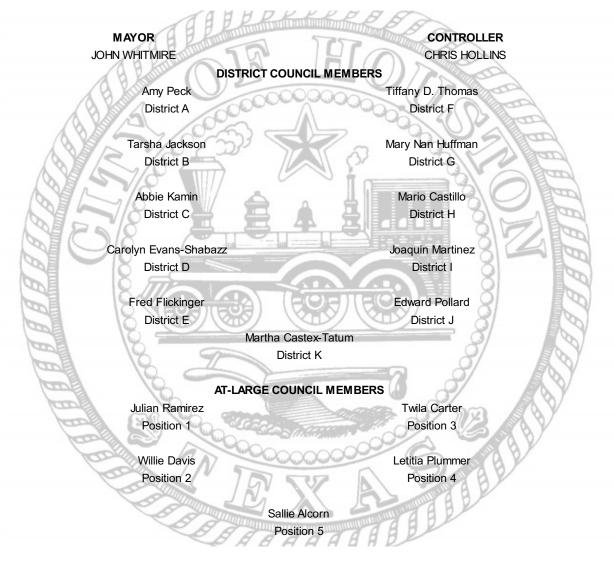

MYR - Texas Municipal League Renewal 2024

Summary:

RECOMMENDATION from Chief of Intergovernmental Relations for annual renewal of membership in the **TEXAS MUNICIPAL LEAGUE** - \$103,925.00 - General Fund

Background:

The Texas Municipal League (TML) has a membership of 1,170 cities and exists solely to provide services to Texas cities. TML is an effective organization for Texas municipalities, both large and small, advocating positions on pending legislation to members of both the Texas Legislature and Congress. The organization employs full-time attorneys who are available to provide advice and information on municipal legal matters. TML sponsors conferences and educational events and publishes informational materials to keep members apprised of current issues affecting municipal government. The City of Houston has been a member since 1913.

During the last regular legislative session, TML continued its role as spokesman for cities. More than 8,000 bills were filed with approximately 2,000 of those impacting cities in Texas in the regular session. TML reads and analyzes each bill and meets with the cities each week during the regular session to coordinate testimony and strategize with a focus on defeating legislation that would be detrimental to cities. The 89th Legislative Session that commences in January 2025 is expected to have as many or more bills filed.

TML advocates for cities on a wide range of issues, including transportation, water, economic development, and job creation.

During the interim, TML monitors and advises cities on all interim committees and issues. City staff members are represented at policy meetings. The City also has representation on the Executive Board of Directors.

TML hosted its annual conference in Houston October 9 -11, 2024 at the George R. Brown Convention Center. Attendance estimates are 6,500 attendees, exhibitors, sponsors and staff with an estimated \$9,000,000 overall positive impact on the local economy.

Membership dues reflect an increase of \$2,937 over last year and are based on population. Membership renewal with the Texas Municipal League is recommended.

The Fire Chief recommends that City Council approve a motion authorizing payment to the Texas Commission of Fire Protection (TCFP) for recertification of firefighters in an amount not to exceed \$372,008.00 for FY25.

Texas Government Code 419.034 requires that all firefighters employed in the State of Texas as a full-time firefighter hold a state certification. Certification must be renewed annually for each firefighter. Annual recertification fees of \$60 per firefighter are to be paid to the TCFP prior to October 31st of each year. Payment after October 31st results in a late penalty of \$30, in addition to the renewal fee, for each individual for which a renewal fee was due.

Certifications includes firefighting, inspection, rescue, aircraft firefighting, hazmat, arson, fire officer and fire instructors. Not every firefighter holds each certification. Each individual is state certified in accordance with their job responsibilities within the department. Based on current numbers of certified employees and projected trainees to be certified this fiscal year, HFD budgeted a total expenditure of no more than \$372,008 in FY25.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

Simon L. Kanaan and Melinda Gronauer, underlying fee property owners of 702 Bow String Cove Houston, TX 77079 and 706 Bow String Cove Houston, TX 77079, requested the City to maintain a 25-foot-wide drainage easement, plat dedicated within Lots 24 and 25, Block 1 of the Memorial Thicket Section One Subdivision, out of the Harris County Map Records, Volume 224, Page 91. Real Estate Services and Transportation and Drainage Operations - Storm (TDO Storm) researched the City's ownership interest of the drainage easement and determined that the City does not have a property interest in the 25-foot-wide drainage easement. Since the drainage easement has never been used for drainage purposes and no future need for the drainage easement is foreseen, TDO-Storm determined the drainage easement could be processed as a non-acceptance and the underlying fee owners, will retain full ownership of the drainage easement.

