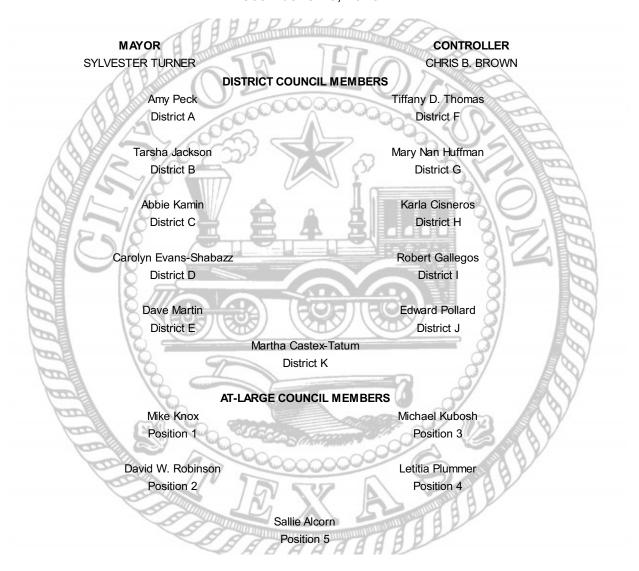

GENERAL STATEMENT

The Greater Harris County 9-1-1 Emergency Network (GHC 9-1-1) provides the 9-1-1 call delivery infrastructure—equipment, software, maintenance, support and training—used by the forty-nine cities and two counties (Harris and Fort Bend) served by GHC 9-1-1 to receive and process the initial 9-1-1 emergency call. For several years, GHC 9-1-1 has been transitioning to a Next Generation (Next Gen) infrastructure in order to have the flexibility to meet the demands on an emergency call center: texting to 9-1-1, location options during a hurricane or other disaster, redundancy, greater interconnection with other 9-1-1 call centers.

Following are the more significant features included in the 2024 Operational and Capital Budget approved by the GHC 9-1-1 Board:

- The wireline service fee rates per month are: \$.80 per residential line, \$1.40 per business line and per business trunk.
- The service fees for wireless and prepaid wireless subscribers are prescribed by law; the statewide flat rate for regular wireless is \$.50 per subscriber number per month, while the prepaid wireless subscribers are assessed a two percent (2%) service fee based on prepaid wireless service purchased by any method. The regular wireless fees collected in Texas are transmitted to the Texas State Comptroller's Office and are distributed within 15 days of receipt to 9-1-1 entities in the State. The prepaid wireless fees are transmitted to the Comptroller and are distributed within 15 days after each calendar quarter. Funds from both the wireless and prepaid wireless subscribers are distributed by population of citizens served by each 9-1-1 entity as a percentage of the total State population.
- The financing proceeds, planned in the amount of \$6.29 million will provide funding for Next Gen 9-1-1 infrastructure. The "Grant" funds are sourced from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021.
- The salary budget includes the following full-time staff positions:
 - ❖ Operations/technology personnel needed to maintain and support on a 7x24x365 basis, GHC 9-1-1's equipment and supporting systems in more than 60 locations
 - ❖ Database operational staff to manage and maintain the in-house 9-1-1 database
 - ❖ GIS staff to continue to develop and maintain the geographical map for all jurisdictions within Harris and Fort Bend Counties
 - ❖ Public information and education staff to educate both the public and 1,200+ call takers
 - ❖ Administrative/financial staff which handles the daily business functions of GHC 9-1-1

- Network services/connectivity budget includes the following:
 - ❖ Costs for Next Generation 9-1-1 infrastructure and services including diverse, managed Internet-Protocol (IP) based networks used to transport critical emergency voice and data traffic at more than 60 locations within Harris and Fort Bend counties
 - ❖ Costs for wireless location services, as mandated by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), which provides the 9-1-1 calltaker with a mobile phone number (for call-back, if necessary) and the caller's approximate location information
 - ❖ 9-1-1 trunking, selective router, and in-house database service
- Costs to help fund 9-1-1 calltaker positions for the City of Houston, Harris County Sheriff, and Fort Bend County Sheriff—all employees are the responsibility of the respectively agencies. Other GHC 9-1-1 costs for operations and capital outlay associated with the emergency call centers/Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) are included throughout the Budget.
- Contract services budget includes costs for programming/customization services of the 9-1-1 calltaker system, second tier software manufacturer support services, and general IT expenses.
- Operating costs for the headquarters facility are included. The headquarters is designed to help better meet GHC 9-1-1's disaster contingency plan and facility security requirements for emergency communication networking systems.
- Capital costs include upgrades to calltaker and backroom equipment at the PSAPs to continue GHC 9-1-1's "Capital Replacement" Plan and to accommodate new technology such as digital service, VoIP, wireless location technology, mapping, remote access for diagnostics and maintenance, etc. Also included are funds to support the relocation of 9-1-1 equipment at PSAPs.
- Operating and capital costs are included for Next Gen projects, which include capital replacement and ongoing services. The services include higher capacity network bandwidth and increased diversity/redundancy of the network. The ongoing services and new build-outs will allow a seamless integration of new technological devices capable of accessing 9-1-1 emergency services and to improve interoperability among all emergency response agencies.

