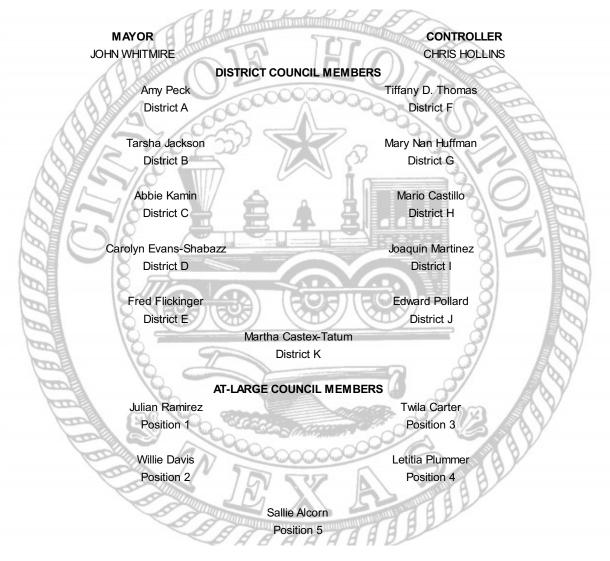

Summary:

Background:

SUBJECT: Motion establishing a public hearing date of May 8, 2024, regarding proposed amendments to the City's Tax Abatement Ordinance relating to low impact development projects

RECOMMENDATION: (Summary)

To establish a public hearing date of May 8, 2024, regarding proposed amendments to the City's Tax Abatement Ordinance relating to low impact development projects

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code authorizes taxing units, including municipalities, to establish guidelines and criteria for property tax abatement and to enter into tax abatement agreements pursuant to the guidelines and criteria adopted by the taxing unit. Pursuant to this authority, the City has created the City of Houston Tax Abatement Program, which is codified in Article IV, Chapter 44 of the City Code ("Tax Abatement Ordinance"). Section 312.002(c) of the Texas Tax Code provides that the tax abatement criteria and guidelines adopted by a taxing unit are effective for two years from the date adopted. The City's current tax abatement guidelines and criteria were approved by City Council by Ordinance No. 2022-344 on May 4, 2022, and are set to expire May 19, 2024.

Pursuant to Texas Tax Code Section 312.002(c-1), before City Council can consider the adoption, amendment, repeal or reauthorization of the City's tax abatement guidelines and criteria, which are codified in the Tax Abatement Ordinance, City Council must hold a public hearing regarding the proposed adoption, amendment, repeal, or reauthorization at which members of the public are given the opportunity to be heard.

Proposed amendments to the Tax Abatement Ordinance include updates to the definitions, application criteria, and abatement programs relating to "green stormwater infrastructure" tax abatement and renaming the "low impact development" tax abatement, and provide related clarifications. The renaming better aligns this tax abatement incentive with development industry terminology, with language already used in the City's design manual, and clarifies the types of

improvements eligible for abatement. Additionally, the proposed amendments include an increase of eligible abated maintenance costs from two years of maintenance to five years of maintenance under the new low impact development abatement. The increase in eligible abated maintenance costs better aligns with the development costs associated with low impact development in retail developments. These proposed amendments aim to increase the utility of this tax abatement incentive, which in turn increases the efficacy of the Resilient Houston plan and other economic and social benefits.

The Mayor's Office of Economic Development recommends that City Council adopt a motion to establish a public hearing date of May 8, 2024, to satisfy the public hearing requirement for amending the Tax Abatement Ordinance. An ordinance amending the Tax Abatement Ordinance will be presented to City Council for consideration at a later date.

A municipality must certify that it is in compliance with Chapter 2303 of the Texas Government Code prior to the nomination.

Enterprise Projects are eligible to apply for state sales and use tax refunds on qualified expenditures. The level and amount of a refund are based on the capital investment and jobs created or retained at the qualified business site. Depending on the investment amount, the refund to the company is between \$2,500 and \$7,500 per job.

City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2015-515 authorizing the City to nominate projects for this state-funded incentive. The Administration is nominating KPH-Consolidation, Inc. as its second TEZ project in the FY24-FY25 biennium with a planned capital investment of \$25 million, creation of 200 jobs, and the retention of 300 jobs. The amount of investment for this project will produce a maximum reimbursement of \$2,500 for up to 500 jobs or \$1,250,000 over a five-year term, at an annual rate not to exceed \$250,000. The project site is located within a Texas Enterprise Zone and therefore 25% of new jobs must be filled by residents of an enterprise zone or individuals who are economically disadvantaged. This project was presented to the Economic Development Committee on April 17, 2024.

KPH-Consolidation, Inc. is a healthcare service company that manages the Kingwood medical Center and other medical facilities in the Houston region. The Company has been previously nominated as an Enterprise Project (R2017-0021).

