

## **Summary:**

RECOMMENDATION from Director Planning & Development Department to approve amendments to the 2025 Major Thoroughfare and Freeway Plan (MTFP) and authorize publication of the 2025 MTFP in map form - **DISTRICTS B - JACKSON and G - HUFFMAN** 

## **Background:**

The Planning & Development Department (P&D) completed the process to amend the Major Thoroughfare and Freeway Plan (MTFP) Map and will request City Council's approval of thirteen amendments. This memorandum summarizes the process and provides background information on the purpose of the plan.

P&D is responsible for administering an annual public review process for amending the MTFP, which includes multiple opportunities for soliciting and incorporating public comments. This year, P&D reviewed 13 proposed amendments and the Planning Commission considered all 13 of these amendments. 8 of the amendments were submitted by private sector applicants and 5 were submitted by Harris County. The amendments and Planning Commission recommendations are listed below:

- A. <u>Northpointe Boulevard</u>: Planning Commission approved the applicant's request to realign a segment of the proposed Major Thoroughfare Northpointe Boulevard and reclassify an adjoining 700' segment of Major Collector Grant Road to a Major Thoroughfare. The site is located in Houston's ETJ in Harris County. Harris County is the applicant, and they requested the shift in the alignment to facilitate lower construction costs for a bridge that is intended to be built over the Faulkey Gully Floodway. The amendment request was supported by staff.
- **B.** <u>Cypress North Houston South of 290:</u> Planning Commission approved the applicant's request to delete proposed Major Thoroughfare Cypress North Houston between Queenston and US-290. The site is located in Houston's ETJ in Harris County. Harris County is the applicant, and they have requested the removal due to the infeasibility of construction. There is a drainage facility and an existing Union Pacific rail line that prevents the connection to US-290. Additionally, there is an existing park built in the unimproved right of way (ROW) of Cypress North Houston. The amendment request was supported by staff.
- C. Cypress North Houston Road West of 1960: Planning Commission approved three requests

all submitted by Harris County:

- Cypress North Houston Road: Harris County requested the deletion of a ~1,300 feet long section of unimproved Cypress North Houston Road between Major Thoroughfares FM 1960 and Perry Road in order to construct a detention project. Staff found that there would be no impact of traffic congestion and supported the request.
- 2. **Solon Road**: The Planning Commission approved staff's recommendation to delete Solon Road as a 100' Major Thoroughfare. The road is currently dedicated at 60' and serves as an existing low-density commercial corridor, but it does not connect to the east due to a drainage ditch that is just inside City of Houston limits.
- 3. Greens Road: The Planning Commission approved Harris County's request to delete proposed Major Collector Greens Road. The adjacent east/west Major Thoroughfare Mills Road is only improved to 2 lanes and has ROW dedicated already to allow the improvement and provide higher traffic throughput. When looking at the corridor holistically, with the removal of Cypress North Houston and the unlikely construction of a bridge to connect Solon Road, the existing road network can provide sufficient mobility including future demand. Staff and TxDOT were in support of this request.
- **D. Mueschke Road:** Planning Commission approved the applicant's request to delete the proposed Major Thoroughfare Mueschke Road from Mound Road to N Bridgeland Lake Parkway. The site is located in Houston's ETJ in Harris County. Harris County requested the deletion of this proposed segment due to the infeasibility of construction and a proposed detention project that a MUD has proposed. This segment cross Cypress Creek floodway and the existing Oak Meadow Park. Staff was in support of this request.
- **E.** <u>Humble Parkway:</u> Planning Commission approved the applicant's request to delete the proposed Humble Parkway from Rankin Road to Greens Road. The site is located within Houston's City Limits just east of George Bush Intercontinal Airport along Interstate 69. The applicant, META Planning + Design requested the deletion due to it being impractical to build due to a bayou and existing pipelines on the site. Additionally, the two parcels that are to be developed will have the ability to take direct access to the US 69 access road. Staff, Harris County, and TxDOT were in support of the request.
- **F. Chimney Rock Road:** Planning Commission approved staff's recommendation to deny the applicant's request to downgrade Chimney Rock from a Major Thoroughfare to a minor collector. The Briarcroft HOA submitted this application to downgrade Chimney Rock from San Felipe to Westheimer in order to facilitate traffic calming measures. Houston's Infrastructure Design Manual (IDM) limits traffic calming measures, such as speed cushions, to certain road classification types. Traffic volumes on the corridor were determined to align with the classification of a Major Thoroughfare, so a downgrade was determined to not be appropriate. The MTFP Amendment process only determines the road classification type, and not what if any safety improvements should be made. P&D, HPW, and Councilmember Huffman's office have been and will continue to work to identify what safety improvements can be made in the corridor.
- **G. <u>E Tidwell Road:</u>** Planning Commission approved the addition of proposed Major Collector E Tidwell from East Sam Houston Tollway to local street Pineland Road. The site is located in Houston's ETJ in Harris County. The applicant, Sappington Engineering, requested this amendment to set an alignment and intends to construct the road to support connectivity for a 1,000,000 sq ft office and warehouse facility. Additionally, the community will have greater access to Sheldon Park and will have an additional ingress/egress point that bypasses a nearby at-grade