• The budget also includes:

- ❖ Costs associated with GHC 9-1-1's participation in the development and maintenance of the electronic map for all of GHC 9-1-1's territory and mapping updates associated with the Houston-Galveston Area Council (HGAC mapping consortium)
- ❖ Costs for operation of GHC 9-1-1's 7x24x365 Network Operations Center (NOC), which serves all jurisdictions administered by GHC 9-1-1
- ❖ Expenses for GHC 9-1-1's ongoing professional training seminars for personnel of participating jurisdictions and agencies throughout the GHC 9-1-1 territory
- Expenses for hands-on training classes taught both in the training facility and onsite at PSAPs
- ❖ Public education programs, including targeted campaigns (e.g., wireless use, proper use of 9-1-1, and texting-to-911)

GHC 9-1-1 partnered with Harris County and the City of Houston in a shared microwave public safety network, serving all of Harris and Fort Bend counties. The shared microwave system was designed to enhance and augment emergency communication needs while enhancing interoperability among all three entities, which will benefit all of the 49 cities in the two county area. Sharing common system components and network paths has resulted in a more redundant multi-path data network while saving costs for all three entities.

The capital funds carried over from year to year are used to pay for planned capital purchases and ongoing capital replacement. Since GHC 9-1-1 has to work with thirtynine different jurisdictions, the deployment schedule of the capital purchases is sometimes beyond the control of GHC 9-1-1. GHC 9-1-1 remains prepared to deploy capital equipment once a jurisdiction is prepared for the deployment. As a result some capital projects are carried over to the following year.

Significant work by the GHC 9-1-1 Staff will continue, in conjunction with other 9-1-1 entities and regulatory authorities, to ensure that, when necessary, all new technologies allow anyone, at any time, from any place, using any device to contact emergency services—fire, police or medical—by using the digits 9-1-1.

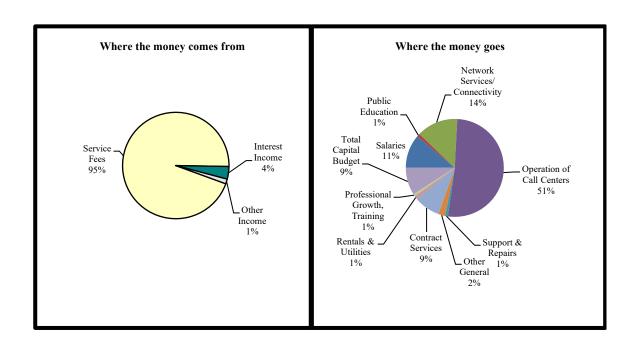

Additionally, at no charge this award includes pre-existing wall mounted and free-standing rack chemical proportioning systems which dilute, measure, and dispense concentrated cleaning products directly into cleaning equipment to be used by the Fire, General Services, Houston Public Works and Houston Airport System Departments for the maintenance of municipal buildings and fire stations located throughout the City.

These is a price list and line items award. Relative to the price list, the best discount which determines the low bid for a price list is the best bid received for quantities of high-use items selected as sample pricing items based on the current needs of the departments. The bid total for sample pricing items does not represent the total amount estimated to be purchased; rather, this recommendation is for the total estimated expenditures projected over the awarded term based on the low bid submitted for the representative samples.

This project was advertised in accordance with the requirement of the State of Texas bid laws. Thirty (30) prospective bidders downloaded the solicitation document from SPD's e-bidding website, and one bid was received. Subsequent to receipt of the bid, vendors were contacted to determine the reason for the limited response to the ITB. Potential respondents advised that parts and services were not in their core business plans or they did not have the local necessary resources to meet the scope of work requirements specified in the ITB.

