic, social and behavioral correlates of behavioral outcomes of interest; (3) estimating the prevalence and trends of HIV testing behaviors and exposure to and utilization of HIV/STD prevention services funded by CDC, state and local health departments; and (4) characterizing prevention-service gaps and missed opportunities for prevention.

CenterPoint provides natural gas distribution service to approximately 1.9 million customers. Of this total, CenterPoint serves approximately 437,564 Houston customers — 412,350 residential, 24,357 small commercial and 857 large volume customers. The City of Houston (City or Houston) exercises original jurisdiction over the rates, operations, and services of CenterPoint under the provisions of the Texas Utilities Code for customers inside the Houston city limits.

On October 30, 2023, CenterPoint filed a Statement of Intent to increase gas utility rates with the City of Houston. CenterPoint is requesting an approximate \$59 million revenue increase for service to customers in its Houston division. On a division-wide basis, the company is proposing a \$37.4 million revenue increase (CenterPoint is proposing rate decreases for its South Texas and Beaumont/East Texas Divisions).

In addition to a substantial rate increase, CenterPoint is proposing to *consolidate* the Houston, Texas Coast, South Texas and Beaumont/East Texas Divisions into a new single division, the Texas Division, and tariff. If CenterPoint's proposed rate change is adopted, the fixed customer charge for Houston residential customers would increase from \$22.21 to \$25.25 per month – an almost 14% increase. The commodity charge (the cost per unit consumed) will also increase. The attached Table A from the Statement of Intent summarizes the Company's estimate of the overall impact on the average customer bill for all customer classes. A complete copy of the Company's filed Statement of Intent is available for review in the City Secretary's Office.

HAS – Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with United Airlines for IAH Terminal B Redevelopment – No Funding

Agenda Item#: 27.

Summary:

ORDINANCE approving and authorizing a Memorandum of Agreement between the City of Houston and **UNITED AIRLINES**, **INC**. at George Bush Intercontinental Airport/Houston (IAH); - **DISTRICT B-JACKSON**

Background:

RECOMMENDATION:

Enact an ordinance approving and authorizing a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the City of Houston and United Airlines, Inc. at George Bush Intercontinental Airport/Houston (IAH).

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

Pursuant to Ordinance 2011-0899, enacted by Houston City Council on October 19, 2011, the City of Houston, Texas and Continental Airlines, Inc. (with United Airlines as successor-in-interest) entered into a Second Amended and Restated Special Facilities Lease Agreement (SFL) for the redevelopment, expansion, and operation of Terminal B at IAH in multiple phases. The City subsequently entered into multiple amendments to the SFL, as follows:

- Amendment No. 1 to change certain provisions required by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) under the Houston Airport System (HAS) Competition Plan;
- Amendment No. 2 to allow United to issue bonds to fund certain passenger terminal facilities, and to allow an extension for United to give notice of future Terminal B redevelopment phases up until December 31, 2024; and,
- Amendment No. 3 to issue bonds to fund certain improvements to the baggage handling system.

United's continued growth at IAH requires the improvement and expansion of its existing facilities to maintain and enhance the passenger experience. With the introduction of the "United Next" initiative, United anticipates the expansion of its aircraft fleet and the up-gauging of aircraft at IAH. With the first two phases of the Terminal B Redevelopment having been completed, United is now ready to undertake Phase III of the Terminal B Redevelopment in accordance with the SFL to accommodate its growth.

Phase III of the Terminal B Redevelopment includes three milestone projects: (1) improvements to and expansion of the Terminal B Processor; (2) replacement of the Terminal B North Concourse to provide 22 narrow-body aircraft equivalent gates; and (3) replacement of the regional gate

configuration on Terminal B South to provide 18 large regional gates, all as incorporated in a project definition manual approved by the Director in writing October 2023.

In order to accomplish Phase III, several enabling projects must be undertaken as further described in the MOA, including relocation of impacted tenants, engaging additional resources in the HAS Building Standards Group to oversee the project, making certain improvements to portions of the airfield and roadways, adding additional aircraft parking areas in certain locations at IAH, adding an 8,000-space remote employee parking lot to free up space in the terminal garages for airline passengers, and accommodating a relocation of Houston Police personnel assigned to IAH. Additionally, United is committing to renovate restrooms in all of its leased terminals in accordance with HAS design standards for restrooms in order to provide a 5-star passenger experience.