train crossing. Staff, Harris County, Harris County Precinct 1, and TxDOT support this request.

- **H.** <u>Beathe Road</u>: Planning Commission approved the realignment of proposed Major Thoroughfare Baethe Road. The site is located in Houston's ETJ in Harris County. The applicant, META Planning + Design, submitted this to add a curve to the existing MTFP alignment to make a more appealing streetscape and allow passive traffic calming measures by introducing a curve. Staff and Harris County were in support of this request.
- I. <u>Unnamed East West Major Thoroughfare / Blue Ridge / Hiram Clarke:</u> Planning Commission approved three proposed amendments in Houston's ETJ in Fort Bend County submitted by META Planning + Design: delete proposed Major Thoroughfares Unnamed East West, Blue Ridge south of McHard, and Hiram Clarke south of McHard Rd. These amendments were approved by Fort Bend County earlier this year and have already been incorporated into Fort Bend's MTFP. There are several existing land uses, including TV antenna towers, a floodway, and a landfill that make constructing the alignment difficult. Staff and Fort Bend County were in support of this request.

The 2025 MTFP annual amendment review process included the following:

- A pre-application meeting with applicants (January 2, 2025 February 21, 2025).
- A workshop with the Planning Commission for preliminary review and discussion about the applications (May 15, 2025).
- A thorough review of the applications by P&D staff and coordination with agency stakeholders.
- A public open house held virtually (June 11, 2025).
- A public hearing before Planning Commission (July 24, 2025).
- An MTFP Application Update before Planning Commission (August 21, 2025).
- Planning Commission discussion and vote on the amendments (September 18, 2025).

#### **Background**

The City of Houston MTFP identifies transportation corridor alignments and establishes the required rights-of-way for major roadways in the City and its ETJ. Chapter 33, Article IX (Section 33-374) of the Code of Ordinances requires that the Planning Commission prepare and submit the MTFP annually to City Council. In developing the annual amendments to the MTFP, the Commission may consider deleting, realigning, and reclassifying streets designated on the plan. The Commission may also consider adding one or more streets to the plan. An amendment approved by the Planning Commission is not effective until the MTFP is approved by City Council. The MTFP was initially adopted in 1942, as a way to plan for and preserve a long-term transportation network that would support the rapidly growing city. In 1966, the plan was expanded to include the ETJ. Today, the MTFP uses street classifications identifying the preferred (ROW) width dimensions, as well as the rules governing development along the ROW. Classifications include Freeways/Tollways, Major Thoroughfares, Transit Corridor Streets, Collector Streets (Major Collectors and Minor Collectors), and Local Streets.