MWBE Participation:

This bid was issued with a 10% MWBE goal. **Buckeye Cleaning Center-Houston** has designated the below-named company as it certified MWBE subcontractor.

Summary:

ORDINANCE appropriating \$150,000,000.00 out of Airport System Consolidated 2011 Construction Fund for Memorandum of Agreement between City of Houston and **UNITED AIRLINES**, **INC** at George Bush Intercontinental Airport/Houston (IAH) - **DISTRICT B** - **JACKSON**

Background:

RECOMMENDATION:

Enact an ordinance appropriating \$150,000,000.00 from the Airport System Consolidated 2011 Construction Fund (8206) for the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the City of Houston and United Airlines, Inc. at George Bush Intercontinental Airport/Houston (IAH).

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

Pursuant to Ordinance 2011-0899, enacted by Houston City Council on October 19, 2011, the City of Houston, Texas and Continental Airlines, Inc. (with United Airlines as successor-in-interest) entered into a Second Amended and Restated Special Facilities Lease Agreement (SFL) for the redevelopment, expansion, and operation of Terminal B at IAH in multiple phases. The City subsequently entered into multiple amendments to the SFL, as follows: Amendment No. 1 to change certain provisions required by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) under the Houston Airport System (HAS) Competition Plan; Amendment No. 2 to allow United to issue bonds to fund certain passenger terminal facilities, and to allow an extension for United to give notice of future Terminal B redevelopment phases up until December 31, 2024; and, Amendment No. 3 to issue bonds to fund certain improvements to the baggage handling system.

On November 15, 2023, City Council enacted Ordinance 2023-1003, approving and authorizing a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with United, in furtherance of Phase III of Terminal B Redevelopment. Phase III includes three milestone projects: (1) improvements to and expansion of the Terminal B Processor; (2) replacement of the Terminal B North Concourse to provide 22 narrow-body aircraft equivalent gates; and (3) replacement of the regional gate configuration on Terminal B South to provide 18 large regional gates, all as incorporated in a project definition approved by the Director in October 2023.

In order to accomplish Phase III, several enabling projects must be undertaken as further

described in the MOA, including relocation of impacted tenants, engaging additional resources in the HAS Building Standards Group to oversee the project, making certain improvements to portions of the airfield and roadways, adding additional aircraft parking areas in certain locations at IAH, adding an 8,000-space remote employee parking lot to free up space in the terminal garages for airline passengers, and accommodating a relocation of Houston Police personnel assigned to IAH. Additionally, United is committing to renovate restrooms in all of its leased terminals in accordance with HAS design standards for restrooms in order to provide a 5-star passenger experience.

It is the intent of the parties to amend the SFL, to the extent necessary, to add certain aircraft areas to United's leasehold and to address other matters to facilitate Phase III of the Terminal B Redevelopment. United expects to expend up to \$1,950,000,000.00 on Phase III work, and the City intends to expend \$624,000,000.00 in three tranches to allow the City to reimburse United on a monthly basis, with title vesting in the City on a brick-by-brick basis, for United to construct Phase III redevelopment and certain enabling projects. It is now requested that City Council enact an ordinance appropriating \$150,000,000.00 from the Airport System Consolidated 2011 Construction Fund (8206) as the first of three appropriations.

Supplemental appropriation requests totaling \$474,000,000.00 will be required, with the first occurring in approximately 12 months, and the second occurring in approximately 24 months. Project costs are expected to be fully recoverable from multiple sources: \$375,600,000.00 from United after project completion in 2026 through the SFL, and the remainder from all airlines for applicable airfield components through rates and charges under other airline use and lease agreements, or from other users of certain facilities, such as airport parking.

The subject of this item was part of a preliminary presentation to the City Council Economic Development Committee (EDC) on May 31, 2023.

Background:

RECOMMENDATION:

Enact an ordinance appropriating \$150,000,000.00 from the Airport System Consolidated 2011 Construction Fund (8206) for the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the City of Houston and United Airlines, Inc. at George Bush Intercontinental Airport/Houston (IAH).

