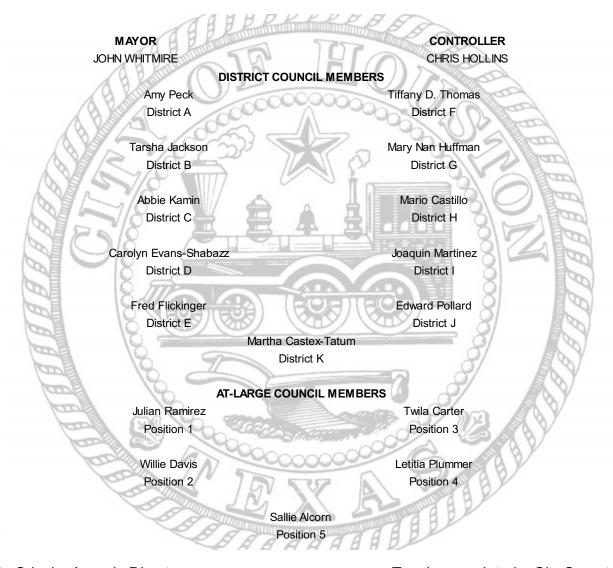

Background:

SUBJECT: A public hearing regarding the designation of the Owens Corning Roofing & Asphalt, LLC Reinvestment Zone for tax abatement purposes and regarding the proposed tax abatement agreement with Owens Corning Roofing and Asphalt, LLC.

RECOMMENDATION: (Summary) A public hearing regarding the designation of the Owens Corning Roofing and Asphalt, LLC Reinvestment Zone for tax abatement purposes and regarding the proposed tax abatement agreement with Owens Corning Roofing and Asphalt, LLC.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

State law requires cities to adopt tax abatement guidelines and criteria before entering into tax abatement agreements, and each approved abatement agreement must meet those guidelines. State law also provides that cities' tax abatement guidelines and criteria must be renewed every two years. City Council last renewed the tax abatement guidelines and criteria on August 28, 2024.

Tax abatement agreements may only be entered into for properties within a designated reinvestment zone pursuant to Sec. 312.201 of the Texas Tax Code. That section requires that the City holds a public hearing before it can adopt an ordinance designating an area as a reinvestment zone. Public hearings on proposed tax abatement agreements are not mandatory under the statutory requirements for public hearings in Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code; however, Section 44-126(a) of the Code of Ordinances requires a public hearing on a proposed tax abatement agreement prior to entering into tax abatement agreements.

Owens Corning Roofing & Asphalt, LLC ("the Company") is proposing the expansion of their existing manufacturing facility. The Company submitted a tax abatement application to the City on November 25, 2024, with all supporting documentation. The proposed development consists of adding a new product line at the Company's facility located at 8360 Market St, Houston, Texas for an innovative technology not currently produced in the United States. The Company plans to invest \$39 million to develop the Project.

The City has reviewed the Company's tax abatement application, and the proposed tax abatement agreement was presented to the Economic Development Committee on October 15, 2025. The proposed date of the public hearing is November 12, 2025.

The hearing notice will be published in the Houston Chronicle no later than 7 days prior to the public hearing date, as statutorily required.

Background:

SUBJECT: Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ)'s Annual Consolidated Water Quality (CWQ) Fees.

RECOMMENDATION: Authorize payment of the TCEQ invoices totaling \$1,866,213.52 for the annual Consolidated Water Quality (CWQ) fees for the City of Houston (City's) wastewater treatment plants.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION: This is a request to authorize payment of invoices received from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for the annual Consolidated Water Quality (CWQ) fees and Emissions Inspection Fee (EIF) that apply to the City of Houston's (City's) 38 Wastewater treatment plants, as well as the CWQ fees for the City's MS4 program, co-permitted with Harris County and the Harris County Flood Control District.

The current invoice covers the period from September 1, 2025, to August 31, 2026, corresponding to TCEQ's fiscal year 2026. The annual fees are based on the wastewater discharge, air emissions and stormwater management fees from each of these facilities.

The CWQ fee rate schedule is found in TCEQ's regulations, - Title 30, Texas Administrative Code (TAC), Chapter 21: Water Quality Fees, Section 21.3 Fee Assessment. This became effective July 30, 2009 and is adjusted annually based on the consumer price index. The revenue resulting from the CWQ Fees pays TCEQ's expenses to inspect wastewater treatment facilities and to enforce the provisions of the Texas Water Code. It also funds comprehensive monitoring of water quality for each river basin, conducted under the Texas Clean Rivers Program.