KPH-Consolidation, Inc. (d/b/a HCA Houston Healthcare Kingwood) plans to spend \$25 million to expand the outpatient surgery department, central sterile services department, and surgical waiting area in increase new surgery and support space capacity. The surgery department expansion includes the addition of four operating rooms, two endoscopy suites, a 9-bay shared preparation/recovery area, and an 8-bed care unit. The expansion and renovation of the current sterile services department includes the renovation of the decontamination and sterile storage areas to serve the expanded surgery department by adding a second washer, additional sinks, and additional sterile storage to meet code requirements. Suites in this area of the facility will be renovated for storage, procedure preparations, and recovery space for the new operating rooms.

She underwent 9 medical procedures including skin grafts and surgeries to the degree burns on her arms and chest. She was later hospitalized for additional months after suffering complications. She has been diagnosed with PTSD. Plaintiff M.R. suffered lesser injuries, although she too was allegedly not breathing, transported to the emergency room and has permanent scarring. The life Plan for E.L. is approximately \$5,000,000; the plan for M.R. is approximately \$170,000. These figures do not include soft damages, including but not limited to past and future pain and suffering, mental anguish and disfigurement.

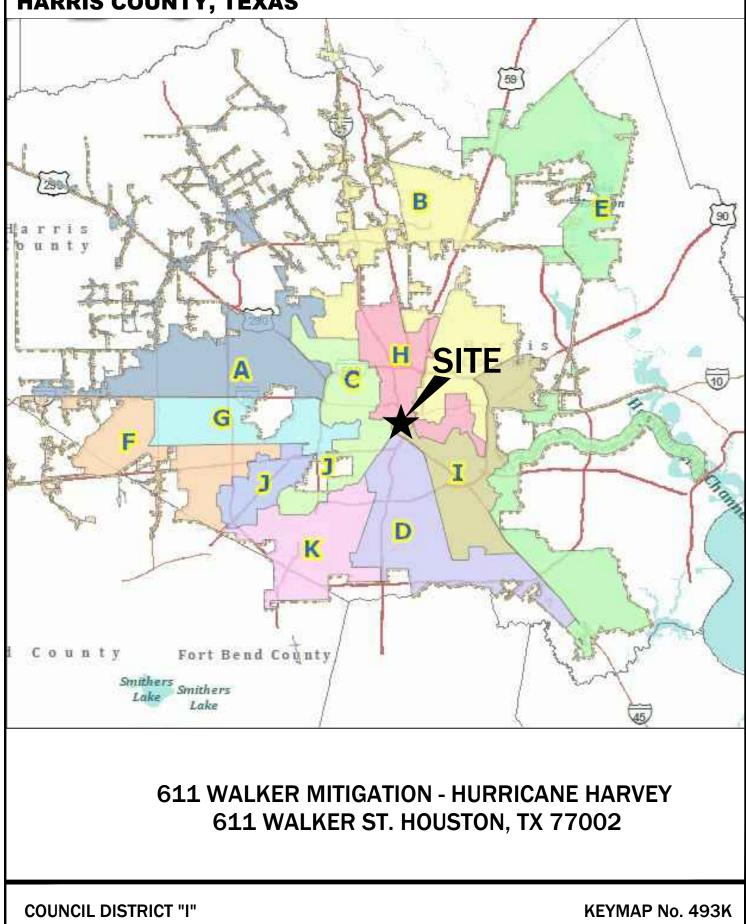

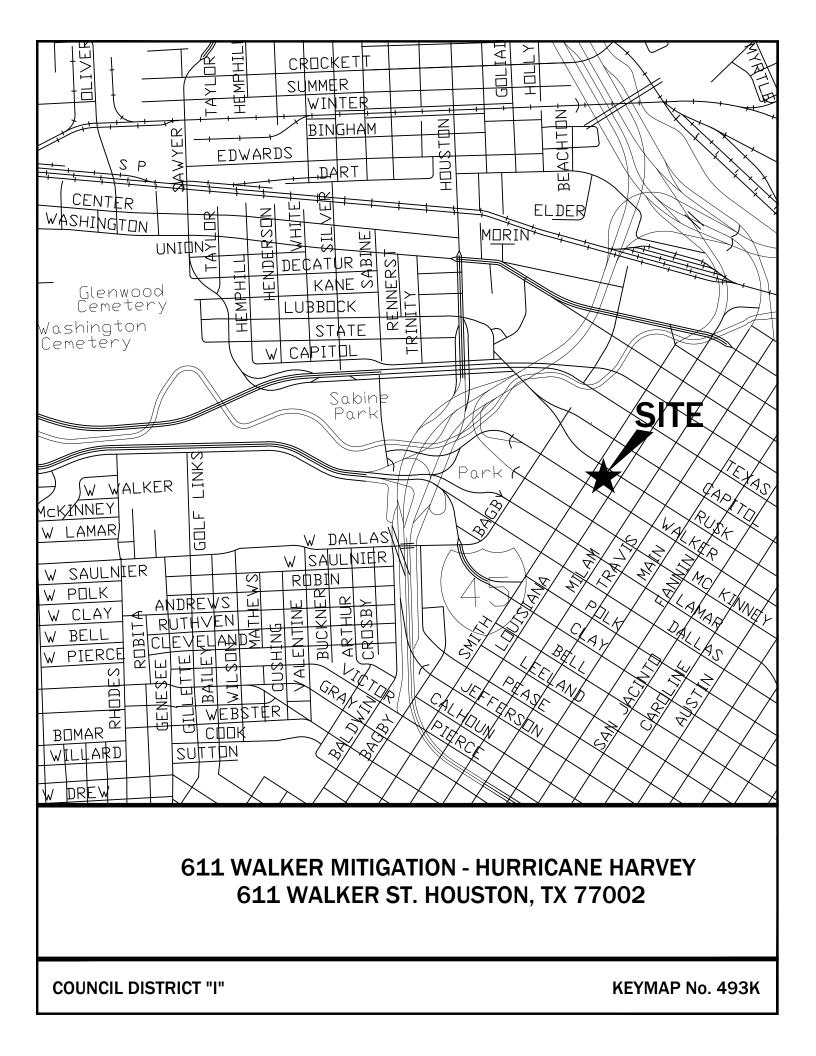

Background:

S19-L28969.A1 – Approve an amending ordinance to Ordinance No. 2020-555, approved on June 24, 2020, to increase the maximum contract amount from \$1,695,625.00 to \$2,517,875.00 for contract No. 4600015958 between the City of Houston and Copesan Services, Inc. dba Holder's Pest Solutions for pest control service for various departments.