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

Pursuant to Ordinance 2011-0899, enacted by Houston City Council on October 19, 2011, the City of Houston, Texas and Continental Airlines, Inc. (with United Airlines as successor-in-interest) entered into a Second Amended and Restated Special Facilities Lease Agreement (SFL) for the redevelopment, expansion, and operation of Terminal B at IAH in multiple phases. The City subsequently entered into multiple amendments to the SFL, as follows: Amendment No. 1 to change certain provisions required by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) under the Houston Airport System (HAS) Competition Plan; Amendment No. 2 to allow United to issue bonds to fund certain passenger terminal facilities, and to allow an extension for United to give notice of future Terminal B redevelopment phases up until December 31, 2024; and, Amendment No. 3 to issue bonds to fund certain improvements to the baggage handling system.

On November 15, 2023, City Council enacted Ordinance 2023-1003, approving and authorizing a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with United, in furtherance of Phase III of Terminal B Redevelopment. Phase III includes three milestone projects: (1) improvements to and expansion of the Terminal B Processor; (2) replacement of the Terminal B North Concourse to provide 22 narrow-body aircraft equivalent gates; and (3) replacement of the regional gate configuration on Terminal B South to provide 18 large regional gates, all as incorporated in a project definition approved by the Director in October 2023.

In order to accomplish Phase III, several enabling projects must be undertaken as further described in the MOA, including relocation of impacted tenants, engaging additional resources in the HAS Building Standards Group to oversee the project, making certain improvements to portions of the airfield and roadways, adding additional aircraft parking areas in certain locations at IAH, adding an 8,000-space remote employee parking lot to free up space in the terminal garages for airline passengers, and accommodating a relocation of Houston Police personnel assigned to IAH. Additionally, United is committing to renovate restrooms in all of its leased terminals in accordance with HAS design standards for restrooms in order to provide a 5-star passenger experience.

It is the intent of the parties to amend the SFL, to the extent necessary, to add certain aircraft areas to United's leasehold and to address other matters to facilitate Phase III of the Terminal B Redevelopment. United expects to expend up to \$1,950,000,000.00 on Phase III work, and the City intends to expend \$624,000,000.00 in three tranches to allow the City to reimburse United on a monthly basis, with title vesting in the City on a brick-by-brick basis, for United to construct Phase III redevelopment and certain enabling projects. It is now requested that City Council enact an ordinance appropriating \$150,000,000.00 from the Airport System Consolidated 2011 Construction Fund (8206) as the first of three appropriations.

Supplemental appropriation requests totaling \$474,000,000.00 will be required, with the first occurring in approximately 12 months, and the second occurring in approximately 24 months. Project costs are expected to be fully recoverable from multiple sources: \$375,600,000.00 from United after project completion in 2026 through the SFL, and the remainder from all airlines for applicable airfield components through rates and charges under other airline use and lease agreements, or from other users of certain facilities, such as airport parking.

The subject of this item was part of a preliminary presentation to the City Council Economic Development Committee (EDC) on May 31, 2023.

Background:

RECOMMENDATION:

Enact an Ordinance appropriating \$587,173.00 from the Airport System Consolidated ITRP AMT Construction Fund (8207) for the Professional Materials Engineering and Testing Services Contract with Aviles Engineering Corporation in support of the IAH Terminal Redevelopment Program (ITRP) Enabling Utilities-Landside (EUL) Project at George Bush Intercontinental Airport/Houston (IAH) (Project No. 822).

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

On February 27, 2019, City Council enacted Ordinance 2019-123, approving a Design-Build Services Contract with Burns & McDonnell Engineering Company, Inc. for the Enabling Utilities-Landside (EUL) Project (Project No. 822) in support of the IAH Terminal Redevelopment Program (ITRP) and appropriating \$7,693,277.00 for Phase 1 - Pre-Construction Services. The EUL Project includes the design and construction of waterline and isolation valve between Terminal A and the new Water Plant; a new East Water Facility; a new water well; installation of site fencing; and the West Triturator (a small sanitary facility to process wastewater from aircraft).

On January 6, 2021, City Council enacted Ordinance 2021-2, approving Professional Materials Engineering and Testing Services Contracts, including with Aviles Engineering Corporation, for certain professional geotechnical investigations and construction materials testing and inspection services in connection with the design, construction, or maintenance of airport capital projects.

On September 29, 2021, City Council enacted Ordinance 2021-841, approving Amendment No. 1 to the Design-Build Contract with Burns & McDonnell to accept the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) and appropriating \$42,808,706.00 for Phase 2 – Construction Services. The appropriation included \$587,173.00 for the Contract with Aviles Engineering Corporation (Contract No.

4600016473) for testing services for the EUL Project.