The EIF rate is based on the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) code at an affected regulated entity. The authority to collect this fee is granted under Texas Health and Safety Code Section 382.062, and the administration of the fee is described in Title 30 TAC, Section 101.24. The inspection fee is collected to recover the costs of the TCEQ air programs.

Recommend that Council approve the Houston Public Works' request to pay TCEQ the invoiced amount of \$1,866,213.52.

Airport runway friction is measured by Continuous Friction Measuring Equipment (CFME) is performed on a routine basis. The FAA established maintenance guidelines based on the results

of the friction testing as shown in Advisory Circular (AC) 150/5320-12C. Friction values are classified into three levels, each with corresponding recommended actions. The results of regularly scheduled friction measurements at IAH prompted the use of a third-party consultant to evaluate all runways at IAH. The third-party consultant report stated IAH should initiate plans to correct pavement texture within one year on Runway 8R/26L in alignment with FAA maintenance guidelines. An Emergency Purchase Order is requested to meet the time-sensitive nature of the necessary runway maintenance based on FAA guidelines.

IAH Runway 8R/26L surface friction must be improved in alignment with FAA AC 150/5320-12C to ensure continued operations are viable. The evaluation report indicates that the runway pavement is below the maintenance level, requiring diamond grinding and grooving work within a one-year timeframe. The personal protection gear (PPG) is inspected annually and replaced as necessary.

HFD's operational landscape ranges from grass fires to complex wildland-urban interface (WUI) threats. Adequate PPG is a cornerstone of protecting public health and safety by ensuring responder safety, operational effectiveness, and mission continuity. CrewBoss Safety, LLC supports this goal by offering PPG that not only protects the firefighter from heat and flame but also contributes to respiratory health and heat stress mitigation through advanced garment design.

This recommendation is made pursuant to subsection 252.022(a)(2) of the Texas Local Government Code, which provides that "a procurement necessary to preserve or protect the public health or safety of the municipality's residents" is exempt from the competitive requirements for purchases.

ARA - Suspend Effective Date of Southern Water Corporation's Proposed Rate Change Request

Summary:

ORDINANCE relating to the Water and Wastewater Rates of **SOUTHERN WATER CORPORATION** within the City of Houston, Texas; suspending for ninety days the effective date of new rates; maintaining current rates in effect; providing for severability - **DISTRICT B** - **JACKSON**

Background:

The Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department (ARA) recommends that City Council adopt an ordinance suspending for ninety days the effective date of Southern Water Corporation's (Southern) new rates and tariffs as proposed in its Application for Authority to Change Rates (Rate Application) within Houston and otherwise maintaining current rates in effect. Southern is an investor-owned water/wastewater utility (IOU) with exclusive authority to provide water and wastewater services to Houston customers within its certificated service areas as granted under Certificate of Convenience (CCN) Nos. 11389 and 20500. Southern provides service for approximately 1,300 water and 1,300 sewer connections located in the Hidden Valley Subdivision. Approximately 1,290 water and 1,290 sewer customers are located within the City of Houston's jurisdiction. The City of Houston (City) exercises original jurisdiction over the rates, tariffs, operations, and services of Southern under the provisions of the Texas Water Code for customers inside the city limits.

On October 27, 2025, Southern filed a rate application with the City for customers within Houston's jurisdiction. Southern filed a similar application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for customers (approximately 12 connections) in unincorporated (environs) areas. Southern is requesting a \$250,326 (69%) increase in water and \$205,325 (23%) increase in sewer revenues. Background:

The Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department (ARA) recommends that City Council adopt an ordinance suspending for ninety days the effective date of Southern Water Corporation's (Southern) new rates and tariffs as proposed in its Application for Authority to Change Rates (Rate Application) within Houston and otherwise maintaining current rates in effect. Southern is an investor-owned water/wastewater utility (IOU) with exclusive authority to provide water and wastewater services to Houston customers within its certificated service areas as granted under Certificate of Convenience (CCN) Nos. 11389 and 20500. Southern provides service for approximately 1,300 water and 1,300 sewer connections located in the Hidden Valley Subdivision. Approximately 1,290 water and 1,290 sewer customers are located within the City of Houston's jurisdiction. The City of Houston (City) exercises original jurisdiction over the rates, tariffs, operations, and services of Southern under the provisions of the Texas Water Code for customers inside the city limits.