The MTFP is important for several reasons:

- It identifies long-term roadway needs for Houston and the ETJ;
- It ensures that development and re-development activities dedicate adequate roadway ROW to maintain a well-connected street network as the area grows;
- It helps govern development that takes place along each specific classification on the map;
- It provides a coordinated plan that is used by public agencies when making decisions related to

transportation within the City of Houston and its ETJ;

- MTFP classifications are used within HPW's Infrastructure Design Manual to define how roads will be designed and constructed; and
- It provides officials and the general public useful information when making land acquisition decisions.





**SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:** Keith Gaynor of Walter P. Moore and Associates, on behalf of Houston First Corporation, Paula Whitten Doolin, General Counsel, requested the Abandonment and sale of: 1) ±45,837 square feet of Jackson Street, from Polk Street south to Bell Street, 2) ±41,076 square feet of Chenevert Street, from Polk Street south to Bell Street, 3) ±52,613 square feet of Hamilton Street, from Polk Street south to Bell Street, 4) ±40,778 square feet of Clay Street, 5) ±13,323 square feet of Bell Street and 6) ±60,856 square feet of Polk Street, from the right-of-way line of Interstate 69 west ±784 feet to the west right-of-way line of Jackson Street, and 7) ±30,000 square feet of Avenida De Las Americas from Polk street north to ±350, out of the South Side Buffalo Bayou Subdivision (Unrecorded), out of the J.S. The Joint Referral Committee reviewed and approved the request.

Holman Survey, A-323.

- 1. The applicant has provided Houston Public Works with electronic survey maps and field notes of the affected property interests.
- 2. The applicant has provided an original Statement of Ownership letter.
- 3. The applicant be required to obtain a letter of no objection from each of the privately-owned utility company for the streets being abandoned and sold.





## Sec. 2-302. Definitions.

As used in this article, the following terms and phrases shall have the following meanings:

City attorney means the city attorney or his designee.

Covered person means a person who is or was:

- (1) The mayor, the city controller, or a member of city council;
- (2) A member of a city board, commission, or committee created by Charter, ordinance, or resolution of the city;—or
- (3) An employee of the city; or
- (4) A volunteer who has been approved in writing by and works under the direction of the mayor, the city controller, a member of city council, or a city employee and who has been issued a city identification badge by the security official for use while acting as such a volunteer-; or
- (5) A member of a super neighborhood council formally recognized by the mayor, and a member of the super neighborhood alliance, while acting in their capacity as a member of a super neighborhood council or the super neighborhood alliance at a meeting of the super neighborhood council or super neighborhood alliance to which they are a member.

Security official shall have the meaning ascribed in section 2-411 of this Code.

## Sec. 33-313. Compensation of members; conflicts of interest.

Members of a super neighborhood council shall serve without compensation. Super neighborhood councils do not constitute covered persons for the purpose of article X of chapter 2 of this Code. Each member of a council shall abstain from voting upon matters in which there is or may be a conflict of interest, shall not participate in any activity of a super neighborhood council or the alliance in which there is or may be a conflict of interest, and shall not participate in any city contract that relates to the duties of the super neighborhood councils or the alliance.

## Sec. 33-325. Compensation of members; conflicts of interest.

# Chapter 7 ANTIQUE DEALERS, COMMON MARKETS, SCRAP METAL PROCESSORS, SECONHAND RESELLERS AND RELATED BUSINESS

#### ARTICLE VI. SECONDHAND RESELLERS

# Sec. 7-125. Records required to be kept by secondhand resellers.

- (a) A secondhand reseller shall be required to keep records of any used property purchased or otherwise received as follows:
  - (1) The date of receipt of any item; and
  - (2) The individual transaction number assigned by the secondhand reseller.
- (b) A secondhand reseller, his agents or employees shall provide a consecutively numbered receipt to the seller or transferor of the item. Such receipt shall be dated on the actual date of the transaction.
- (c) A secondhand reseller shall only purchase, acquire or sell catalytic converters if allowed under section 1956.123 of the Texas Occupations Code. A secondhand reseller shall be required to keep records of any catalytic converter purchased or otherwise received as detailed in section 1956.124 of the Texas Occupations Code.
- (d) The provisions of this section shall not apply to any retailer that is (1) primarily engaged in the sale of merchandise under its own proprietary brand or private label, (2) maintaining centralized inventory management and transaction tracking systems across all of its locations, and (3) reselling items originally purchased from its own stores or e-commerce platform, provided that such retailer maintains its own internal records of inventory transactions and complies with all applicable state and federal laws.
- (e) The provisions of this section shall not apply to a retailer that is operated by an organization incorporated under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and obtains its merchandise solely via donations.