Specific Explanation:

The Chief Procurement Officer recommends that the City Council approve an amending ordinance to increase the contract amount from **\$\$1,695,625.00 to \$2,517,875.00** for the contract between the City of Houston and Copesan Services, Inc. dba Holder's Pest Solutions for pest control services for Houston Public Works, Houston Airport System, Houston Parks & Recreation, Solid Waste Management, Administrative & Regulatory Affairs and General Services departments . This contract will be used citywide to provide pest control services on a fixed schedule at all City facilities.

The contract was awarded on June 24, 2020, by ordinance No. 2020-555, for a three-year term with two one-year options in the amount of \$1,695,625.00. Expenditures as of March 7, 2024, totaled \$1,461,334.06. The contract incurred expenditures higher than anticipated due to increased special pest control treatments and repetition, such as bed bugs, bats, snakes, and rodent bait trap removal.

The original scope of work required the contractor to furnish all personnel, supervision, labor, reports, records, equipment, tools, materials, supplies, chemicals, licenses, permits, and safety data sheets (SDS) necessary to provide pest control services in a safe manner and in accordance with the most recent and effective scientific pest control procedures. The contractor shall also be required to perform other work/services on demand, including extermination of termites, mosquitoes, bee swarms/wasps, bat abatement, control of avian pests (birds), and the humane removal of animals.

MWBE Participation:

The contract was awarded with an 11% MWBE participation level, and Copesan Services, Inc. dba Holder's Pest Solutions is currently achieving a 13.38% participation level.

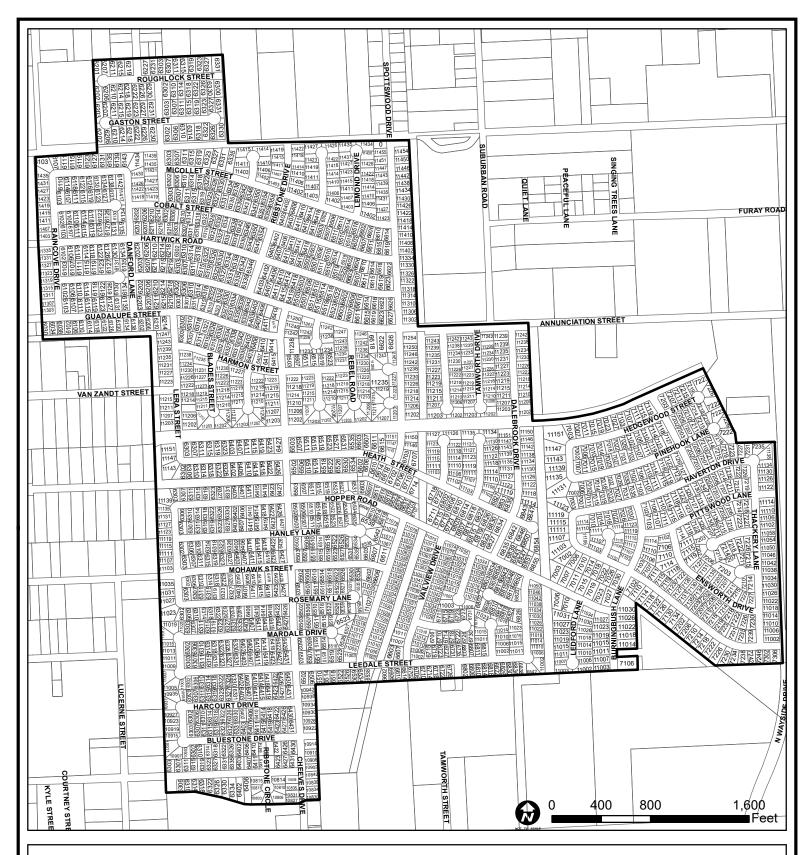