On October 27, 2025, Southern filed a rate application with the City for customers within Houston's jurisdiction. Southern filed a similar application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for customers (approximately 12 connections) in unincorporated (environs) areas. Southern is requesting a \$250,326 (69%) increase in water and \$205,325 (23%) increase in sewer revenues. The specific impact to Houston customers will vary by meter size and gallons used (see attached). Southern is proposing to increase the rates as follows for the average residential customer with a 5/8" meter:

ARA - Ordinance Denying Aqua Texas' Application to Change Rates

Agenda Item#: 16.

Summary:

ORDINANCE denying application of **AQUATEXAS**, **INC** for authority to change rates filed with the City of Houston, Texas on June 20, 2025, and as amended; providing for severability - **DISTRICTS A - PECK and E - FLICKINGER**

Background:

The Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department (ARA) recommends that City Council adopt an ordinance denying Aqua Texas, Inc.'s (Aqua Texas) application to change rates and maintain current rates in effect for customers within the Houston city limits. Within Houston's jurisdiction, Aqua Texas provides water service to approximately 93 residential and 2 commercial customers, and wastewater service to approximately 62 commercial customers. State-wide, Aqua Texas serves approximately 76,000 water and 25,300 wastewater customer connections. The City of Houston (City) exercises original jurisdiction over the rates, tariffs, operations, and services of Aqua Texas under the provisions of the Texas Water Code (TWC) for customers inside city limits.

On June 20, 2025, Aqua Texas filed an application to change rates with the City for customers within Houston's jurisdiction. Aqua Texas filed a similar application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC or Commission) for customers in unincorporated (environs) areas. The proposed rate change impacts Houston customers served by the Oak Manor, Brittmoore – West by Northwest, Walraven, Summer Lakes Ranch, and The Commons systems. According to the utility's initial application, Aqua Texas seeks approval of a consolidated statewide tariff and is requesting a total (consolidated system) revenue increase of approximately \$17.8 million (water) and \$11.4 million (wastewater) for retail customers. The specific rate impact to Houston customers will vary by system, meter size and gallons used (a comparison between current and proposed consolidated rates is attached).

Aqua Texas planned for the proposed rates to go into effect July 25, 2025 — 35 days after Aqua Texas filed its application with the City. However, the City identified certain issues with the application, and the City did not accept the application until Aqua Texas corrected those deficiencies. Aqua Texas proposed a new effective date of September 2, 2025. On August 26, 2025, City Council approved Ordinance No. 2025-699, suspending the effective date of the rate change for 90 days to December 1, 2025. City Council approved the rate suspension to provide the City the time necessary to review the request and prepare a final recommendation for consideration by the Mayor and City Council. The City engaged an outside rate expert to conduct a

comprehensive review of the rate application and provide a recommendation regarding the reasonableness of the rate request. During the suspension period, the City also held an informal public hearing on October 27, 2025, to allow ratepayers the opportunity to provide public comment on the proposed rates and service.

Based on the recommendation of the City's experts, ARA, in consultation with the City Attorney's Office, recommends that City Council adopt an ordinance (1) denying Aqua Texas' application to change rates, including the proposed rate increase and (2) maintaining existing rates in effect for Aqua Texas' Houston customers. City Council must make a final determination regarding the rate request no later than December 1, 2025, otherwise the rate increase will go into effect for Houston customers.

Aqua Texas will likely appeal the City's decision to the PUC. The City anticipates that the appeal of the City's decision will be consolidated into the parallel case proceeding at the Commission. The City will participate in the Commission proceeding.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

On March 9, 2011, City Council adopted Ordinance 2011-179, approving and authorizing a Lease Agreement with Woolsey Aviation, Inc. DBA Million Air – Houston (Million Air), granting the company the rights to lease and develop approximately 1,111,622 square feet (25.5193 acres) at William P. Hobby Airport (HOU) for fixed-base operator (FBO) activities. The Agreement included a 40-year term with an option for early termination after 30 years. Under the Lease, Million Air committed to investing \$12 million in improvements within the first 10 years, including construction and upgrades to support aviation services. Among these improvements was the installation of above-ground fuel tanks.

On March 26, 2025, City Council adopted Ordinance 2025-223, approving and authorizing Amendment No. 1 to the Lease Agreement, removing Site "E" from the Leased Premises and reducing the size of Site "D" to accommodate the Federal Aviation Administration's (FAA) Non-Standard Taxiway Project at HOU and adding Site "G2" to the Leased Premises. Ordinance 2025-223 appropriated \$3,838,564.00 to compensate Million Air for the removal of its fuel tanks and fueling infrastructure from Site "E" to Site "G2."