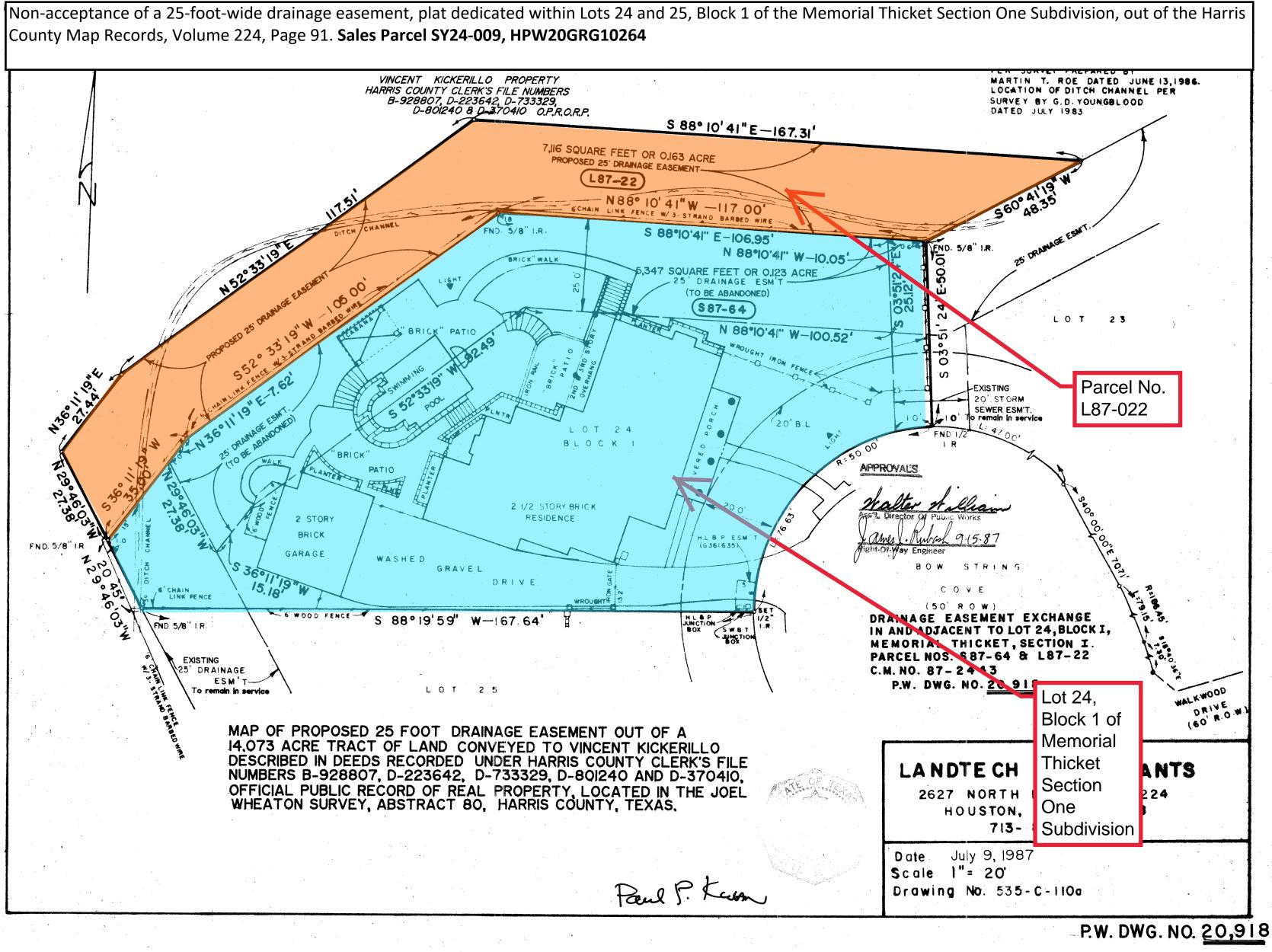

Background:

The proposed tax rate of \$0.519190 on each \$100 of taxable value must be apportioned between Maintenance and Operations (M&O) and Interest and Sinking Fund (I&S). The M&O rate is \$0.378605 on each \$100 of taxable value and the I&S rate is \$0.140585 on each \$100 of taxable value which, when combined, equals the total tax rate of \$0.519190 on each \$100 of taxable value.

The 2024 proposed tax rate (\$0.519190) is the same as the Tax Year 2023 adopted tax rate (\$0.519190).

No Required Public Hearing

Section 26.05 (d) of the Tax Code provides that a taxing unit may not adopt a tax rate that exceeds the lower of the No-New Revenue Tax Rate and the Voter-Approval Tax Rate until the governing body has held a public hearing. Since the City of Houston proposed a tax rate that is so low it does not exceed the No-New Revenue Tax Rate or the Voter-Approval Tax Rate, the public hearing is not required.

Additionally, the proposed tax rate, if adopted, is not expected to increase the City's ad valorem property tax revenues for the current fiscal year in an amount greater than five percent more than the ad valorem property tax revenues collected during the immediately preceding fiscal year. Thus, a public hearing is not required under Chapter 44 of the City's Code of Ordinances.