It is the intent of the parties to amend the SFL, to the extent necessary, to add certain aircraft areas to United's leasehold and to address other matters to facilitate Phase III of the Terminal B Redevelopment. United expects to expend more than \$1,500,000,000.00 on Phase III work, and the City intends to expend \$624,000,000.00 in three tranches, the first appropriation being \$150,000,000.00 in FY2024, to allow the City to reimburse United on a monthly basis, with title vesting in the City on a brick-by-brick basis, for United to construct Phase III redevelopment and certain enabling projects. Supplemental appropriation requests totaling \$474,000,000.00 will be required, with the first occurring approximately 12 months after the initial appropriation, and the second occurring approximately 24 months after the initial appropriation. Project costs are expected to be fully recoverable from multiple sources: \$375,600000 from United after project completion in 2026 through the SFL, and the remainder from all airlines for applicable airfield components through rates and charges under other airline use and lease agreements, or from other users of certain facilities, such as airport parking.

The pertinent terms of the MOA include the following:

- 1. <u>Term</u>: The MOA will continue until the completion of the enabling projects listed in the MOA, or as to certain provisions when incorporated into Amendment No. 4 to the SFL, which is expected to be completed in 2024 and brought to City Council for approval.
- 2. <u>Rentals</u>: Under the SFL, United pays various fees under airport rates and charges, including landing fees, terminal rents and fees, system charges, and FIS charges, which are set each fiscal year. United shall repay the City for projects financed by City and constructed by United which are attributable to United's benefit only. For portions of Terminal B which are demolished and redeveloped at United's cost, ground rent shall be charged.
- 3. <u>MWBE Participation</u>: MWBE goals have been established for the scope of work under the MOA, consisting of 25% for design and 30% for construction.
- 4. <u>Permitted Uses</u>: At IAH, United leases private offices, operations areas, ticket counters, queuing areas, baggage makeup areas, aircraft gates, holdrooms, baggage claim areas, and aircraft apron areas, and it uses a security checkpoint. All IAH airlines with international arrivals, other than pre-cleared flights, use the FIS.
- 5. <u>Other</u>: United shall be required to provide standard insurance and indemnification as required in the SFL, as well as compliance with the Living Wage Executive Order.

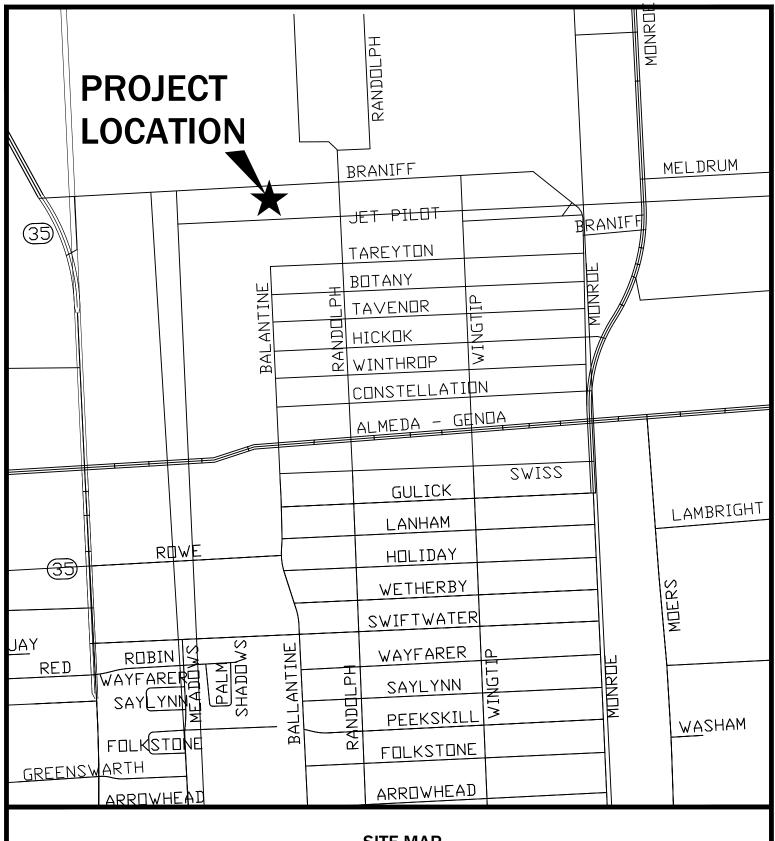

Background:

SUBJECT: An Ordinance approving and authorizing an interlocal agreement between the City, Harris County, TIRZ #1 and the St. George/Lamar Terrace RDA to provide for the participation of the County in the TIRZ for the purpose of funding capital projects and maintenance for the capital projects as needed.