Million Air now wishes to further amend the Lease to remove Site "D" (consisting of approximately 72,448.4 square feet of land and a 21,730-square-foot hangar (WR-5)) and add Site "J" (consisting of approximately 149,501 square feet of land and a 41,051.3-square-foot hangar (WR-12)). Sites "I" (consisting of approximately 57,294 square feet of land and a 12,020-square-foot hangar (WR-10)) and "H" (consisting of approximately 86,341 square feet of land and a 24,466-

square-foot hangar (WR-11)) will also be added.

For the additional Sites, following the construction period, HAS shall charge base rent in the amount of \$377,946.35 per year, or approximately \$31,495.52 per month. A 15% increase in the rental rate will apply every fifth anniversary of the effective date.

Hangars WR-12 and WR-11 will be refurbished to be used as aircraft hangar facilities, while Hangar WR-10 will be demolished to make way for much needed aircraft ramp parking. Hangar WR-11 will be renovated according to standards set by the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). Million Air is required to expend a minimum of \$2,750,000.00 on capital improvements/renovations for Hangars WR-10 and WR-11. In addition to the minimum capital expenditure required for Hangars WR-10 and WR-11, Million Air is required to expend a minimum of \$2,700,000.00 on capital improvements/renovations for Hangar WR-12. These facilities are essential for expanding Million Air's operations and enhancing the overall service offerings at the airport.

DA-2025-0016 – Approve an ordinance authorizing a Derivative Agreement with a one-year term between the City of Houston and Sherrariums Company, in a maximum contract amount of \$200,222.00 for seasonal decor design, installation, and removal services at George Bush Intercontinental Airport/Houston (IAH) and William P. Hobby Airport (HOU) through the Buy Board Purchasing Cooperative for the Houston Airport System (HAS).

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The Director of the Houston Airport System and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve and authorize a derivative agreement with a one-year term between the City of Houston and **Sherrariums Company** the maximum contract amount of **\$200,222.00** for seasonal decor design, installation, and removal services at George Bush Intercontinental Airport/Houston (IAH) and William P. Hobby Airport (HOU) through the Buy Board Purchasing Cooperative for the Houston Airport System (HAS).

This scope of work requires the Contractor to provide complete seasonal decoration services for the Houston Airport System at George Bush Intercontinental (IAH) and William P. Hobby (HOU) Airports, including the design, furnishing, installation, maintenance, and removal of decorations. Responsibilities include supplying all labor, materials, equipment, supervision, and transportation; submitting design layouts for approval; ensuring compliance with safety codes; replacing defective items; and responding promptly to maintenance requests. Work must be performed overnight to minimize operational impact, with detailed installation plans, site protection, and cleanup required. All personnel must meet security, licensing, and identification requirements, and invoicing must follow HAS procedures.

This service will enhance passenger experience and overall airport atmosphere by creating a welcoming, festive environment during the 2025 holiday season. Professionally designed and installed decorations reflect positively on the City of Houston and Houston Airport System's brand, improve customer satisfaction, and support HAS's goal of providing world-class travel experience.

This recommendation is made pursuant to subsection 271.102(c) of the Texas Local Government Code, which provides that "a local government that purchases goods or services from a cooperative purchasing program or organization satisfies any state law requiring the local government to seek competitive bids for the purchase of the goods or services."

M/WBE Participation:

The derivative agreement was assigned a specific goal-oriented MWBE goal of 5% MWBE participation level. Sherrariums Company submitted a Good Faith Effort to the Office of Business Opportunity, which was approved for a 0% MWBE goal.

Pay or Play Program:

This procurement is exempt from the City's 'Pay or Play' Program because the department is utilizing a purchasing cooperative for this purchase.

Hire Houston First:

Specific Explanation:

The Director and Presiding Judge of the Municipal Courts Department (MCD) and the Chief Procurement Officer (CPO) recommend that City Council approve an ordinance authorizing a third amendment to the Master Agreement No. C75801 between City of Houston and Linebarger Goggan Blair & Sampson, LLP, to extend the contract term to December 10, 2026, for continued unpaid account collection services for MCD.