# Sec. 7-126. Stock and records to be open for examination.

- a. The stock or inventory and all records of any secondhand reseller shall be accessible for examination by any peace officer or inspector authorized by the director at any time during ordinary business hours.
- (b) The provisions of this section shall not apply to any retailer that is (1) primarily engaged in the sale of merchandise under its own proprietary brand or private label, (2) maintaining centralized inventory management and transaction tracking systems across all of its locations, and (3) reselling items originally purchased from

its own stores or e-commerce platform, provided that such retailer maintains its own internal records of inventory transactions and complies with all applicable state and federal laws.

(c) The provisions of this section shall not apply to a retailer that is operated by an organization incorporated under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and obtains its merchandise solely via donations.

# **Background:**

City Council previously approved an ordinance approving and authorizing a professional services agreement between Husch Blackwell LLP (the "Firm") and the City of Houston "Original Agreement") providing a maximum contract amount of \$275,000.00 to consult with and represent the City, as needed, in the condemnation proceeding styled *City of Houston v. Paul S Radich, et al.*, Cause No. 1181389, in Harris County Civil Court at Law No. 2 and represent the City, as needed for the Windermere Outfall Repair Project. Ordinance No. 2023-0407 was amended by ordinance 2024-0519 to increase the maximum contract amount from \$275,000.00 to \$650,000.00.

The Original Agreement expired on June 15, 2025 before completion of the professional legal services required by the Agreement. The Windermere Outfall Repair Project has also required that the City file condemnation litigation for an additional parcel of land with a different landowner. The second lawsuit filed is *City of Houston v. Aslam and Nuzhat Hasnain*, et al., Cause No. 1221678, County Civil Court at Law No. 1. Both condemnation proceedings have been highly contentious, with numerous motions filed and court hearings conducted and the necessity for the City to obtain a Temporary Restraining Order for City personnel to access the properties for surveying and appraisal purposes. Both matters are anticipated to proceed to a 3-4 day jury trial sometime in 2025 or 2026.

Additionally, the Firm is now representing the City in negotiations and real estate research related to the likely condemnation of City parkland by Harris Health/Harris County for the expansion of the Ben Taub Medical Center.

Going forward the Firm will be expected to perform the following:

- 1. Conducting a three to four-day jury trial in the Radich matter and the Hasnain matter, including pretrial filings and pretrial motions in both matters,
- 2. Conducting discovery and depositions in the Hasnain matter,
- 3. Filing and defending motions in the Hasnain matter, and
- 4. Representing the City in negotiations with and possible condemnation by Harris County for Harris Health.

While the City does not monitor the expenditures of each district, we are aware that most districts use their funds to supplement existing district services, which effectively lowers utility and tax rates. In some instances, districts have used the proceeds to fund regional parks and other public amenities. Through these agreements, the City has maintained a good working relationship with the utility districts in the Houston area.

#### **Background:**

SUBJECT: Petition for the City's consent to the addition of 19.075 acres to Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 221.

<u>RECOMMENDATION:</u> Petition for the City's consent to the addition of 19.075 acres to Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 221 be approved.

<u>SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:</u> Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 221 (the "District") was created through the TCEQ in 1982 and currently consists of 515.398 acres within Harris County. The District is within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City of Houston (the "City") and has petitioned the City for consent to add 19.075 acres of vacant land, proposed to be developed as commercial property to the District. The proposed annexation tract is located in the vicinity of Sawgrass Ridge Lane, East Richey Road, Imperial Vally Drive and Hardy Toll Road. The addition of land to the District does not release it from the City's extraterritorial jurisdiction.

The Utility District Review Committee has evaluated the application with respect to wastewater collection and treatment, potable water distribution, storm water conveyance, and other public services.