RECOMMENDATION: (Summary) Adopt an ordinance approving and authorizing an interlocal agreement between the City, Harris County, TIRZ #1 and the St. George/Lamar Terrace RDA to provide for the participation of the County in the TIRZ for the purpose of funding capital projects and maintenance for the capital projects as needed

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The City Council approved the Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone (TIRZ No. 1) on December 12, 1990, and the St. George/Lamar Terrace Redevelopment Authority on February 11, 1998.

Section 311.002 of the Texas Tax Code refers to the meaning of a taxing unit as "a county, an incorporated city or town (including a home-rule city), a school district, a special district or authority (including a junior college district, a hospital district...that is authorized to impose and is imposing ad valorem taxes on property even if the governing body of another political unit determines the tax rate for the unit or otherwise governs its affairs.

The project plan describes the project priorities, projected capital costs, projected revenue over the span of the TIRZ, the participating taxing units and the participation rate for each participating unit. The project plan was approved by the City Council on September 16, 1992. The project plan has been amended four times since the inception of the TIRZ with the last amendment approved on November 10, 2015.

On October 26, 2023, the TIRZ Board and the Redevelopment Authority Board approved an

Interlocal Agreement ("ILA") with Harris County for Harris County to participate as a taxing unit in TIRZ No. 1. The Harris County Commissioner's Court approved the ILA on October 31, 2023. The ILA provides that Harris County, Precinct 4, will participate at 60% of the funds actually collected with respect to the Captured Appraised Value from the County's total ad valorem tax rate (less the portion of the County's tax rate levied for debt service, and not including any taxes levied by the County on behalf of the Harris County Flood Control District, Harris County Hospital District, Port of Houston Authority, or similar entities). The ILA further provides that 33% of the participation rate must be used to provide affordable housing and 10% of the participation rate will be retained by Harris County to the maintenance and operations of facilities and projects related to the project plan.

The term of the ILA begins with the countersignature of the City Controller and terminates on December 31, 2045.

In consideration for the philanthropic contribution, the City, Harris County and Buffalo Bayou Partnership agreed to fund a long-term maintenance plan for the improvements. The shared allocation of the maintenance obligation is 25%, 25% and 50% respectively. The BBE Agreement also contemplates that Harris County will fund its greenspace maintenance obligation through county tax increment generated from TIRZ 18 and TIRZ 23.

Under this Interlocal Agreement, Harris County will participate in TIRZ 18 at 100% of county tax increment actually collected or an amount to be determined solely by Harris County, whichever less. The Interlocal Agreement will allow Harris County to contribute county tax increment towards funding its greenspace maintenance obligation through the initial 30-year term of the BBE Agreement. Harris County's tax increment participation is limited to the geographic boundaries of TIRZ 18.

It is anticipated that the Interlocal Agreement will be approved by the Board of Directors of TIRZ 18 and the Fifth Ward Redevelopment Authority at its upcoming November 2023 board meeting, and by County Commissioners Court on October 31, 2023.

RECOMMENDATION:

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

Reinvestment Zone Number Seven, City of Houston, Texas (the "Zone") was created by Ordinance No. 1997-478 on May 7, 1997, and initially consisted of approximately 455 acres. City Council approved a Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan (the "Plan") for the Zone by Ordinance No. 97-539, on May 14, 1997, and created the Old Spanish Trail/Almeda Corridors Redevelopment Authority by Resolution No. 98-28 on July 8, 1998, to implement the Plan.