The contract was awarded on May 28, 2014, by Ordinance No. 2014-518 for a five (5) year term with an option for City Council to authorize the Director of MCD to extend the agreement for an additional term of five (5) years. On May 15, 2019, by Ordinance No. 2019-367 the Director of MCD and the CPO sought City Council approval to extend the contract term an additional five (5) years from June 10, 2019, to June 10, 2024. On May 8, 2024, a First Amendment was approved pursuant to Ordinance No. 2024-303, which extended the contract term to June 10, 2025. On May 21, 2025, a Second Amendment was approved pursuant to Ordinance No. 2025-425, which extended the contract term to December 10, 2025. This Third Amendment will extend the contract term an additional one (1) year to December 10, 2026, to allow MCD to continue to receive revenue collection services for unpaid delinquent accounts until a new award is presented to City Council, which is currently in progress.

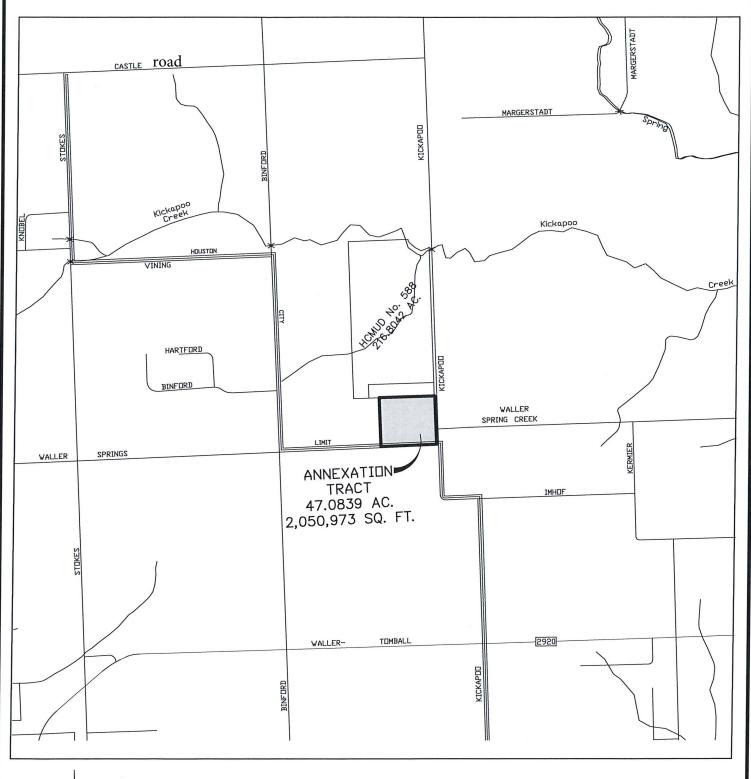