On September 26, 2022, City Council enacted Ordinance 2022-721, approving an additional appropriation to the EUL Project to increase the Owner's Reserve by \$2,000,000.00.

On October 19, 2022, City Council enacted Ordinance 2022-818, amending Ordinance 2021-2 to increase the maximum contract amount for the Professional Materials Engineering and Testing Services Contracts supporting airport capital projects, including the one with Aviles Engineering Corporation.

On November 8, 2023, City Council passed Motion 2023-759, approving a Change Order in excess of the contractual threshold for the Professional Materials Engineering and Testing Services Contract with Aviles Engineering Corporation in support of the EUL Project. Due to the complexity of the EUL Project Work, including an extended schedule duration, unforeseen underground conditions and enhanced traffic control, additional testing and inspections are necessary in the amount of \$587,173.00. Sufficient funds remain within the budget for the EUL Project to fund the testing and inspections, and it was anticipated that funding reallocations from previously appropriated funds would be utilized. However, upon further guidance, a direct appropriation to the Contract with Aviles is required.

Thus, now that City Council has approved the issuance of a Change Order for Aviles Engineering Corporation in excess of the contractual threshold, it is requested that an Ordinance be enacted appropriating \$587,173.00 from the Airport System Consolidated ITRP AMT Construction Fund (8207) to fund it. This appropriation will not increase the overall EUL Project budget and will be offset by unused funds for the Project.

The ITRP EUL Project was included in presentations to the City Council Economic Development Committee on June 21 and November 15, 2023.

M/WBE Participation:

A 0% goal document was approved by the Office of Business Opportunity for the Contract with Aviles Engineering Corporation.

Burns & McDonnell achieved 39.01% participation towards the 35% M/WBE goal for the EUL Phase 1 – Pre-Construction Services.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

On August 14, 2019, City Council approved Ordinance 2019-617 awarding a construction contract to Archer Western Construction, LLC for the modernization of the airport security and baggage handling system (BHS) in Terminal A at George Bush Intercontinental Airport/Houston (IAH) (Project No. 673A). Ordinance 2019-617 also appropriated \$82,010,273.00 out of the Houston Airport System Consolidated 2011 Construction Fund (8206) for costs associated with the project.

On August 24, 2019, the Transportation Security Administration authorized Other Transaction Agreement (OTA) number 70T04019T9CAP1025, granting the Houston Airport System \$49,286,786.12 for costs associated with the Electronic Baggage Screening Program. Pursuant to the OTA, on November 13, 2019, City Council approved Ordinance 2019-887 de-appropriating \$49,286,786.12 from the Airport System Consolidated 2011 Construction Fund (8206) and appropriating \$49,286,786.12 from the Houston Airport System Grants Fund (8000).

As the project progressed, it was determined that an increase in Contingency to cover remaining Construction Costs that cannot be funded with Fund 8000 would be needed. An additional appropriation of \$2,245,140.00 from Fund 8011 will allow for the completion of the remaining Construction items. The funds appropriated from Fund 8000 for the OTA items likely won't be fully exhausted but must remain obligated until project closeout; the anticipated net effect will be that the overall project cost will stay within the contract amount as originally appropriated.

It is now requested that City Council approve an additional appropriation of \$2,245,140.00 from the Airports Improvement Fund (Fund 8011).

Ordinance 2019-617 also appropriated \$82,010,273.00 out of the Houston Airport System Consolidated 2011 Construction Fund (8206) for costs associated with the project.

On August 24, 2019, the Transportation Security Administration authorized Other Transaction Agreement (OTA) number 70T04019T9CAP1025, granting the Houston Airport System \$49,286,786.12 for costs associated with the Electronic Baggage Screening Program. Pursuant to the OTA, on November 13, 2019, City Council approved Ordinance 2019-887 de-appropriating \$49,286,786.12 from the Airport System Consolidated 2011 Construction Fund (8206) and appropriating \$49,286,786.12 from the Houston Airport System Grants Fund (8000).