The District has a wastewater collection system and treatment facility. The annexation tract will be provided with wastewater treatment by the Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 221 Wastewater Treatment Facility. This regional plant also provides wastewater treatment to Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 154. Potable water is provided by the District.









Exhibit A Vicinity Map




# FIGURE 2B VICINITY MAP





PREVIOUS HISTORY AND SCOPE: On October 21, 2020, under Ordinance No. 2020-0916, City Council approved the submission of five Grant Applications to the Texas Department of Transportation Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP). HSIP is a federally mandated program managed by TxDOT that works to achieve the reduction of traffic fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads. Funds in the amount of \$84,095.00 were appropriated for the local match to the grant.

On April 5, 2023, City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2023-0231 approving an Advance Funding Agreement for the installation of traffic signals and traffic signal improvements. Under the Agreement, the City was responsible for

the design of the improvements and contributing funds for 100% of TxDOT's Direct Costs and a 10% local cost share toward construction of two project locations. HPW had requested Council appropriate \$280,231.00 for TxDOT Direct Costs and the estimated 10% local cost shared under the preceding agenda item. The City allocated funds in the amount of \$308,254.10 under Ordinance No. 2023-230 on April 5, 2023.

**SCOPE OF THE AGREEMENT AND FEE:** This additional appropriation request is due to an overrun, based on the original estimated cost and the actual bid price for each project. This resulted in an increase from \$308,254.10 to \$956,044.51, a difference of \$647,790.41. The projects were funded with Federal funds participating in a fixed

amount for each project. The City is responsible for all costs in excess of the Federal share. The additional funds in the amount of \$647,790.41 will be utilized for payment to TxDOT to cover the overrun cost invoiced by TxDOT.

The total requested amount of \$712,569.45 is to be appropriated as follows: \$647,790.41 for the overrun cost, and \$64,779.04 for CIP Cost Recovery.

**PREVIOUS HISTORY AND SCOPE:** On October 21, 2020, under Ordinance No. 2020-0916, City Council approved the submission of five Grant Applications to the Texas Department of Transportation Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP). HSIP is a federally mandated program managed by TxDOT that works to achieve the reduction of traffic fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads. Funds in the amount of \$84,095.00 were appropriated for the local match to the grant.

On April 5, 2023, City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2023-0231 approving an Advance Funding Agreement for the installation of traffic signals and traffic signal improvements. Under the Agreement, the City was responsible for the design of the improvements and contributing funds for 100% of TxDOT's Direct Costs and a 10% local cost share toward construction of two project locations. HPW had requested Council appropriate \$280,231.00 for TxDOT Direct Costs and the estimated 10% local cost shared under the preceding agenda item. The City allocated funds in the amount of \$308,254.10 under Ordinance No. 2023-230 on April 5, 2023.

**SCOPE OF THE AGREEMENT AND FEE:** This additional appropriation request is due to an overrun, based on the original estimated cost and the actual bid price for each project. This resulted in an increase from \$308,254.10 to \$956,044.51, a difference of \$647,790.41. The projects were funded with Federal funds participating in a fixed amount for each project. The City is responsible for all costs in excess of the Federal share. The additional funds in the amount of \$647,790.41 will be utilized for payment to TxDOT to cover the overrun cost invoiced by TxDOT.

The total requested amount of \$712,569.45 is to be appropriated as follows: \$647,790.41 for the overrun cost, and \$64,779.04 for CIP Cost Recovery.

To verify franchisee compliance with the franchise, the franchisee company has the duty to maintain required customer records, which the City has the right to inspect during regular business hours. The franchise agreement contains the City's standard release and indemnification, default and termination, liquidated damages, and force majeure provisions. The proposed franchise term is 10 years from the effective date.

To verify franchisee compliance with the franchise, the franchisee company has the duty to maintain required customer records, which the City has the right to inspect during regular business hours. The franchise agreement contains the City's standard release and indemnification, default and termination, liquidated damages, and force majeure provisions. The proposed franchise term is 10 years from the effective date.