The City approved the First Amendment to the Plan by Ordinance No. 98-1146 on December 9, 1998; the Second Amendment to the Plan by Ordinance No. 1999-829 on August 11, 1999; the Third Amendment to the Plan by Ordinance No. 2006-1110 on November 8, 2006; the Fourth Amendment to the Plan by Ordinance No. 2008-419 on May 14, 2008; the Fifth Amendment to the Plan by Ordinance No. 2013-797 on September 11, 2013; the Sixth Amendment to the Plan by Ordinance No. 2016-957 on December 7, 2016; the Seventh Amendment to the Plan by Ordinance No. 2019-986 on December 4, 2019; and the Eighth Amendment to the Plan by Ordinance No. 2020-1100 on December 16, 2020.

On September 26, 2023, the Board of Directors of the Zone approved a proposed Ninth Amendment to the Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan (the "Amended Plan") and submitted it to the City for City Council consideration and approval. The Amended Plan includes updates to the Zone's development goals for the proposed annexation of approximately 9.14

acres into the Zone's boundaries and areas covered by the Plan and all subsequent Amendments.

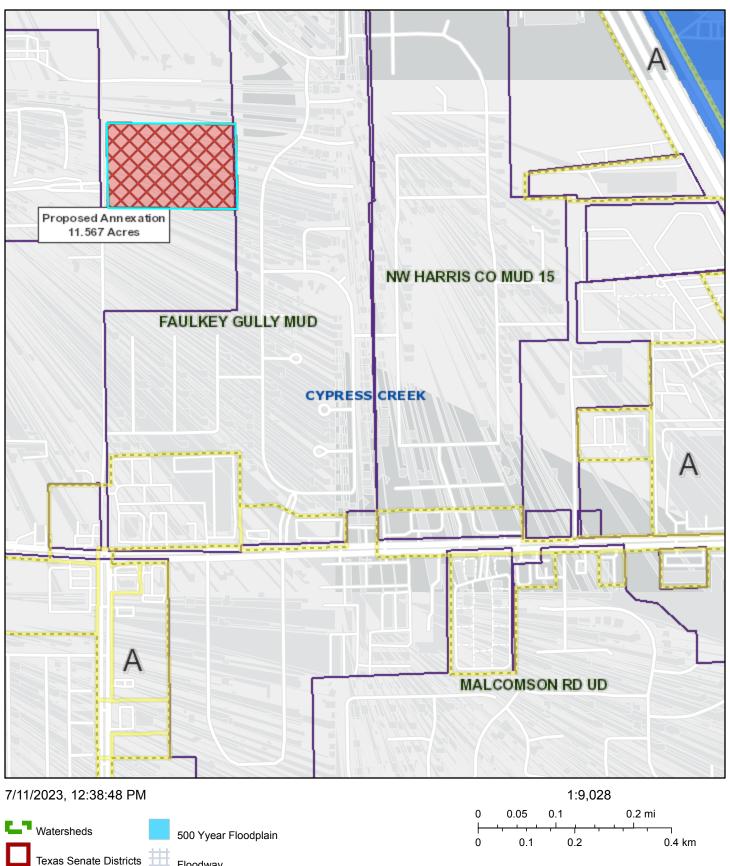

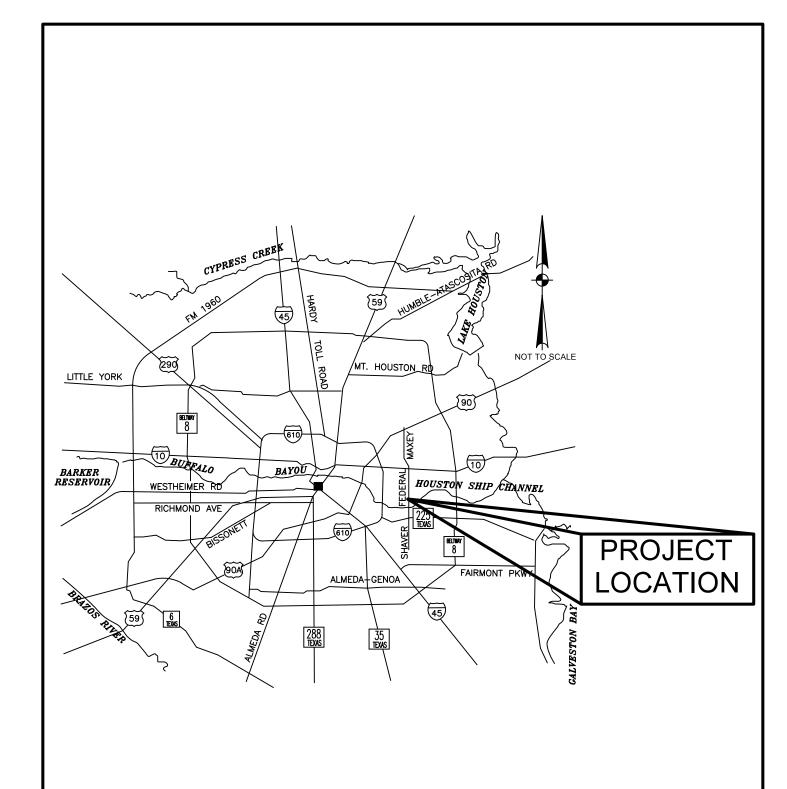

PROJECT VACINITY MAP

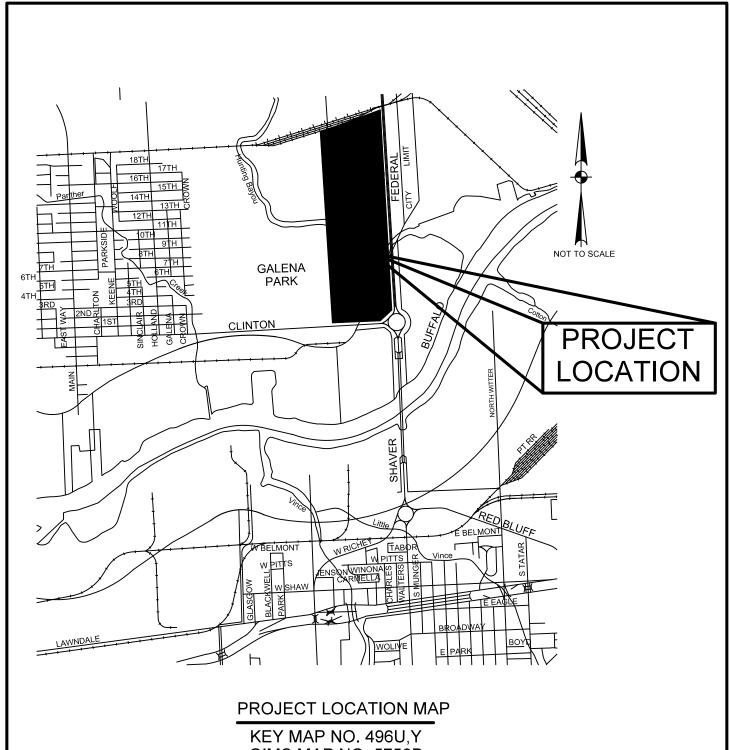

The Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department recommends that City Council approve an ordinance authorizing a \$100,000 increase in the contract amount and spending authority for the Interlocal Agreement between the City of Houston and Geotechnology Research Institute (GTRI) for services related to the implementation of the City of Houston's Climate Action Plan and Resilient Houston Plan.

On October 5, 2022, City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2022-0779 authorizing an interlocal agreement for a fifteen-month period with four, optional, one-year extensions between the City and GTRI/HARC. The interlocal agreement provides a schedule of hourly rates that include employee names, employee classifications and respective hourly rates.

On May 3, 2023, City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2023-0310 authorizing the first amendment to the interlocal agreement. The first amendment proposed a revised schedule of hourly rates that included a more comprehensive list of employee classifications and respective 2023 hourly rates. The amended hourly rates were within the percentage allowable by the current interlocal agreement (3%). A more comprehensive schedule of rates provided the City with additional flexibility to access various GTRI/HARC resources. The first amendment did not change the maximum interlocal agreement amount of \$228,040.

ARA is now asking City Council approve an additional \$100,000 in spending authority for this Interlocal Agreement to allow HARC to assist the City in the continuing implementation of the Houston Climate Action Plan and Resilient Houston Plan, including the development and execution

of programs to complete the actions and strategies laid in the plans. HARC's assistance and expertise are particularly necessary as the City has applied for \$40M in grant funding that – if awarded (and we believe the City is in a good position to receive some of this funding) – is specifically directed at climate pollution reduction and other aspects of the City's CAP.