As the project progressed, it was determined that an increase in Contingency to cover remaining Construction Costs that cannot be funded with Fund 8000 would be needed. ORDINANCE approving and authorizing submission of electronic application for and acceptance of Grant Funding through the **FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY** for the **FEMA FY2022 Fire Prevention and Safety Grant Program**; declaring the City's eligibility for such Grant; authorizing the Chief of the Houston Fire Department to act as the City's representative in the application process, to accept and expend the Grant Funds, if awarded, and to apply for and accept all subsequent awards, if any, pertaining to the program

Background:

The Houston Fire (HFD) requests City Council approve an ordinance authorizing the application and acceptance of award for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) FY 2022 Fire Prevention and Safety Grant Program in the amount of \$152,492.81 with a cash match of \$7,624.65 for a total program cost of \$160,117.46.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The Houston Fire (HFD) requests City Council approve an ordinance authorizing the application and acceptance of award for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) FY 2022 Fire Prevention and Safety Grant Program in the amount of \$152,492.81 with a cash match of \$7,624.65 for a total program cost of \$160,117.46.

The Houston Arson Bureau (HAB) Juvenile Fire Setters Program (JFSP) is a voluntarily program offered to individuals between the ages of 2-17 that have been referred to the HAB for exhibiting fire risk behaviors. These behaviors can include intentionally setting fires or igniting explosives in an unsupervised environment, making threats to do either, or other actions, such as falsely activating fire alarms. The intent of the program is to educate the individuals and their guardians about the consequences of these actions, including criminal charges and loss of life/property, and to deter program entrants from repeating these behaviors in the future. HFD proposes the hiring of an Administrative Aide to be the Project Manager of the Houston Arson Bureau's Juvenile Fire Setters Program.

HAB's goal is to reduce risk to the community by eliminating repeat fire risk behaviors in juveniles. Our objective is to increase enrollment in the JFSP by implementing proactive intervention measures, which will include actively seeking out juveniles that meet entry criteria and by obtaining more referrals through improved community awareness. HAB JFSP members will operate as a team with the purpose of providing the highest quality education and training to juveniles that exhibit fire risk behaviors, and to their families. If awarded, HFD will hire an Administrative Assistant who

will be the Project Coordinator for the JFSP. The Project Coordinator, along with current members of the Houston Arson Bureau, will be sent to complete the Youth Fire setter Intervention Specialist Level 1 and Level 2 certification as required by NFPA 1035. HFD is now seeking \$160,117.46 to conduct this program.

The Houston Fire Department also requests City Council to authorize the Fire Chief or his designee to act as the City's representative in the application process with the authority to apply for, accept, and expend the grant funds as awarded, and apply for, accept, and expend all subsequent awards, if any, to extend the budget period, and to authorize the Mayor to execute all related agreements with the approval as to form of the City Attorney in connection with the grant not to exceed five years.

HFD proposes the hiring of an Administrative Aide to be the Project Manager of the Houston Arson Bureau's Juvenile Fire Setters Program.

HAB's goal is to reduce risk to the community by eliminating repeat fire risk behaviors in juveniles. Our objective is to increase enrollment in the JFSP by implementing proactive intervention measures, which will include actively seeking out juveniles that meet entry criteria and by obtaining more referrals through improved community awareness. The Municipally Owned Community or Recreation Center LED Lighting Retrofits grant provides financial assistance to eligible Texas municipalities through reimbursement to retrofit interior and exterior municipally owned community centers with energy efficiency light-emitting diode (LED) lighting technology. Applications were scored on the following factors: Existing light fixtures, Disadvantaged Community (DAC) boundaries, age of community center, and population of municipality.

GSD's application to retrofit old and inefficient lighting at the Magnolia Multi-Service Center was accepted. GSD intends to use the grant to fund LED retrofits to both interior fluorescent fixtures and High Intensity Discharge (HID) exterior fixtures at this facility.

GSD requests that City Council authorize the Director or his designee to act as the City's representative with the authority to apply for, accept, and expend the grant funds as awarded and to apply for, accept, and expend all subsequent awards, if any, to extend the budget period, and to authorize the Mayor and the Director to execute all related agreements with the approval of the City Attorney in connection with the grant not to exceed five years.

Background:

On October 23, 2023, the Board of Directors for Reinvestment Zone Number Twenty-Four (Greater Houston Zone) considered and approved the proposed Third Amended Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan (the "Amended Plan") and submitted the Amended Plan to City Council for consideration.

The Amended Plan adds affordable housing and Harris County projects costs of \$100,000,000 to support the goals of the County's 10-year Affordable Housing strategy along with identifying short-term and long-term capital improvements recommended in an engineering study commissioned by the Harris County Redevelopment Authority. The study included improvements to water, wastewater, storm, paving and intersection improvements in the Zone that will assist in the development and redevelopment of vacant and underdeveloped land.

The Amended plan includes no changes to City-approved project cost categories.