Opportunity for Public Comment

Although a public hearing is not required, to increase transparency and to allow for public input, members of the public are invited to express support for or opposition to the proposed tax rate at public session at 2pm on Tuesday October 15, 2024 and again at the City Council session at 9am on Wednesday October 16, 2024.

Therefore, it is recommended that City Council adopt a Tax Year 2024 tax rate for Maintenance and Operations of \$0.378605 on each \$100 of taxable value and a tax rate for the Debt Service of \$0.140585 on each \$100 of taxable value.

This First Amendment will extend the term and provide funding through August 31, 2025. SEARCH has received funding from the City of Houston since 1996.

As of June 2024, SEARCH has served the 10 HOPWA-eligible households, meeting 100% of

their goal, and has utilizing approximately 87% of its total funds. There were no findings during their most recent annual compliance monitoring review.

Bombardier Transportation Holdings USA Inc. was purchased by Alstom Transport USA Inc., and Alstom is the successor in interest to this Agreement.

The Skyway APM at IAH is a Bombardier (Alstom)-engineered driverless transportation solution that provides passengers in the IAH terminals post-security sterile areas the ability to safely and efficiently connect between Terminals A, B, C, and D/E. The Skyway System consists of 16 APM vehicles, four passenger stations, one maintenance service facility, and associated appurtenances. Under the Agreement, Alstom is responsible for the Skyway System's operation and maintenance, including all management, supervision, labor, parts/materials/consumables, equipment, diagnostics, lubricants, tools, instruments, reports, transportation, insurance, subcontracts, bonds, incidentals, and other related services. Alstom must provide both preventive maintenance (PM) and corrective maintenance (CM) in accordance with applicable standards, best industry practices, and the HAS-approved maintenance program.

On August 30, 2023, City Council enacted Ordinance 2023-0717, appropriating \$13,108,044.31

to fund continued operations and maintenance services under the Agreement with Alstom. Those funds are nearing exhaustion, and additional funds are needed while HAS continues to evaluate the Skyway System for a major refurbishment project.

The City currently has 207 solid waste operator franchises. For FY 2025, the total solid waste franchise revenue to the City is projected to be \$9,806,079.00.

The proposed ordinance grants the franchisee the right to use the City's public ways for the purpose of collecting, hauling, or transporting solid or industrial waste from commercial properties located within the City of Houston. In consideration for this grant, each franchisee agrees to pay to the City an annual franchise fee equal to four percent of their annual gross revenue, payable quarterly. To verify franchisee compliance with the franchise, the franchisee company has the duty to maintain required customer records, which the City has the right to inspect during regular business hours. The franchise agreement contains the City's standard release and indemnification, default and termination, liquidated damages, and force majeure provisions. The proposed franchise term is 10 years from the effective date.

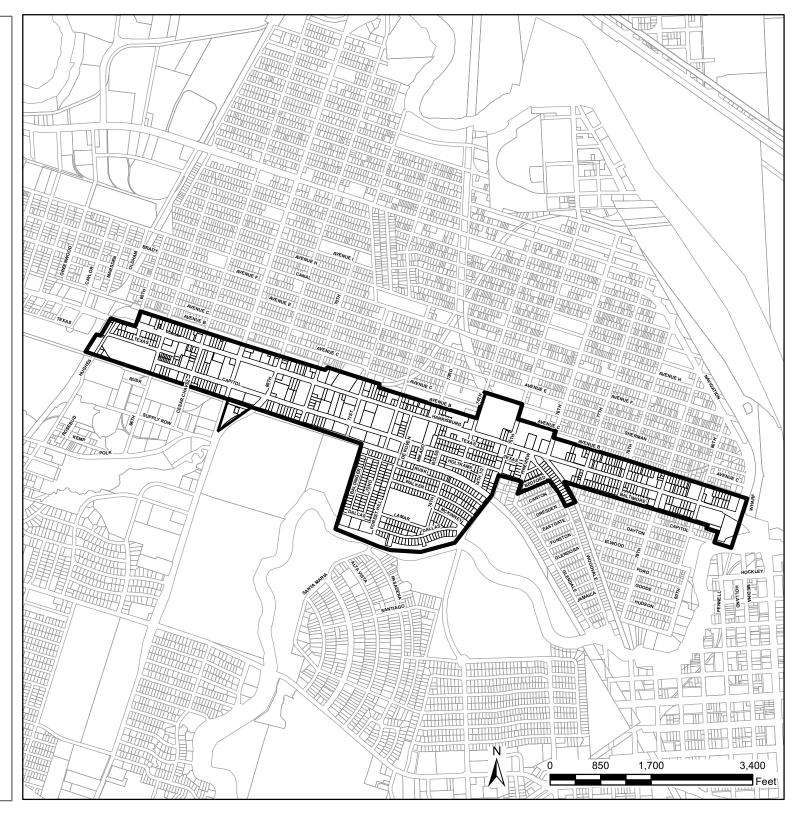