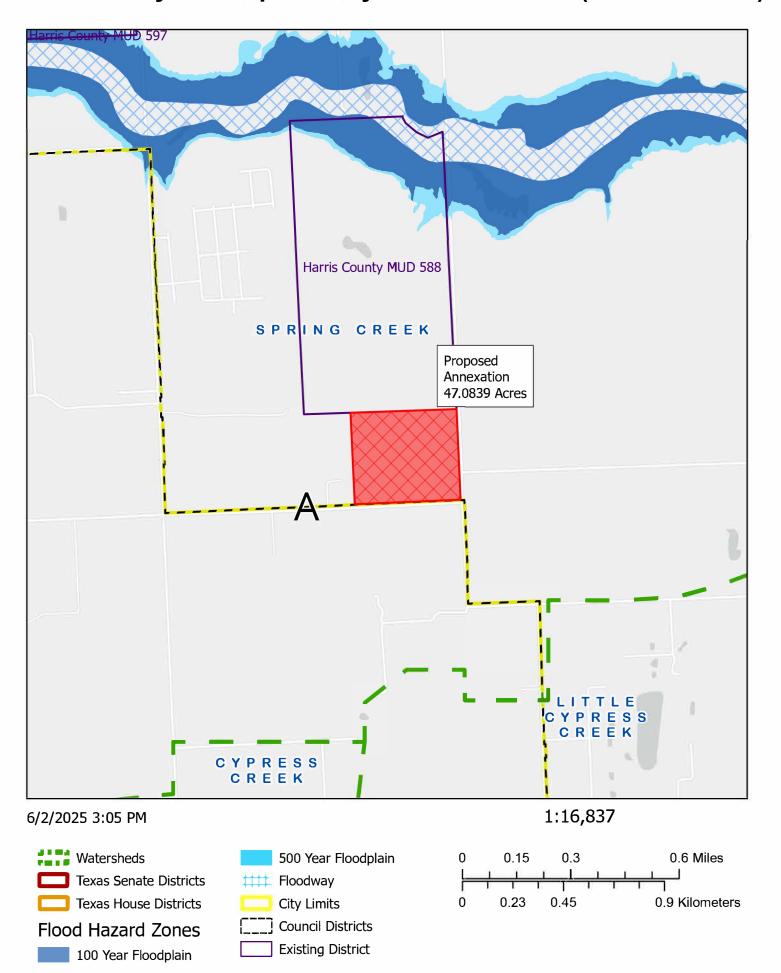
VICINITY MAP

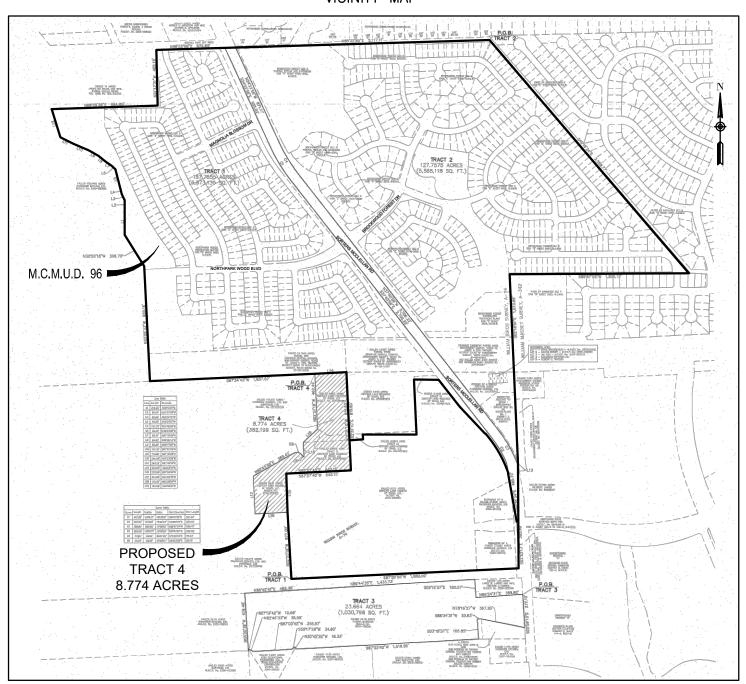

MONTGOMERY COUNTY - MUD 96 VICINITY MAP



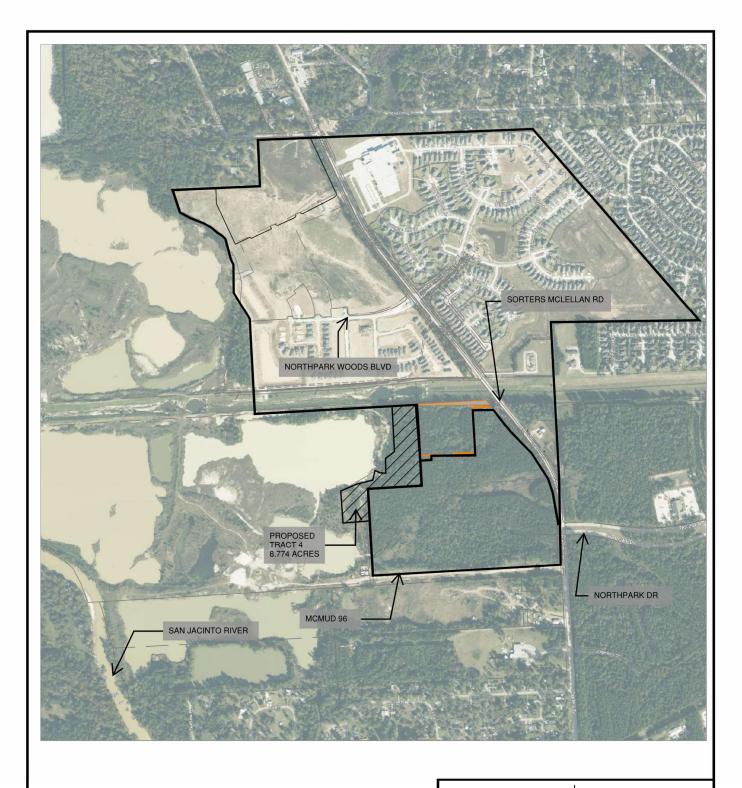

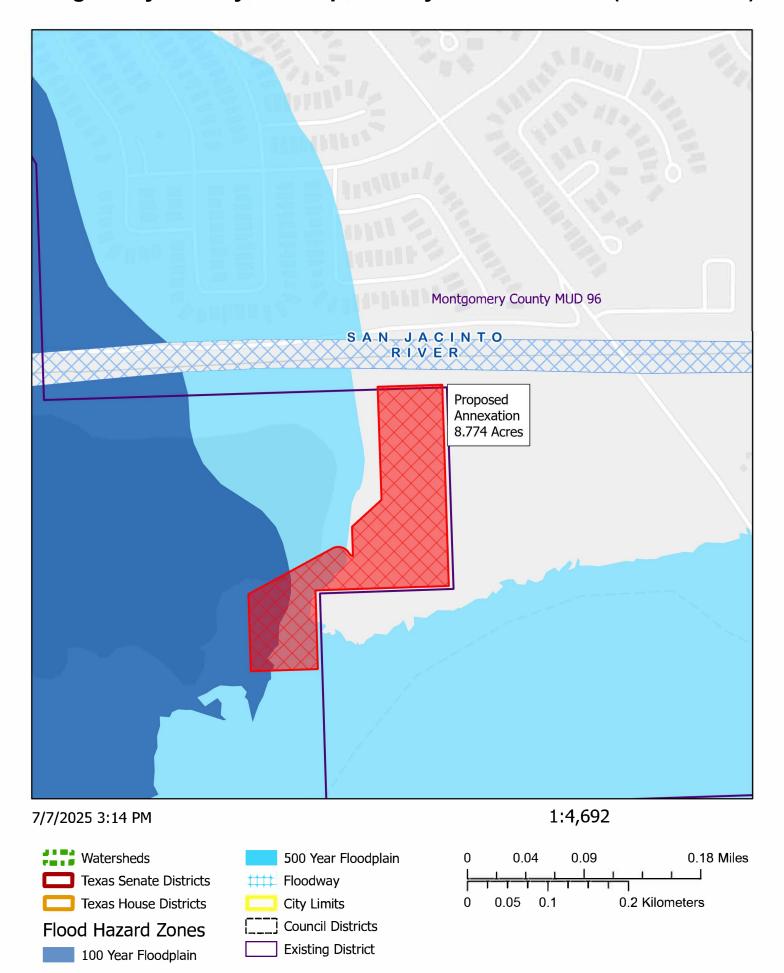

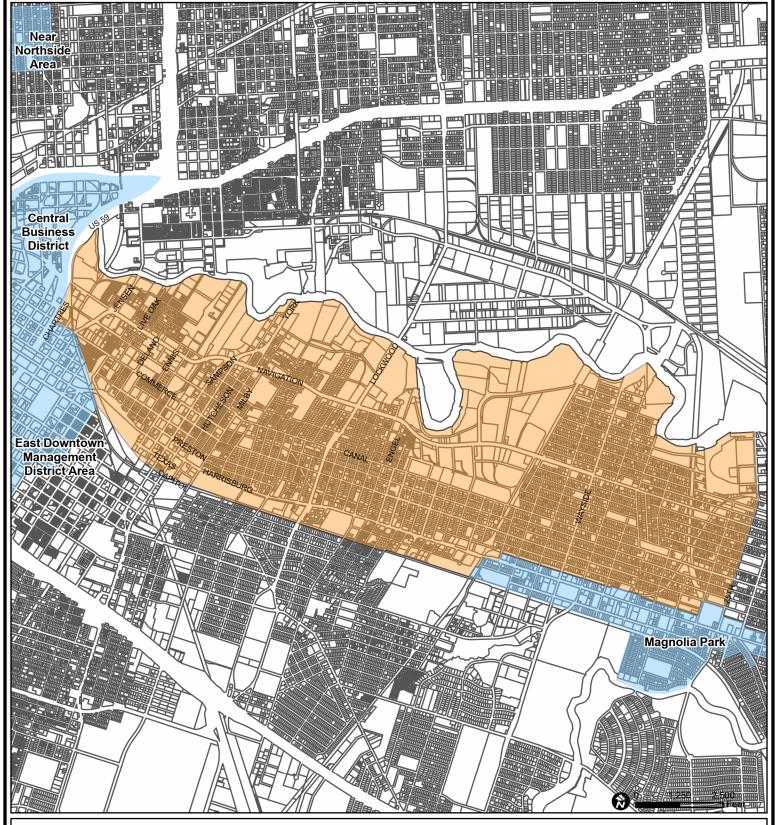

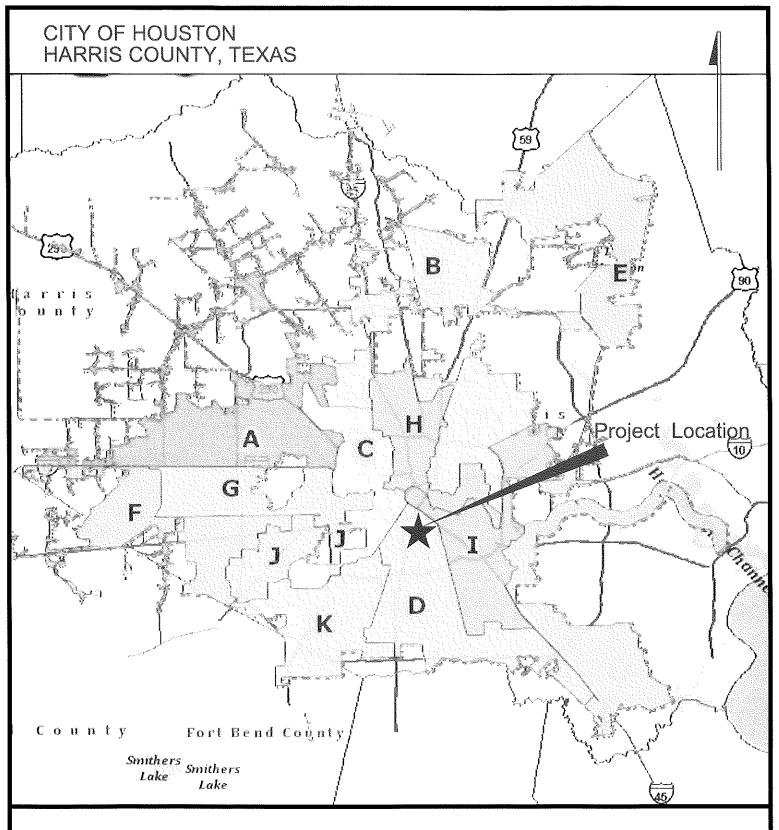

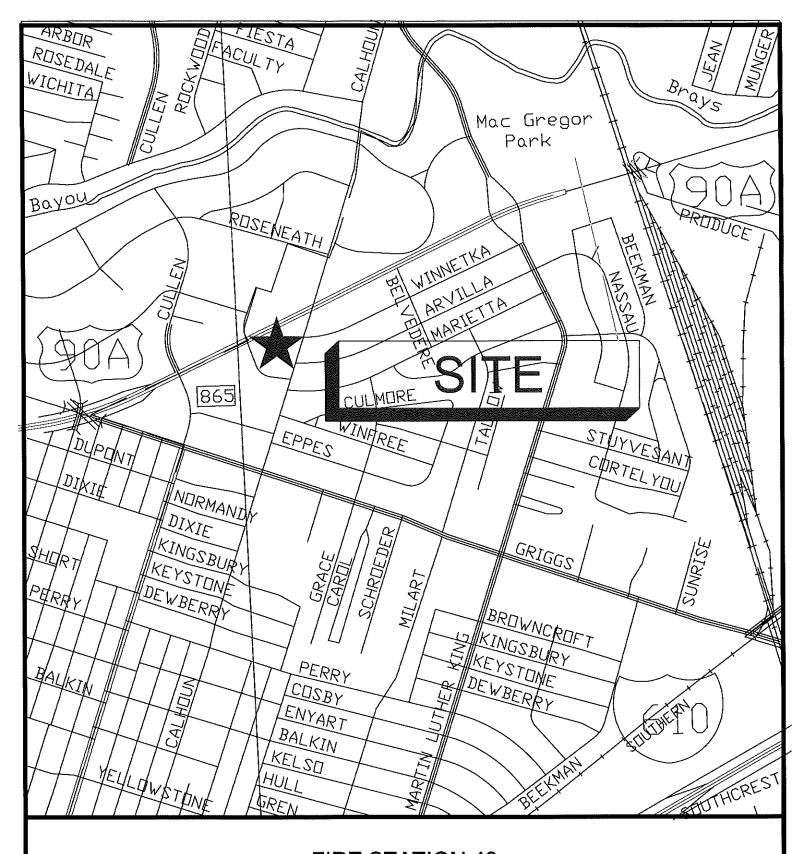