The proposed changes to the Greater Houston Zone Project Plan were presented to the Economic Development Committee on October 18, 2023. On October 31, 2023, the Harris County Commissioners Court considered and approved the Amended Plan.

Pursuant to Chapter 311 of the Texas Tax Code Sections 311.003, 311.007 and 311.011, a public hearing was held on December 6, 2023 regarding the Amended Plan. Accordingly, the Administration recommends that City Council approve the Third Amendment to the Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan for the Zone.

The proposed second amendment authorizes the County to become responsible for the operation and maintenance of all areas of Freed Park, including the Community Center and recreational programming, the Gym, public operations (including the restrooms and landscaping inside the wrought iron fence), and the Community Garden. The County shall be responsible for providing all utilities, security, fixtures, furnishings, and equipment necessary for the operation of the Park at the County's sole cost. It is contemplated that the County will make capital improvements to the Park for the benefit of the public. Future capital improvements by the County will be subject to prior approval of the City.

The City will have until January 31, 2024, to access the Park and the Existing Structures to remove the items belonging to the City. The County agrees that from the effective date of this second amendment, the County shall be solely responsible for all existing structures, capital

improvements, litter removal, illegal dumping, and maintenance of trees within the Park, which	ı will
adhere to the City of Houston Planting Standards during the duration of this agreement.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The structure located at 1 Hideaway Circle has been identified as a Severe Repetitive Loss Structure by the National Flood Insurance Program due to repetitive flooding. The City of Houston included this property in an application for flood mitigation via acquisition of 4 homes under the 2018 FEMA Flood Mitigation Assistance Grant Program approved by Council on January 23, 2019 by Ordinance 2019-0054. This grant was subsequently awarded and accepted by Council on July 21, 2021 by Ordinance 2021-0625. Post acquisition the structure will be demolished and the land beneath returned to green space as required by the terms of the grant agreement.

The City's offer was based on an appraisal by David Ambrose, MAI of the Ambrose Group. The valuation was reviewed and recommended for approval by a senior staff appraiser of Houston Public Works.

The parties now wish to enter into a Purchase and Sale Agreement, the terms of which include the

Pursuant to Article VII, Section 3 of the City Charter of the City of Houston, we request the following item to be placed on the regular Council Agenda on November 28, 2023:

WHEREAS, Section 47-65 of the City of Houston Code of Ordinances ("Code") currently provides for options for customers to reduce their high water bills; and

WHEREAS, the Houston Public Works Director has already instructed the Water Department only to back-bill a customer's incorrect bill a maximum of three months; **NOW**, **THEREFORE**,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOUSTON, TEXAS:

Section 1. That the findings contained in the preamble of this Ordinance are determined to be true and correct and are hereby adopted as part of this Ordinance.

Section 2. That Section 47-65 of the Code of Ordinances, Houston, Texas, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 47-65. Billing errors-In general.

"Subject to the provisions of this article, the department shall charge for all water that passes through the water meter.

If the department commits a billing error, it shall correct the customer's bill as soon as it discovers the incorrect billing. If the incorrect billing is an overcharge that is more than six times the customer's average bill, the department shall refund the overcharge to the customer at the request of the customer. Provided, however, if the customer can show extreme economic hardship to the utility official, the department shall refund the overcharge to the customer notwithstanding the amount of the overcharge. The utility official shall determine whether extreme economic hardship exists. In cases where the overcharge is not

refunded, the department shall credit the customer's account the amount of the overcharge to be applied to the charges thereafter accruing.

Subject to the provisions of this article, the department may not correct any billing error that occurred more than three months prior to the date the department learns of the error. If the correction results in a credit for the customer, the department shall correct the error that occurred up to two years prior to the date the department learns of the error. However, in the case of fraud or theft of city water or sewer service, the city reserves the right to recover the amount owed by the customer back to the date of the fraud or theft."

Section 3. That, if any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance, or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or their application to other persons or sets of circumstances shall not be affected thereby, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting this Ordinance that no portion hereof or provision or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by reason of any unconstitutionality, voidness or invalidity of any other portion hereof, and all provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable for that purpose.

Section 4. That there exists a public emergency requiring that this Ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction as requested in writing by the Mayor; therefore, this Ordinance shall be passed finally on such date and shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; however, in the event that the Mayor fails to sign this Ordinance within five days after its passage and adoption, it shall take effect in accordance with Article VI, Section 6, Houston City Charter.
